


St. Johns County Pet Center






Officials share accomplishments, insight at Chamber breakfast

Safety and security, the economy and hurricane recovery were among the topics discussed by officials at the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce Politics in St. Johns Legislative Update on March 23.

Congressman John Rutherford, state Sen. Travis Hutson, state Rep. Cyndi Stevenson, state Rep. Paul Renner and St. Johns County Commission Chair Henry Dean addressed these issues, and several others, with business leaders from across the county at the event held at the Renaissance in World Golf Village. The update served as an opportunity for attendees to hear from state officials after the Florida legislature recently adjourned its annual session.

First, Rutherford focused on the economy, national security and infrastructure. The District 4 representative noted that Congress has extensively utilized the Congressional Review Act (CRA), which allows Congress to pull any regulatory recommendation back within a specific timeframe. In fact, he said Congress used the CRA process 15 times within the first six months and pulled \$4.5 billion out of the economy in regulatory changes.

Rutherford also discussed Congress' efforts to "plus up" the military, citing the \$700 billion military budget it recently approved. Among several other issues, Rutherford said he's working with FEMA and the Florida Division of Emergency Management to address beach renourishment.

Hutson followed Rutherford and discussed higher education and school safety. He spoke about the state's Bright Futures Scholarship, which will now

provide students with 100 percent tuition reimbursement if they qualify. Students can also qualify for tuition reimbursement of 75 percent.

Concerning safety, Hutson addressed what he called the "Parkland bill," or Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, which was signed into law by Gov. Rick Scott on March 9. He noted that those who threaten danger in a school setting will now be charged with a second-degree felony, with a maximum sentence of 15 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Hutson added that funding is included in the legislation for metal detectors, single points of entry and better surveillance equipment, as well as mental health. In addition, the state senator addressed what he called the "Marshall Program," which allows certain school faculty/staff to be armed, provided that they complete 144

hours of training with the local sheriff's department, mental health evaluations, active shooter drills and other requirements. The only time these individuals would be allowed to pull the firearm out of the holster, Hutson said, is if someone said, "active shooter or active threat."

Hutson also noted that the legislation requires all individuals purchasing firearms from a licensed gun dealer to be 21 years old. The state senator noted that individuals under 21 can still purchase firearms via private transactions, such as at a gun show.

Renner addressed the state's tax package for this year. He noted that the legislature reduced the tax on business rent from 5.8 percent to 5.7 percent, which equates to \$27 million of savings per year.

Renner said the legislature implemented a change that allows those who lost their homes from Hurricanes Matthew and Irma to receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit. A disaster preparedness holiday was also added to allow individuals to prepare for storms, and sales tax exemptions were made available for farmers whose property is damaged from a storm.

Stevenson addressed several miscellaneous budgetary items. She said \$1 billion was budgeted for mental health and substance abuse, outside of what was allocated following the Parkland shooting. The state representative also said the budget provides \$65 million to support Florida's fight against the Opioid epidemic, as well as \$6 million to expand services for victims of human trafficking.

On a more local level, Stevenson said \$450,000 was invested to repair the breach at Summer Haven in St. Augustine, and 100 percent funding was approved for the expansion of the sanitary sewer in West Augustine. In general, she said \$62 million was allocated for beach restoration across the state.

Dean wrapped up the morning by discussing hurricane recovery and economic development. He said the county went through two Christmas holidays without receiving one dollar from FEMA. However, thanks to a recent letter from Hutson to Gov. Scott, the county recently received its first \$1 million, and the money is still coming, Dean said.

The county commissioner also called 2017 "gangbusters" in respect to economic development, citing the PGA Tour's decision to build a new worldwide headquarters in Ponte Vedra Beach.

"We're on the right track to move this county ahead even further in respect to economic development and business growth," said Dean.

Coming to America: Locals discuss solutions to national immigration issues

The long-standing issue of illegal immigration has been a controversial topic throughout the United States for decades, often driving a wedge between those who view the subject from different sides of the political aisle. On Thursday, March 22, however, Jacksonville-area residents met at Palms Presbyterian Church in Jacksonville Beach to share their personal perspectives on the issue through civil and constructive discourse, exploring the pros and cons of three possible paths forward.

The first path discussed was that of total amnesty for illegal immigrants, offering them all a path to legal status. While undoubtedly the most lenient solution for

illegal immigrants, to many at the meeting, one of the biggest drawbacks of such a path would be its inherent unfairness to those who either already have or are still waiting to move here legally.

"Some people have been in the immigration system for 20 years, and somebody just gets to run across a line and we say it's OK?" asked Ruthie Smathers, a member of Palms Presbyterian. "I don't think that's fair."

Others, however, felt more conflicted on the issue, pointing out that many illegal immigrants have spent most of their lives here.

"It's such a delicate decision," said Myrna Cook, who hails from California. "Who's going to decide who's worthy?

The woman who's been here for 30 years, working illegally, who's had children, husband, church, job. Is that person less likely to be a good citizen than a person who's been on the waiting list for 20 years? Who can decide and what's the criteria?"

The second path presented was the exact opposite of the first, proposing strict

enforcement of immigration laws, including the identification and deportation of all illegal immigrants.

"Impossible," Ann Weisz remarked regarding the idea of mass-scale deportation. "It's 11 million people. That's impossible."

Klauk uses life's challenges to help others

Former professional golfer Jeff Klauk is determined to not let the adversity he has faced in life slow him down. Instead, the longtime Ponte Vedra resident is motivated to use his challenges to help others.

Klauk, who played on both the Web.com Tour and PGA Tour, has lived with Epilepsy since 2006. The neurological disorder characterized by unpredictable seizures changed his life, disrupted his successful golf career and has resulted him having brain surgery, with the most recent operation taking place in December 2017.

"They went in on the right side of the brain," said Klauk about the craniotomy. "That's where they think the seizures are coming from."

Now four months after the surgery, the former golfer is yet to have experienced a seizure and is channeling his experiences toward a cause that is close to his heart: the second annual Athletes vs. Epilepsy 1 Million Dollar Shootout.

Coming up this Monday, April 9 at The Palencia Club, Klauk's charity golf tournament raises funds and awareness for the Epilepsy Foundation's mission to overcome the challenges of living with the neuro-disorder, and to accelerate therapies to stop seizures, find cures and save lives. Last year, the event raised almost \$75,000 and included about 120 participants.

According to Klauk, the tournament will feature nine par-3 holes and nine regulation holes. Each par-3 will feature a \$10,000 hole-in-one contest, and the golfers closest to the pin on the par-3 holes will qualify for the \$1 million shootout at Palencia's 18th hole. Other activities include pre-event putting contests for tickets to the Masters and a lunch and awards reception. The event will commence at 1 p.m. with a shotgun start

Registration for the charity event is still open online at Athletesvsepilepsygolf.com. (More information can be found there as well.) An individual golfer can register for \$400, and a five-person team can do so for \$1,900. Sponsorship opportunities are also still available, and donations are encouraged by those who cannot attend.

"I'm looking forward to this year's event," said Klauk, who now works for Perfect Golf Event in Ponte Vedra Beach. "I want to try to have a great event and raise as much money as we can and help others out."

PZA meeting to cover Oak Tree development, medical marijuana

The next St. Johns County Planning and Zoning Agency (PZA) meeting on Thursday, April 5 features a zoning request for a new development in St. Johns County, as well as further discussion on the county's proposed ban of medical marijuana dispensaries.

The request is to rezone approximately 38 acres of land from Open Rural to Planned Unit Development to allow for a future 63-unit, single-family home subdivision called Oak Tree, located east of US Highway 1

North with access provided from Gun Club Road.

Also slated for the PZA meeting, Paolo Soria, the assistant county attorney for St. Johns County, will present a Land Development Code amendment regarding the county's proposed ban on medical marijuana treatment center dispensing facilities. The ban does not impact the cultivating, process or delivery of medical marijuana in St. Johns County to licensed individuals who need the substance for medical reasons.

On Feb. 20, the Board of County Commissioners voted to begin the process of permanently banning medical marijuana dispensaries in the unincorporated area of St. Johns County. At the April 5 PZA meeting, the Board will either recommend to approve or deny the Land Development Code amendment to ban Medical Marijuana Treatment Center (MMTC) Dispensing Facilities.

The meeting will take place in the County Auditorium at the St. Johns County Administrative Complex, located at 500 San Sebastian View in St. Augustine. The meeting is open to the public.

Testasecca named School-Related Employee of the Year by SJCSD

Miriam Testasecca, the executive secretary for the School Board of the St. Johns County School District (SJCSD), has been named the SJCSD 2018 School-Related Employee of the Year (SREY).

Testasecca's selection was announced by Superintendent Tim Forson at the SREY reception held March 15 at the World Golf Hall of Fame Museum. She was selected from 44 nominees for her exemplary job performance, dedication, interpersonal skills, leadership ability, training and contributions to the school district and the community.

Testasecca has been employed as the school board's executive secretary for six years and has 17 years overall with the school district. She serves all five board members with varied requirements and expectations, and her organizational skills enable her to handle multiple tasks of differing levels of complexity. She is also the bookkeeper for 19 internal district accounts and has never had a deficiency noted in an audit of those accounts.

"Mrs. Testasecca is totally responsive and supportive to our needs as a school board, and as individual board members," School Board Chair Bill Mignon said. "She helps to keep us all on track and the service she provides is invaluable. Her loyalty and commitment to the school district and the community is a reflection of her steadfast dedication."

In addition, Testasecca has been mentoring two students for the past four years and is also the district office wellness coordinator. She has volunteered her time to run exercise and weight loss programs for district employees and is active with fundraising projects for the district's ASSIST program and The Shriner's Hospital for Children.

Testasecca's name and information packet has been forwarded to the Florida Department of Education as SJCSD's representative and for consideration as the SREY representative at the state level.

Others also expressed concern over possible abuses of power by the authorities while conducting their investigations, as well as the potential hampering of law enforcement due to an increased fear among illegal immigrants, making them less likely to report other crimes.

The question of whether federal funding should be denied to "sanctuary cities," cities that grant asylum to illegal immigrants, was also raised, with many voicing support for such a measure.

"I don't think people should be allowed to break the law on top of a law that's

already being broken," Smathers said.
"We should try to create a better system, because the impression that leaves on society is that it's OK to break the law."

The final course of action discussed was one of compromise, both recognizing the contributions of immigrants to American culture and history, but also acknowledging that the current system is broken and imposes a burden on society. This path would moderate the flow of immigrants entering the country – both legal and illegal – and focus on strengthening the bonds among American citizens, regaining the national sense of identity and helping newcomers to assimilate into that identity.

For some, assimilation was their primary concern.

"Immigration, for our country right now, it's such a central focus," said Suneeta Chanan-Khan, who is herself a legal immigrant from Pakistan. "I love the fact that it gives us the opportunity to dip into the global pool of intelligence, and energy, and art and all the wonderful things that are part of human society, but my biggest concern is a preservation of the culture, which is what attracts immigrants to begin with."

Others at the meeting, however, felt it was more important that Americans spend more time learning about other cultures.

"I truly feel that Americans need to learn another language; they need to study it in school," said Nancy Caulfield, who spent years abroad working for the U.S. Department of State. "There are so many people who've immigrated and people throughout the world who speak English and another language. Americans are going to fall behind because they can't compete, because they expect everybody can speak English."

Although multiple different views were shared throughout the course of the meeting, many attendees left with a sense of optimism for the United States' ability to find a reasonable and practical solution.

"I think there are ways that this can be done in a very positive manner, but as you have all said, it's a mess right now," said Betty Engle. "We all just need to search for and seek out new ways of dealing with it." Laura Morey is a public relations professional, founder of SimpleSolutionsDiva.com, actor and Ponte Vedra resident.

As the host, I present simple how-to videos to make life easier, whether it is a simple recipe, a DIY project or just a great idea for organizing. I host, film and edit every video, and the majority of videos are filmed in and around my home. I'm self-taught, so it is interesting to see the quality of the videos change over the years.

My acting agent asked me to create a website to show off my home shopping channel demonstration skills. As a self-described "Domestic Diva," I was always looking for ways to do things at home that saved me time and energy. It just seemed to be a natural step to create something about making things easy around the home for others!

What's your best advice for people who are trying to simplify their lives?

For me, life is all about spending quality time with my family, so that is what drives me to find creative ways to do things simply. When you simplify your life – reducing clutter in the home, streamlining a recipe so it takes less time to make - you are creating space for what is important to you. So, my best advice for simplifying anything in your life is to find what is blocking you, negatively distracting you or holding you back from doing what you really enjoy and tackle that in a manageable timeframe. Maybe it is the pile of junk sitting on your desk that gives you anxiety, or your cleaning chores that really need to get done, but it isn't your favorite thing to do. Break up the project in small bites.

As an example, one of the most difficult things for me to do on Simple Solutions Diva was a video series called "Clear The Clutter." I teamed up with a professional organizer and we tackled my VERY cluttered crafts closet. I was so surprised how upset I was during the process. Once I finished the project, I couldn't believe how much lighter I felt afterwards. It made me realize how important it is to keep things simple.

I think Ponte Vedra has that great, small town feel, where you know so many people. When I was growing up, my family moved every few years for my father's job. The idea of my children living in the same town for most of their childhood was important to me.

I love how people get involved in Ponte Vedra – we aren't afraid to spearhead volunteer projects, get involved with our schools or come together to support our community and our neighbors. In Sawmill Lakes, my neighbors and I created several community events 18 years ago and it is fantastic to see them still going strong! Our annual Sawmill Lakes July Fourth Bike Parade and our Easter Egg Hunt are great

memory-making events for our children.

And Ponte Vedra is constantly evolving and growing, so it has been fun to see it change over the last 18 years.

What do you like to do in your free time?

I love to garden in my back yard – I think I, personally, might keep Ace Hardware in Ponte Vedra in business! My husband and I also enjoy travel, something he jokingly calls the annual "Keep The Love Alive Tour." At this point, I think my husband could have a second career as a travel planner!

Discussion at the event included the Mission House \$1 million endowment goal that is currently at \$659,000 in pledges and gifts.



at the La Universite' Libre de La Sorbonne in Paris. She traveled extensively in all of Europe, Russia, North Africa and South America, and had a great curiosity of the culture and history of other countries. In 1993, His Majesty King Juan Carlos I of Spain bestowed on her the Medal of "Dama del Merito Civil." She was responsible for bringing the Columbus Caravels, "La Santa Maria, La Pinta and La Niña," to St. Augustine through her longtime acquaintances with the Spanish royal family and the Spanish ambassador, His Excellency Jaime de Ojeda. She was vice chair (1988 to 1993) and chairman (1989-1992) of the International Committee of the Columbus Hemispheric Florida State Commission; from 1989 to 1993, she was vice chairman for Spanish Affairs of the St. Augustine/St. Johns County Columbus Commission: she was also a trustee and served as secretary/treasurer of the Historical St. Augustine Preservation Board in 1989. She authored several books, which she donated to several universities, libraries and schools. She also wrote several articles promoting the Spanish heritage, the founding of St. Augustine and Spain's contributions to the United States. She was a member of the Commission, El Presidio de San Augustine from 1998 through December 2000,



and her contributions in promoting the Spanish heritage and founding of St. Augustine were recognized by the City of St. Augustine and St. Johns County.

She was a member of, and active in, Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church and served on the council of the church from 1988 to 2010, wherein she resigned due to failing health.

At the request of the Consul General of Spain in 1990, she founded and was president of the Florida Order of Granaderos and Damas de Galvez and founded the St. Augustine/Jacksonville chapters. She was Damas President of the Jacksonville Chapter until 2005 and continued to work very hard on the educational committee, which sponsors a scholarship at the University of North Florida.

She was chairman of United Fund of Ponte Vedra and St. Augustine area from 1964 to 1966.

She was a trustee of the Board of Directors of the Museum of Science and History from 1982 to 1985. She was also one of the founding members of the Women's Board of the Jacksonville Wolfson Children's Hospital in 1976 and was also on the Women's Board of the Jacksonville Art Museum.

Since the 1960s, she was on the board of the Jacksonville Symphony Guild and was vice president and coordinator of the Symphony Association activities from 1968 to 1987. She was a volunteer of Beaches Hospital Auxiliary from 1972 to 1978 and was on the Cummer Gallery Counsul from 1983 to 1987. She was on the board of trustees and co-founder of the Ponte Vedra Beaches Cancer Unit, and served as treasurer in 1987, vice president in 1988 and on the executive committee until 1998. She was co-founder of BRASS, Ponte Vedra Beach.

She was a member (2002-2008) of the Modern Art Council of MOCA-Jacksonville, a member (1999-present) of the



Ponte Vedra native sets out to produce kids theater camps for second consecutive year

Emily Suarez, a Ponte Vedra Beach native, is organizing a series of theater camps for kids in Jacksonville this summer for the second consecutive year.

Suarez grew up near PVPV-Rawlings Elementary School and graduated from the Douglas Anderson School of the Arts. Now, she is a sophomore at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, and working with other college theater students to produce camps held at the 5 & Dime theater in Downtown Jacksonville. The group of camp counselors refers to itself as Shortstack Theatre Company, and its mission is to teach the next generation of budding, local stars.

Among the enhancements slated for this summer's camps, said Suarez, is an increase in the number of weeks offered to kids. This year, the Shortstack team is holding five weeks of camps, compared to three last year. After receiving feedback from campers and parents, the group will now offer two weeks of the Flapjacks Theatre Camp for the youngest participants (ages 5-10) and two weeks of the Silver Dollar Musical Theatre Camp for rising sixth to 10th graders. In addition, the Shortstack team is refocusing the Hotcakes Acting Camp — also for rising sixth to 10th graders — so that it is more improv-based.

"We really just were able to take what we did last year and find all the feedback we could and make them better and more fun and see what more we could offer them," said Suarez.

The Flapjacks Theatre Camp will be held July 2-6 and July 30 to August 3. The group's most popular camp, Suarez

said Flapjacks provides participants with exposure to theater and focuses on story-telling via the use of crafts and games.

Scheduled for July 9-13, the Hotcakes Acting Camp also incorporates games, said Suarez, but instead the camp focuses on quick thinking, becoming comfortable with impulses and following them. The improv-based camp concludes with a "Whose Line Is It Anyway"-style showcase.

The musical theatre camp, which will be held July 16-27, allows participants to participate in several group numbers, or solos if they're interested. Suarez said a choreographer comes into the camp and teaches the group a big dance number.

Each camp includes about 12 to 20 kids, noted Suarez, and varies in cost

from \$200 for the Flapjacks and Hotcakes camps, to \$425 for the Silver Dollar Musical Theatre Camp. In addition to the Ponte Vedra native, the camp counselors include five other college students enrolled in theater-related programs across the country.

Suarez encourages those in the Beaches community to look into the Shortstack camps, even if they are located far from their homes.

"I know parents can gravitate towards not driving their kids 30 minutes away to go to camp," she said. "I always like to push that it's worth it. ... For me, camps are what sparked me doing this for the rest of my life and finding what I love to do."

Tips for helping kids find a hobby that's right for them

Much like adults can benefit from participating in hobbies, children can reap rewards from engaging in hobbies.

According to the Child Development Institute (CDI), hobbies give children a chance to express themselves. The CDI also notes that hobbies can play an important role in children's self-discovery and boost their self-esteem.

Some children may discover hobbies on their own, requiring little if any assistance on the part of their parents. For example, some kids may display an interest in music that parents, even those with no such musical inclination, can foster by purchasing certain instruments. But some children may need a little more prompting, and parents of such boys and girls can take certain steps to help their youngsters find rewarding hobbies.

- Involve kids in your own hobbies. Kids look up to their parents and often want to emulate what their mothers and fathers do. If possible, involve children in your own hobbies. Gardeners can teach their youngsters how to grow and tend to a garden, while painters can host family painting nights where everyone is encouraged to create their own masterpiece. Parents whose hobbies are more adult-oriented, like woodworking, can still involve their children. For example, work with children to design a new item, then show them how the item goes from paper to finished product; just avoid allowing them to use any unsafe tools or machines.
- Let kids choose an activity. While some children might take to hobbies their parents favor, others might need to be given some freedom to find their own activities. Afford youngsters this chance, recognizing that it might take some time before kids find an activity that genuinely sparks their passion.
- Be a source of encouragement. Some hobbies may prove more difficult than kids first imagined, requiring some perseverance before they can be enjoyed fully. In such instances, observe youngsters while they engage in the activity. If they appear to be enjoying themselves but are periodically frustrated, encourage them to keep trying. If kids appear to be disinterested in overcoming any struggles, then they might benefit by pursuing another hobby.
- Don't hesitate to focus on fun. Hobbies can teach kids valuable lessons and provide a sense of fulfillment, but it's important that parents not overlook the importance of fun in regard to their children's hobbies. Hobbies can provide children with the same respite from busy schedules that they do adults, and that break should be as fun as possible.

JCDS students bring Ancient Greece back to life

Students at Jacksonville Country Day School (JCDS) recently competed in field games such as relays and tug of war as part of the school's Greek Olympics.

For over 20 years, the event has been a signature tradition for sixth grade students at the school, helping them retain information that was taught in the classroom, as well as promoting healthy activity and teamwork.

The Greek Olympics are just one part of the culminating experience for the sixth-grade study of Ancient Greece. This year, students also learned Greek dancing, in addition to the traditional "Gods and Goddesses" feast of Greek food that featured food made by parents.

"JCDS families are the best," said sixth grade lead teacher Nancy Hockenbery. "They share their rich culture, including food, stories and even dancing. This helps to bring the experiences alive for our students. We also had a debate between 'Athens' and 'Sparta,' which was a new activity this year."

The culminating day for the students' study of Ancient Greece brings the events that happened so long ago to life.

"Music, theater, art, philosophy, architecture, the sciences and math can all be traced to Ancient Greece, which was also the birthplace of democracy," Hockenbery added

The students have been studying Ancient Greece throughout the school year from a variety of angles, including art, language arts, physical education and even in the library and lunchroom.

"The requirement to dress in authentic costumes, coupled with the physical activities, is appealing to sixth graders and makes learning fun," said Head of School Pat Walker. "The Greek Olympics are a much-loved tradition at JCDS and another example of the creative ways teachers engage students to optimize learning."

Consider these steps to encourage your kids to volunteer

Volunteering benefits people of all ages but can be especially beneficial to children.

In a review of 60 studies on child engagement, Child Trends found that children who participate in civic engagement programs are likely to be more involved in school, to graduate from high school and to hold more positive civic attitudes than those who do not get involved in such programs.

Getting kids to volunteer as they progress through adolescence may not be so difficult. In its 2014 analysis of volunteering trends, Child Trends found that 39 percent of 12th grade students volunteered at least once a month in 2014 compared to just 27 percent of eighth graders.

Older students might feel compelled to volunteer to improve their college admissions applications, but parents can take steps to get their younger children excited about the prospect of volunteering.

- Set a positive example. Young children want to emulate their parents, so moms and dads who volunteer may find ready and willing partners in their children. Parents can inform their children when they volunteer and why they do so before bringing kids along to join them.
- Don't forget fun. Young children may be more likely to embrace volunteering if the activity is fun. Kids might not find it too fun to sit next to their parents while mom and dad balance a soup kitchen's books, but a beach cleanup excursion or a trip to refurbish an inner-city park may inspire kids to spend a lifetime giving back to their communities and helping the less fortunate.
- Keep it simple. Kids may not enjoy volunteering activities that consume too much time or make them feel exhausted. As kids grow older, parents can encourage them to embrace more challenging activities and/or commit more time to volunteering. But keep things simple with especially young children or older children who have never before volunteered.
- Try and try again. It might take some trial and error before parents find volunteering opportunities their children truly enjoy. When volunteering with children for the first time, be careful not to commit to more than one day. If children enjoy themselves, then parents can commit more time. If kids do not seem excited by an activity, parents won't feel guilty or let the charity down by not returning.



Tips on preparing for summer camps





How long will my savings have to last in retirement?

One of the issues discussed frequently when completing a retirement planning session with a client is how long one expects to live.

Now, we all recognize that our life spans are not totally in our control. While we can extend the

length of time we are likely to live by practicing healthy lifestyles, that is not a guarantee that we will live longer. Conversely, we see people every day who live very long lives yet not in a particularly healthy way. So, the question remains: How long should I assume my savings would have to last in retirement?

There are several ways to address this conundrum:

- 1. You can assume you will live to 100 and develop a savings accumulation and distribution strategy to support that assumption. This is the most conservative approach, since very few people live to 100 or more, so it is likely to generate the largest asset transfer to heirs but also requires the largest pre-retirement funding.
- 2. You can assume you will live approximately seven years beyond the life spans of your parents, which is the rate that each generation is exceeding the previous generation on average, and plan your accumulation and distribution strategy accordingly. This is a less conservative approach than the age 100 idea; thus it will likely produce a smaller wealth transfer to heirs at death and require less preretirement funding.
- 3. Your independent financial fiduciary can project, using some of the latest planning software, your expected lifespan by factoring in your personal health status, family history, occupational and environmental factors and the age at which you expect to retire. This is a more sophisticated approach than the previous two. Yet there is not sufficient data to say with relative certainty that it will produce a more accurate result for the population at large.

Over the years, my position on this issue has consistently been to err on the side of assum-







ing longer life spans and planning accordingly. If you are correct, you will be less likely to run out of money in retirement, a situation we all wish to avoid. If you are wrong, your spouse or other heirs will simply inherit more money than was expected – not an entirely bad outcome. I hope this helps you think through this challenging issue.




