





SJCSD hosts school safety forum following shooting in Parkland

Mental health, facility improvements, armed security at forefront of discussion

Mental health awareness, educational facility improvements and the presence of armed professionals on school campuses were the three main topics discussed at a school safety meeting hosted by St. Johns County School District staff Monday, March 19 at Nease High School.

Initiated by School Board District 4

This article is part of a series on St. Johns County's response to last month's shooting that took place at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. Member Kelly
Barrera, the meeting functioned as a roundtable discussion through which members of the local community could share their ideas on ways the district could enhance school safety in the wake of the Parkland school

shooting last month, and with consideration towards the recently-signed Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act. Attended by parents, students, school district staff and local law enforcement members, the discussion offered a unique array of perspectives on an issue of increasing concern for many Americans nationwide.

"This is an important topic, and I know having each one of you here is going to make the discussions that we have today richer and help to influence some of the decisions that our district will make going forward," Barrera said.

Signed into law by Gov. Rick Scott on March 9, the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act addresses the issue of gun violence on multiple fronts, implementing the new requirement

of an armed professional on every school campus (to be assigned by the district and local law enforcement), as well as new considerations regarding mental health.

"Mental health, in my opinion, is the most important to the long-term decline in risk and decline in violence in our society," said SJCSD Superintendent Tim Forson, who opened the discussion at the March 19 meeting. "If we don't do something to help our youth in the area of stress, and coping skills and mental health, then what we are

doing is just putting up barriers to repeated behavior that will probably continue."

Forson added that the issue of mental health is a complex one, given the stigma often associated with the issue, as well as the various challenges of ensuring support is accessible to those who need it. Suggestions of possible ways to improve upon mental health services and awareness in the school system included comprehensive training for teachers and staff regarding how to identify and help students with po-

tential mental health issues, incentivizing positive behavior, speeding up the referral process and providing students with a confidential way to report concerns.

Improvements to school facilities and operations were also a major topic of discussion, with common suggestions including updates to alarm systems; strict identification procedures for students, staff and visitors; a security-based approach to structural design; and more in-depth drills and protocols regarding active shooter situations.

While there was little disagreement in the discussion surrounding the first two topics, there was debate over the question of who the armed professionals on school campuses should be. Forson, however, was forthright in stating that he does not support the idea of arming teachers.

"I just don't see it," he said. "And it's not that I don't think we have very capable teachers and administrators—it's not about that. That's not what they came into this profession for. They came into this profession to lift kids up and to do everything for kids, and even for that kid who is at risk and doing terrible things, we have teachers who need to support them to get them back on the right path. The idea of asking teachers to have access to a high-powered rifle or to something else, to be the responsive person, I believe is the wrong thing."

That view was echoed by many attendees, with the majority expressing a preference for the presence of an armed law enforcement officer on school grounds, as opposed to armed teachers or other staff members. There were some, however, who felt that other trained professionals should not be discounted as an option simply

Commissioner Dean addresses beach renourishment, tourism at Chamber luncheon

District 5 County Commissioner and Commission Chair Henry Dean discussed the importance of beach renourishment and its potential impact on tourism at a recent St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce Ponte Vedra Beach Division luncheon.

"In this town, we have a lot of good industries, but tourism is our No. 1 industry," said Dean at the March 14 event held at Ruth's Chris Steak House in Ponte Vedra Beach. "What drives tourism and what's the lifeblood of tourism? Our beaches. If we don't have healthy, sustainable beaches in our county - and I live in south St. Augustine - if we didn't have the beach renourishment program we have, and we didn't have healthy beaches, we would be just a shadow of what we are today down there as far as economic activity and tourism business."

Dean suggested that the county should increase its tourist development tax (also known as the bed tax) by a penny to help fund a renourishment project. According to Dean, the county's TDC tax is currently at 4 percent, while the Flagler County rate is 5 percent and Volusia is at 6 percent.

"In order to come up with a way to restore and sustain our beaches in the north part of the county," he said, "it makes good sense to take a portion of the TDC tax one cent and augment the funds that would be coming from the local community." (The Board of County Commissioners will vote on the bed tax increase in the coming months.)

Dean noted that Irma impacted 47 of Florida's 67 counties, and the aftermath of both Irma and Matthew created a "real significant problem" in the area from Vilano Beach to South Ponte Vedra Beach. The commissioner asserted that one-time sand placement could mitigate the problem for a stretch of about nine miles – approximately 30 cubic yards of sand per linear foot – and help renourish the beach significantly.

According to Dean, the county is looking for an offshore sand source to get the project going.

"A year ago, we were looking at trucking it in by truck transport, but Irma damaged the beach and eroded the beach so that's not really an option now," he said. "The only reasonable way to do the project is with an offshore sand source, which requires some core permitting that we'll be involved with"

Dean's address also included discussion on smart growth and proposed impact fees for business/residential areas. The event was sponsored by Fields Auto Group. For more information on Dean, visit www. sjcfl.us/Commissioners/Comm5.aspx.

partner such as the PGA Tour," SJCSD Superintendent Tim Forson said. "And it's such an important issue for us, character building. We live in two worlds, with the academic growth, but also the personal growth, and the fact that they're committing to that journey with us and our children is just an incredible opportunity for us."

The official announcement was made by THE PLAYERS Executive Director Jared Rice at the school district's 2018 Character Cup, which links academics and character education through Olympic-style athletic competition. The Character Cup, as part of the CHARACTER COUNTS! program, is one program that will benefit from THE PLAYERS' sponsorship, in addition to the WEB (Where Everybody Belongs) Mentorship Program, the Link Crew Mentorship Program and the Pursuing Victory With Honor Program.

The sponsorship, Rice told the Recorder, is part of a 10-year commitment that THE PLAYERS made in 2011 to generate \$50 million for youth-related charities.

"We want to do more for our area's youth and our students, and this is an

area that's important to us and intrinsic in the game of golf," he explained. "Golf is founded on honesty, integrity and sportsmanship. (We asked) 'How can we tie those principals into improving people through school?' and crafted this program together."

Rice made the additional announcement that THE PLAYERS will be supplying every elementary and K-8 school in the district with equipment and curriculum from The First Tee Golf in Schools program, which emphasizes

character-building in golf education. He then closed his remarks with a message to district students and staff.

"To our students: continue to work hard, represent our community with integrity and we're very, very proud of you," he said. "To our teachers and administrators in attendance: We appreciate you and hope that today's announcement makes what you do a little bit easier as you continue to guide our young men, women and children through their education."

because they are not law enforcement officers.

"There's no reason to think that (a person) couldn't be trained by the police department to come in and do school security, and also be a janitor here," said Denver Cook, a parent and District 4 school board candidate. "Ultimately, the training is the training."

After all ideas and viewpoints had been shared, Barrera closed the meeting by emphasizing the importance of finding common ground through positive discourse when seeking solutions to issues like gun violence.

"As we get closer and closer to the decision-making process of what we're going to do, how we're going to do it and everything we need to consider, the voices that we hear today – the voices from the students, and the voices from the other teachers and staff – are super important, because we all have different eyes and we all see things differently through different lenses," she said. "And each one of those lenses is valuable, but when you hear things from each group, there's certainly a common thread, and I appreciate all of you being here tonight, sharing that common thread."

Williams address

Williams, Barrera gather with supporters, discuss priorities at recent reception

St. Johns County Commission District 4 Candidate Dick Williams and St. Johns County School Board District 4 Representative Kelly Barrera, who is seeking reelection, recently met with a group of their supporters at a special reception held at Montoya & Associates.

The March 14 event kicked off with drinks and hors d'oeuvres, providing attendees the chance to mingle with the candidates. Several in attendance were the candidates' fellow members of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach.

Barrera delivered her remarks first. If elected, she said she would advocate for building a high school in the northern part of the county to handle the growing student population. She also said she would prioritize the continued growth of the district's career academies.

Barrera stated that school safety has always been a priority. She noted the district's student services department has expanded over the last four years, and if elected, she said she would focus on continued development of that department. One recent proof point of that expansion, she said, is the district's partnership with an organization in January that will provide additional mental health resources to various schools in the county. Thanks to the school board's half-cent sales tax revenue, she added that the district also has radios that can alert law enforcement of a problem with one push of a button.

In general, Barrera discussed the complexity of the school board and the responsibility of serving on it, noting that the district consists of over 40,000 students, 4,000 employees and a budget over \$350 million.

"It's the type of responsibility that you



have to really be prepared for that leadership, that advocacy, be prepared for that purpose and be prepared to give that much and beyond," said Barrera. "I certainly feel like that's what I do. ... I've seen what works and what doesn't work. I've watched how different ideas have been implemented, and I've seen them prosper

and not do as well."

Williams' address subsequently followed. The County Commission candidate discussed his background, which consists of 30 years of top management of multimillion-dollar budgets of commercial radio stations. Williams also served as the executive director of the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach for six years, as well as a two-time appointed member of the Planning & Zoning Agency (PZA). Williams mentioned that he is now retired — setting himself apart from his opponents in the District 4 race — and willing to take on the commissioner role as a full-time job.

The key for the next commission, according to Williams, is managing the county's finances and expenses in the most efficient and effective way to provide its residents the services they need. He noted that his corporate background managing big budgets, combined with his nonprofit

In addition, Williams said the commission must find a way to reinvest in the county. He noted the county isn't spending enough money on repaired maintenance of roads and hasn't built a new park in about four years. Williams said the county has 51,000 more people today than it did in

2007, while also having a budget that is \$60 million less than it was 10 years ago. As a result, he stated the significance of the upcoming elections to address this issue.



The Tesori Family Foundation held its inaugural 321 Love Your Neighbor event at Collage Day School on Wednesday, March 21 at 3:21 p.m. to celebrate World Down Syndrome Day.

Hosted by News4Jax anchor Nikki Kimbleton, 321 Love Your Neighbor festivities included music from local artist Kay Gianna, free food from Pieology, What's the Catch and Kona Ice. Attendees also enjoyed snacks courtesy of Down Syndrome Association of Jacksonville. The event was held on March 21 at 3:21 p.m. because Down syndrome is medically defined as someone who has a third copy of the 21st chromosome.

Author and Special Olympics Virginia board member John Franklin Stephens, who has Down syndrome, delivered a speech on living with the disorder. Stephens, who was "thrilled at the turnout" for the event, thanked visitors for attending 321 Love Your Neighbor and shared his life experiences. Stephens' 2017 testimony to Congress on Down syndrome research and the value of life went viral.

"To I look like I'm suffering?" he asked. "To moms, dads, and grandparents out there, let me leave you with some piece of advice. Expect competence, not failure; expect joy, not suffering; expect to be amazed and you will never be disappointed."

Down syndrome

Founded in 2009 by Paul and Michelle Tesori, the Tesori Family Foundation is a nonprofit aimed at giving back to those in need in the Northeast Florida community. Following the birth of their son Isaiah, Paul and Michelle expanded the organization to add programs for children with special needs.

"Since Isaiah has been born, one of the things that has surprised me as a person and as a sinner is I'm open to any and all questions," Michelle said in an interview with the Recorder. "What I've learned is ignorance – not in a negative way – is what prevents people from having accurate information. If we're able to embrace the questions as opposed to getting offended by questions, we can open the door to open lines of communication."

Open dialogue about Down syndrome, Michelle asserted, will bridge the gap and further educate the public about the disorder.

"What I'm hoping today does is open the door for folks who may have been resistant or hesitant to ask questions about Down syndrome or to approach and meet someone with Down syndrome," she said. "I'm guessing there are probably 50-plus people here with Down syndrome today... It would be impossible to be here and not have an interaction."



New study shows regular exercise can reverse heart disease in middle-aged population

The link between heart health and exercise has been known for a long time, but a new study recently published in the journal Circula-

tion demonstrates how adopting a regular exercise routine can actually reverse heart damage in middle-aged people who were formerly inactive.

The two-year study followed a group of individuals aged 45 to 64 who changed their lifestyles to include an exercise regimen recommended by the American Heart Association. The research was conducted by the University of Texas' Institute for Exercise and Environmental Medicine.

Volunteers in the study were assigned an exercise program that included moderate and high-intensity workouts, and some got weight training, balance work and yoga. They all did exercises they chose and that they could stick with.

After two years, the research showed that those who had worked out at least four days per week had healthier hearts and arteries, and were more fit as measured by maximal oxygen uptake.

How exercise strengthens your heart

Your heart needs to be strengthened and conditioned like any other muscle. With regular exercise, your heart can become more efficient over time, which results in lower blood pressure – a key element in managing heart disease.

Physical activity also increases your levels of "good" cholesterol, which can help remove "bad" cholesterol from the arteries and decrease risk of atherosclerosis.


Exercise can also help people quit smoking as well as prevent obesity, diabetes and inflammation – all risk factors for heart disease.

Heart-healthy lifestyle recommendations

While the study in Circulation demonstrates the power of exercise alone, it's important to consider all controllable factors when assessing heart health. Some of the most dramatic heart health improvements I have witnessed are in patients who participate in the structured diet programs, such as the Ornish Reversal or Pritikin programs at St. Vincent's HealthCare.

These programs instruct participants how to adopt a lifestyle that includes a heart-healthy diet, regular exercise, stress management and participation in a support group.

A SPARTAN EMERGES

Ponte Vedra senior perseveres despite heart defect

After surviving three open-heart surgeries by the age of 18, Avi Wolf doesn't shy away from physical activity. Instead, he has learned to embrace it, and live his life with a level of optimism and motivation unlike most his age.

The Ponte Vedra High School senior is gearing up for his sixth Spartan Race on April 28 in Jacksonville, despite living with a congenital heart defect called Tetralogy of Fallot. Having previously competed in the obstacle course races in Jacksonville, Miami and Tampa, the Sawgrass resident will this time take on the Spartan Super, which consists of more than 25 obstacles and eight miles of rugged terrain. The following day, Wolf will join his younger cousins for the kids' race, and then will wrap up the weekend with the Spartan Sprint, a tamer yet still daunting endeavor comprised of over 20 obstacles and three miles of terrain.

"I'm going to be hurting," laughs Wolf. The local teen was diagnosed with Tetralogy of Fallot upon his birth on Sept. 11, 1999. Nineteen years later, the Ponte Vedra senior is all too familiar with his condition: He's writing a 15-page college-style thesis on the topic for his AP Physics class.

"My pulmonary valve was not functioning correctly, so it was removed," explained Wolf. "There was a hole between my right and left ventricle, which was then repaired with a Gore-Tex patch."

According to the American Heart Association, Tetralogy of Fallot is comprised of four features: A hole is present between the lower chambers of the heart; an obstruction exists from the heart to the lungs; the aorta lies over the hole in the lower chambers; and the muscle surrounding the lower right chamber becomes overly thickened. According to Wolf's findings, the heart defect occurs in less than one in 2,000 live births and is the most common cyanotic congenital heart

defect with 95 percent of patents living beyond the age of 20.

Wolf's first surgery took place just before he was four months old, and the second occurred after his first birthday. His most recent surgery happened in June 2017, a few months before his 18th birthday, and featured the insertion of a new pulmonary valve, which he said helps his heart function significantly better now.

Regardless, the lifelong Ponte Vedra resident said the surgeries have taken a toll on his body, and he's still not attaining 100 percent closure with the valve.

Instead of looking for pity, however, Wolf works harder. After two-and-a-half weeks of the June 2017 surgery, Wolf was back at his gym, Momentum Wellness in Ponte Vedra, to regain the muscle he had lost. Friends and fellow Momentum members Inger and Pat Geraghty, CEO of

Florida Blue, took notice.

"Avi made us want to work harder, complain less and appreciate our own health," said the couple in an email to the Recorder. "Avi is an inspiration ... a young man who has faced three heart surgeries and chooses to be optimistic while continuing to challenge himself in life."

The Geraghtys served as the chairs of the 2018 First Coast Heart and Stroke Ball, which raised a record-breaking \$1 million dollars for the American Heart Association. In respect to Wolf's perseverance and strength, the couple asked the teen to feature his story at the 60th annual event held at Sawgrass Marriott Resort & Spa on March 3.

"It was very humbling to see all of the great work the people at the American Heart Association are doing for so many people," said Wolf about the event. "I'm really lucky that I'm still able to be so

physically active and be able to go run, go outside, play football with my friends and do a Spartan Race with my mom and dad. A lot of people with my heart condition aren't able to do that."

Moving forward, Wolf doesn't necessarily know what the future will hold for him and his heart condition. He said the new valve could last between 20 years and a lifetime, but the timetable is unknown due to the new technology involved in the surgery. What he does know, however, is that he plans to keep physical fitness and a healthy lifestyle as priorities in his life and encourage others to do the same.

"I want to encourage people to eat healthy," said Wolf, who will attend University of South Florida in the fall to study mechanical engineering. "If you don't know how to, Google it. Try to be as active as you can. ... You have to do what's best for your body."

In terms of fitness, the American Heart Association recommends that adults should get at least 150 minutes of moderate exercise, or 60 to 75 minutes of vigorous exercise, per week.

It's important to choose workout routines that get your heart pumping – such as running, walking or cycling – but also ones that you will actually stick to. If you



hate running or experience any back or joint discomfort due to the repetitive impact, try to find another exercise that better suits you. Diversifying your workout can also keep it fun and reduce the risk of overuse injuries.

Committing to a regular exercise regimen can improve the length and quality of your life, no matter what age you decide to become active. Even if you've already experienced a cardiac event, it's not too late to take control of your heart health





Guzzo jump-starts organizational transformation for Cultural Center

The Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach (CCPVB) is on a mission to reinvent itself, and new Executive Director Donna Guzzo isn't wasting any time to initiate that transformation.

"We're hitting the ground fast," said Guzzo, who was appointed to her leadership role Jan. 29. "There's no time to sit around and think about it."

Just two months into her tenure, Guzzo has changed the structure of the Cultural Center's sponsorships. No longer does the Ponte Vedra institution seek sponsorships for single events. Instead, CCPVB offers yearlong sponsorships that incorporate several events, programming, exhibitions and the organization's Sound Connections music therapy outreach program for children with special needs. As a result, Guzzo said donors are now receiving more benefits, and loving it.

"I listen to their (the donors') objectives," said Guzzo, who was previously the Cultural Center's director of development and has 25 years of experience working in nonprofits. "At the end of the day, it's a business transaction, and they want a return on investment. I run this like a business."

The new executive director is additionally leading the charge to reconstruct the organization's programming. The Cultural Center's board of directors, she said, hired an Atlanta-based company to conduct a feasibility study on the organization in November/December, and that study revealed challenges in the programming department. Guzzo explained that the center is mostly seen as a place for infants, toddlers and seniors, with a considerable gap in between those generations.

As a result, Guzzo has hired a new program manager,

Catherine Tatem, to address the age gap and expand the Cultural Center's arts offerings. Guzzo said the organization is looking into providing more culinary arts, wine tastings, meditation and yoga to do so.

New headquarters

As the Cultural Center's programming expands, Guzzo also has her eye on another expansion. She's leading the organization as it embarks on a multimillion-dollar capital campaign for construction of a larger headquarters.

As of now, the Cultural Center is planning to build a 15,000 square-foot building with two stories and 135 parking space on the land along A1A between Sawgrass Village and the Summer House condos, said Guzzo. That location, however, is currently a parcel of the Oak Bridge Club, and its development is contingent upon the St. Johns County Commission's final vote on development plans slated for a portion of the club's property, which is expected within the next few months.

"Right now, we're waiting for the commissioners' vote," said Guzzo, who expressed optimism about the plans ultimately being supported by the commission. "As soon as that vote happens, it will open the doors for us to move forward."

In the meantime, Guzzo said the Cultural Center's architect has designed a rendering of the building, which would also feature a rooftop for parties, studios that artists can rent and enough space for the center to double its programming.

"This is what the elite residents of Ponte Vedra need," said Guzzo.

If the county votes to support development of the Oak Bridge Club property, Guzzo said construction would begin by the end of this year, with completion estimated for

2020. She noted that the organization has already gained significant traction with donors for the project, which Guzzo said would cost about \$7 million.

Establishing a clear identity

Through the organization's changes, however, Guzzo simultaneously wants to ensure the identity of the Cultural Center is clear. She said questions have been raised about the organization's focus, and one of her primary goals is to refine that scope.

"This is an arts education center," said Guzzo. "The focus is on education, and of course with that, our outreach program (Sound Connections) that is already in four schools."

In clarifying the organization's identity, Guzzo said it must always tie back to the center's mission to "bring the arts into the life of the community" through arts education, exhibits and outreach, and with a donor driven philosophy.

For Guzzo, the opportunity to lead the Cultural Center through this overall process and its upcoming changes is an honor, as well as a joy.

"It doesn't feel like work," she said. "It's fun for me, and I tell everybody it's a dream job."

The Symphony will present "EarShot" April 20 at 8 p.m. at Jacoby Symphony Hall. Led by Music Director Courtney Lewis, the performance will be the culmination of a series of private readings, feedback sessions and work with mentor composers Courtney Bryan, Marcos Balter and Steven Mackey.

"Earshot" enables connections between orchestras and emerging composers. Drawing from a national network of advisors and advocates, "EarShot" works with orchestras around the country to identify and support promising composers in the early stages of their careers. Orchestras have relied on "EarShot" to advise them on commissions, competitions and program design in addition to identifying composers consistent with the orchestra's artistic vision.

"EarShot" residencies include established composer mentorship, orchestra readings and musician and conductor

feedback sessions, and are customized to the orchestra's aesthetic and/or demographic interests and community and education activities.

Written by American composer John Luther Adams, "Become Ocean" will be performed April 22 at 3 p.m. at Jacoby Symphony Hall. The show was commissioned by the Seattle Symphony and premiered in Benaroya Hall in 2013; it won the Pulitzer Prize for Music as well as the 2015 Grammy Award for Best Classical Contemporary Composition.

Despite being inspired by the oceans of Alaska and the Pacific Northwest, Adams originally wrote the piece while surrounded by desert. The performance will be bookended by a presentation with Dr. Quinton White from Jacksonville University and a panel featuring Dr. Jim Gelsleichter, coastal biology program director at University of North Florida, Lisa Rinaman from the St. Johns Riverkeeper and St. Augustine Mayor Nancy Shaver.

Timing: It's important in comedy, and arguably more essential during retirement!

Have you ever heard of the eyebrow-raising concept that has been dubbed the "sequence of returns risk?" It sounds complex, but it really isn't.

Sequence of returns risk has to do

with the order in which your investment returns occur during the distribution phase of your investment portfolio. Essentially, sequence of returns risk can be summed up by saying that your earliest retirement years will define your later years. Still confused? How about this? Author Tony Robbins stated in his book, "MONEY Master the Game: 7 Simple Steps to Financial Freedom," that if you suffer investment losses in your early years of retirement, which is entirely a matter of luck, your odds of making it the distance have fallen.

Yep, it is a fact: When one begins to take withdrawals from their portfolio, the timing of good and bad years is everything. In other words, will the stock and bond market be in an upward or downward cycle when it's time to turn on your income spigot? According to Robbins, if someone retired in the mid-1990s, he could have been a "happy camper." If he retired in the mid-2000s, he may have been a "homeless camper." As you can see, deciding when to begin taking income from your portfolio is perhaps akin to a lottery or luck of the draw.

Perhaps Mr. Robbins' simple example will allow you to get a better grasp on the issue in question. For instance, although



the following two phrases, "John bit the dog" and "The dog bit John," have the same four words, when arranged in a different sequence, they have an entirely different meaning! Please hang with me, as this stuff gets significantly more noteworthy. In fact, when I am finished with this dispatch, I suggest that you might utter something analogous to the iconic phrase from legendary John McEnroe, "You can't be serious!"

Before moving forward, please understand that the sequence of returns risk only applies when there is cash flow out of your portfolio. I suggest the best way to understand sequence of returns risk is with an example. (This information is hypothetical and is provided for informational purposes only. It is not intended to represent any specific return, yield or investment, nor is it indicative of future results.)

John and Jane earn the same "average" annual return of returns during a 20-year period of 7 percent. Keep in mind that "average" is simply total return divided by the number of years. In this scenario, regardless of how the returns are distributed during the accumulation phase, the average return is

140 percent divided by 20 or 7 percent a year.

Okay, back to John and Jane. Both make annual withdrawals that start at \$50,000 and increase 3 percent a year. However, the sequence of returns (performance) during the distribution phase for Jane is rising in the early years and declining in the latter years while John's returns did essentially the opposite. If you don't think timing is critical during the distribution phase, think again!

John never recovers from early losses and runs out of money by year 19. Yep, John has portfolio ruin and is old and broke while Jane has \$1.7 million after 20 years! This, my friend, is what is known as sequence of returns risk. Two folks, same amount for retirement, same withdrawal strategy. One is old and broke - not a good combination — while the other has some serious Benjamins! The foregoing sentence is worth reading a second time, and a third and a fourth. It is worth reading aloud! As much as everyone is entitled to his/her own opinion, nobody is entitled to his/her own facts! Okay, deep breath. Or loud scream!

options. Leaf & Bean is unique, Raiti said, because it has received a United States Department of Agriculture [USDA] organic certification.

"I have a lot more appreciation for those people who follow [USDA] guidelines," she said. "The seal itself is not easy to get. For us, I think it took us two years at least in order to get it."

To get a USDA organic seal, Raiti said her restaurant had to use certain ingredients that coincide with specific guidelines.

According to Raiti, another unique attribute of House of Leaf & Bean is that it's a community-oriented restaurant.

"I want to give back to the community," she added. "We also need the community to help us, so we need the community, the community needs us. We put our heart and soul to make everything we put on the table."

Additionally, Raiti noted that she values quality and health benefits over her bottom line. For example, Raiti decided to offer hand-made dumplings on her menu despite the required labor cost because they taste better than dumplings made from a machine.

"This is how you can imagine the decisionmaking process," she said. "It's about the health benefits, not about money or profit."
