

Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation packs 4,100 bags of food for local children, families at 'Hope for the Holidays' event

The Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation partnered with the community last week to pack 4,100 bags of food for underprivileged kids and families in the greater Jacksonville area at the organization's seventh annual "Hope for the Holidays" event.

Held on Dec. 12 in the parking lots adjacent to the TPC Clubhouse, the event resulted in 30,000 pounds of food being donated to kids in need, with 32 schools in Duval and St. Johns counties receiving holiday bags of items including ham, mashed potatoes, stuffing, chicken broth, hot cocoa and more. The Ponte Vedra-based foundation packed bags for 3,705 students in the local Blessings in Backpack program, a nonprofit organization that provides consistent weekend nutrition for children on the federal free and reduced meal program.

"There's a lot of need," PGA Tour player and Ponte Vedra Beach resident Jim Furyk said. "There are a lot of kids who are food insecure in Jacksonville. Forty-one hundred bags are scratching the surface."

The foundation also donated food to children and families at the MaliVai Washington Youth Foundation, Daniel Kids, the Hubbard House, Community Hospice & Palliative Care's Community PedsCare program and the Sulzbacher Center.

The event's outcome continues to grow every year. In 2017, the foundation packed over 3,500 bags. In 2016, it was 3,000. When the foundation first held the event in 2011, the organization packed 500 bags. Because the number of bags has increased so dramatically, Tabitha Furyk said they didn't have much of a choice but to hold the event in the TPC parking lots. Not many other locations would have been able to fit all the food and volunteers, she said.

'What we're hoping that people realize is when they come and they realize our numbers are growing, they realize that the need is out there," Tabitha explained. "We're still not even making a dent in the number of families and children who need this food. So, hopefully when they come out and have this hands-on opportunity to give back, they realize hey this is something we need to take care of in Jacksonville.'

The event is a true community collaboration, as the foundation enlisted the support of CAA Sports, JAX Refrigeration, the Monique Burr Foundation for Children, Power Tee, TMM and TopGolf to set up the food at the event. The foundation also works with Feeding Northeast Florida, PepsiCo, Publix, Quaker and Target to fill the bags with food. Funds for the food and the event were raised during the annual Furyk & Friends Concert and Celebrity Golf Classic, as well as from online donations and in-kind donations from CSC Security, Republic Services, Ring Power, TPC Sawgrass and the chefs at NINETEEN, who



for the Holidays" for many years. She noted that she was part of the Blessings in a Backpack effort when it started in St. Johns County, so she's been impressed by the growth of the foundation's annual event. Overall, she said she's thankful to have the Furyks in the community.

"We are so blessed to have them," Kessler said. "I don't even know many of the things that they do, but I know that this event is so impactful for our community. And I'm really grateful that we have them around."

For the Furyks, the feeling is mutual about the community's support.

When all these families come out here," Tabitha said, "all of their kids, some people bring grandkids, and they look forward to doing it every year, it just completely warms your heart."

Local Girl Scouts troop uses Silver Award project to benefit area's refugee children

Chantal Mbiya and Badura Kiza love to dance. Chantal does ballet. Badura is into hip-hop and isn't afraid to show off her dance moves. The girls almost finish each other's sentences and were happy to share how they fared at their recent science fair — a first-place finish for Chantal and second-place for Badura. And, at just 11 years old, Chantal, a refugee from Rwanda, and Badura, a refugee from Burundi, are also trying to navigate the challenges of adjusting to a new country, new culture and a new way of life.

Tasked with finding a way to make a change for the betterment of their community, four Girl Scouts from Troop 27 in Ponte Vedra Beach wanted to make sure kids like Chantal and Badura continue to have what every kid deserves — to feel safe, to be happy and to have the skills and opportunity to succeed.

Alexis Magnano, Lindsey Blisko, Julia Peiris and Emily Rohan decided for their Girl Scouts Silver Award project they would assist area refugee students with much-needed school supplies, educational instruction and, as it turns out, genuine friendship.

What began as a community service project to fulfill their Silver Award requirement, however, became a full-fledged effort to help shape a better future for refugee children around the First Coast, and, eventually, around the country.

MOTIVATING FACTORS

The troop was initially inspired to help area refugee children after witnessing the work of JaxTHRIVE, a nonprofit, peer-facilitated teen mentoring program that assists refugee students and that was co-founded by Alexis' brother, Chase Magnano.

Through JaxTHRIVE, the troop members were also introduced to Kim's Open Door, an area nonprofit that works with local at-risk youth and offers programs focused on refugee children.

Alexis Magnano, an eighth-grader at Landrum Middle School, had been working with refugees for two to three years through World Relief, and saw the impact her brother's nonprofit and Kim's Open Door were having in the community. As government funding for refugee organizations continue to decline, the Troop 27 members saw a greater need in the community.

"If you work together and get enough people involved, then you can make a change," Alexis Magnano said. "I wanted to leave a positive imprint on my town."

All four of the girls sympathized with the need to help young refugee students acclimate and recognized the difficulty of the transition. Blisko noted that some of the students were afraid of fireworks during the holidays or frightened by Halloween costumes because they were unfamiliar experiences or because of what they had witnessed in the places they fled.

"Having to leave your home and coming to a new place that you're not familiar with, that has a different way of

doing things, is really scary," said Blisko, a ninth-grader at Bolles. "Some of them are used to being in a place where there's a lot of war and fighting. ... And I just wanted to help them and make them feel more accustomed to what we do here because it's really tough to have to leave your home, especially to go to a completely new place."

For Peiris, also a ninth-grader at Bolles, the project took on a personal component. Both of her parents are immigrants to the U.S., and helping younger kids acclimate to their new environment was particularly special.

"We went to JaxTHRIVE, and saw the refugee children, and for me, personally, it really touched me, and to hear their stories and see how we could help them," she said.

THE SILVER AWARD

The Silver Award is the highest award a Girl Scout cadette can earn. According to the Girl Scouts guidelines, the Silver Award "gives you the chance to show that you are a leader who is organized, determined and dedicated to improving your community."

To fulfil their project requirement, the four members of Troop 27 came up with CORE (Creating Opportunities for Reading and Empowerment), which focuses on helping refugee children in Northeast Florida obtain the necessary tools to succeed in their new environment.

"We came across the idea of doing a library, and then we wanted to incorporate getting them needed supplies, like schoolbooks, uniforms, etc.," Magnano said. "It was all really fun, but I liked seeing how they reacted to all the stuff, all the supplies they received. They were all so excited."

The troop organized book drives, partnered with other groups on donations drives and asked friends, family and community members for donations of clothing, backpacks and other school supplies. Rohan, also a Bolles ninthgrader, persuaded her Florida Stealth softball team to contribute to the project. The four girls also spent Saturdays mentoring and bonding with the refugee students.

"Seeing the kids grow and learn through our help was really inspiring," Rohan said.

The shared bond between the troop members and refugees was largely forged through reading.

"I like reading to them and teaching them the stories, because watching them learn the words is really cool," Peiris said. "I personally love reading, so sharing that love with them was really cool."

The troop also refurbished an old bookcase and created a mobile library to encourage more reading — and the escape from everyday life a good book can provide.

"Reading for me is a big thing, because it expands your vocabulary, you learn about things, and it's a way to relieve your stress, because with certain books you can travel, and feel like you're in the book and in a completely different place, and normally those are good places," Blisko said. "So, for them, it could be adventuring somewhere they can't go or haven't been."

TEACHING ... AND LEARNING

The refugee students weren't the only ones who benefited from the project. Although the troop members mentored and tutored the refugee students, they received valuable life lessons in return from the interaction.

"It's taught me that not everybody has the same backstory, and you don't really know what somebody's been through until you talk to them, although you still can't Major Tim Williford is the corps officer for the Salvation Army's St. Augustine Corps, which encompasses all of St. Johns County. He is also a member of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach Sunset.

Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

My parents are retired Salvation Army officers, so it was kind of like to me a "womb to tomb" type thing. They were officers when I was born. I grew up in the Salvation Army and then at age 19, I felt called to be a Salvation Army officer. I've been doing it ever since.

What are your primary roles and responsibilities with the Salvation Army?

On a weekday basis, I'm responsible for administration and making sure all the needs are met. For example, we do a food pantry, housing assistance, we pay utility bills. So, we have to make sure all those reports are due. We have a staff of about four or five, so I oversee them, I wind them up and I let them do their job.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

What a lot of people don't know is that the Salvation Army is actually a church. We are in 127 countries. So, I'm a Sunday morning preacher. I enjoy being able to preach on Sunday mornings, plan and program and lead my congregation in worship.

How can people help the Salvation Army's cause these last few days of the holiday season?

Money is always a good way. Many people think they should donate used clothing during times of disaster, when in fact, we're buying pallets of food that need to be prepared into 5,000 meals. That's not really a good time for us to have a bunch of used clothes. Most of the time, we wouldn't even have a place to store it anyway. So, money is always a good way to help the Salvation Army's mission throughout the year.

People are most familiar with the Salvation Army during the holidays. How can people help outside of this time of year?

There are always volunteering opportunities. We do feedings on a regular basis. We provide peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to a boys club every Wednesday. One day a month, we do Dining with Dignity feedings downtown. There are always volunteer opportunities. People can get in contact with our office or the office in Jacksonville to help out. Contact the St. Augustine Corps at (904) 824-6956.

What do you enjoy most about living in the area?

I love the beauty of it. I love driving up and down A1A and looking out at the ocean. I love coming across the Vilano Bridge at night and looking off to my right and seeing the St. Augustine Lighthouse. I love that it's still a very hometown, small-town type atmosphere. It's a place I feel safe. I moved here from Orlando, where it's hard to navigate and home to a lot of crime. So, I really like the openness and the beauty of all there is that we have here in Northeast Florida.



What do you like to do in your free time?

Probably one of my biggest passions is riding motorcycles. I currently have two Harley Davidson motorcycles. I have one that's a Cruiser and one that's a Bagger. I probably ride 10,000 to 15,000 miles a year.

Special Olympics Florida hosts Polar Plunge at Adventure Landing

One holiday tradition gaining traction in the least likely of places — the sunshine state of Florida — is the annual Polar Plunge.

Floridians, however, aren't as big of fans of cold water as they are of worthy causes, such as raising funds for Special Olympics athletes.

On Saturday, Dec. 15, participants dressed in everything from Christmasthemed onesies to pirate attire joined together to take the plunge in the chilly 60-degree wave pool at Adventure Landing's Shipwreck Island Water Park.

Overall, the event managed to exceed its goal of raising \$12,000. This year's campaign was the fourth to be held in Jacksonville and with the help of athletes and participants managed to raise \$13,316. Highlighting the fundraising efforts was Polar Plunge participant Finley Boerema with \$2,160.

The event isn't just about raising money, however. In addition to helping people with intellectual and developmental disabilities afford transportation, uniforms and accommodation while traveling for events, it brings the athletes closer to the community.

"So, what we like to do is have the community interact with the athletes at

really fully experience it," Blisko said.
"They could have been extremely stressed where they came from, but you want these kids to have a normal childhood, playing outside, hanging out with their friends, and learning is obviously a big part of it."

Said Rohan: "Going to Bolles, sometimes you don't often have to think about people going through those kind of struggles, and, for them, fleeing persecution and coming to a new country and not really knowing anything just really opened my eyes."

The project was aimed at increasing awareness of the plight of refugee children, including for the troop members involved.

"I think each one took something different away, but I think the main thing they took away was seeing how others live, and realizing it's a scary thing," troop leader Tiffany Blisko said. "Thinking about what if they had to leave their country and go to another one to learn their customs and their language and their educational system? So, I think that each one benefit=ed from that."

Dr. Camarda's Weekly Wealth Nugget **ESTATE TAX & ASSET PROTECTION OVERVIEW**

We are living in a very volatile financial environment. I see situations all the time where the financial security clients have worked all their lives to attain are threatened to be wiped out in a lawsuit. Unfortunately, our legal system provides little disincentive for people to sue when they believe they have been wronged, and there are many unscrupulous lawyers who encourage coercive litigation. While we used to have continuity in our taxing system, we now see "permanence" as being four years or less, and the tax increase pressures on our legislators will continue to grow with our increasing deficit and threatening inflation, especially as the Medicare and Social Security systems run out of money as projected. While the current estate tax exemption is \$5.45 million per person, to be adjusted for future inflation, we cannot guarantee that it will remain at that level, and do not recommend planning for it to remain there. The Democrats advocate a reduction in the exemption and an increase in the maximum transfer tax rates (generally, estate and gift taxes work in unison, and we refer to both as "transfer taxes"), as well as a new capital gains estate tax. If you are close to the current taxation level, in my view current planning should be focused primarily on keeping your taxable estates values from increasing beyond the tax free amount, which we call "freezing" the estate, with the option to build in additional planning should it appear that the exemption will be decreased. New regulations already on the books will make this much more difficult to accomplish. If you think you may be exposed, the time to begin is now. Email me at j@camarda.com for more





PVHS Ocean of Sound band makes history with fifth-place finish at FMBC state championships

The Ponte Vedra High School Ocean of Sound marching band made history on Nov. 17 with its best finish ever at the FMBC State Championship competition in Tampa.

Dazzling the crowd with its 2018 show, "The Mistress of All Evil," the Ocean of Sound was the only band in Northeast Florida to make it to state finals this year, ultimately placing fifth in Class 4A.

Preliminaries featured performances by 89 Florida bands, with only 15 bands (five from each class) progressing to finals at Tropicana Field later that day. This year was just Ponte Vedra's third year competing at the state championship, having placed ninth in 2017 and 12th in 2016.

"This year was a dream come true for this hard-working bunch of kids, and I'm pretty certain I blacked out for a moment when they announced we had made it to finals," Band Director Jermaine Reynolds said. "I'm so incredibly proud of how much this program has grown in such a short period of time. Our show this year featured some of the toughest music in the competition and we really pushed the kids both physically and as musicians. I promised them it would pay off, and it did."

Taking critiques from each regional competition during the season, the band pushed to perfect the show leading up to FMBC State Championships. The band defended their grand champion status at the Golden Eagle Classic and placed second at both the Echoes of Excellence and the First Coast Marching Invitational regional competitions earlier in the season, while honing the complicated music and visuals in preparation for the state championship.

"I was absolutely euphoric at state and so proud of everyone," senior Band Captain Hope Headrick said. "I can't believe that it was just my freshman year when there were less than 70 of us and we were marching in jeans. We've come a long way and I know all 27 seniors will miss this band family next year."

The Ocean of Sound is comprised of 107 musicians and 13 color guard. In his third year as PVHS band director, Reynolds acknowledged that the band's success is not only the result of a lot of hard work by his students, but also the contributions of the parents, his staff, the Band Boosters and the program's generous sponsors. The band's new marching season will begin in July of 2019.

North Florida Land Trust receives award from NE Florida Regional Council

North Florida Land Trust (NFLT) recently received the Environmental Stewardship Award from the Northeast Florida Regional Council.

The award was presented to Ponte Vedra resident and NFLT President Jim McCarthy and Associate Land Protection Director Rebecca Perry during the Regional Awards for Excellence ceremony at WJCT studios.

The Regional Award for Excellence in Environmental Stewardship is given each year to an individual or organization who focuses on long-term protection, conservation and enhancement of Northeast Florida's natural resources. NFLT was chosen for the work the organization has been doing in the Ocala to Osceola, or O2O, wildlife corridor, specifically the more than 2,500 acres they protected through the acquisition of two conservation easements.

"We are very proud of the land we have been able to conserve within this critical wildlife corridor, which not only keeps these thousands of acres free from high intensity development in perpetuity, but also protects Camp Blanding from the threat of encroaching development," McCarthy said. "We are honored to have been chosen for this designation and will continue to work closely with Camp Blanding to identify lands prime for conservation and important to protect the base. Our partnership is a combination of conservation, community relations, national security and economic development."

NFLT also recently took possession of 2,300 acres located near Lawtey that connects Camp Blanding to Jennings State Forest. The properties are also within the O2O wildlife corridor, a critical wildlife corridor that stretches from the Ocala National Forest to the Osceola National Forest. According to NFLT, the O2O corridor provides an important habitat for the Florida black bear and endangered species like the red-cockaded woodpecker, indigo snakes and gopher tortoises. There are numerous imperiled species and rare habitats within the O2O, per NFLT.



Local long-distance swimmer commemorates Tree of Life Synagogue victim with win at Senior Olympic Games

One of the last times Dr. Rebecca Ann Miles, 68, saw her primary care physician, Dr. Jerry Rabinowitz, he told her to stop putting off getting her eyes checked, handed her a business card and recommended she call the listed doctor.

"What's her name?" Miles asked.
"It's on the card," Rabinowitz said.
"... I can't read it," Miles responded.

Rabinowitz laughed. His laugh is highpitched and unusual, Miles said. It's one of those laughs that people cannot help but join in on. She misses it.

In October, Rabinowitz was one of 11 people fatally shot at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh.

In memory of his life, Miles, a longdistance swimmer who moved to St. Augustine from Pittsburgh a year ago, dedicated her recent bronze medal-winning performance in the 500-yard freestyle race of the Senior Olympic Games in Clearwater to the physician.

Miles, who trained for the age 65 to 69 competition at the Ponte Vedra YMCA, has won medals at other games before. She has competed in the Senior Games 11 times. This year, however, was her first in Florida and held different meaning following the events of October. Before she jumped into the pool on race day, she said under her breath, "This is for you Jerry."

Rabinowitz was known for his bowtie, wire glasses, small stature and affable nature. He hung pictures of cat comics in his patient room. The comics were mostly

from "The Far Side," which he placed on the walls to give his patients something to look at — especially when they were involved in a less than comfortable procedure. Both the doctor and his wife loved cats.

Rabinowitz was shot while praying. He was killed because Robert Gregory Bowers thought that the way that he and the others at the synagogue were praying was wrong.

In many ways, Pittsburgh and the people closest to the mass shooting are still recovering. It's hard to believe that a hate crime could occur in their city or on their street, Miles said.


"Fred Rogers' wife lived three blocks from there," Miles said about the site of the shooting. "I mean this is literally Mr. Rogers' neighborhood."

For 30 years, Rebecca Miles went to see

Rabinowitz every time she had an ache or rash from the pool. He always encouraged her training, telling her at one of their last visits to, "just keep swimming."

"He was just so sincere," Miles said.

"He was a very kind man, but very direct. He would always go over your blood work with you or if you gained and lost weight. If he wanted you to see a specialist and you hadn't done it yet — like he was always on me about getting my eyes checked — he would prompt you on these things. But he was never judgmental. He wasn't somebody who would say, 'Don't come back until (you've) seen the eye doctor or lost ten pounds.' He was very, 'Let's work at this together.' That was his attitude."

Rabinowitz was also known for being the doctor to go to when the HIV epidemic broke out. According to an article posted by CNN, Rabinowitz showed compassionate care when many doctors turned patients away.

"People forget this was a real guy; he saw real patients, he had a real life," Miles said. "He wasn't just a name in the paper."

SWIMMING WITH PURPOSE

While thinking about the devastation, Miles started training. In the past, she had used coaches and trainers to get her up

to speed and keep her driven. This year, she reflected on her shock and grief and decided to do something with it. Miles decided to incorporate Rabinowitz into her routine.

She wanted to make his passion for wellness and commitment to medicine her motivation. Many days, instead of stopping at a point when she was tired, she thought of his face and pushed on. Miles started hitting her old

time of 9:26, the time she won Maryland with three years ago. She pushed harder because when she wanted to get out of the pool, there was, "little Jerry in my head."

"I know it sounds kind of treacly, you know, to just say you're honoring someone," Miles said. "But it really was. It was something to say, 'You know Jerry, we talked about this. I'm doing this. And this is for you."

When Miles got in the pool on Sunday, Dec. 2, she reflected on Rabinowitz, accepted that she had trained hard and decided she would just do her best. She felt her doctor would have been pleased.

"I mean really, the first 150 you think you're dying," Miles joked. "You really think, okay, I'm going to die in the water. This is just how I'm going to end up ... The watery grave. I really got a second wind, (however), in the second half, but I didn't think it was enough."

When Miles finally came up, her husband told her she was in the 8s. Meaning, she shaved an entire 30 seconds off her time. In swimming the 500, 30 seconds might as well be a lifetime.

"I'm thinking, where did that time come from?" she asked. "I mean, yes, I trained for it ... But, seriously, where did that time come from?"

Miles completed her fastest time ever

this year with 8:51. She won bronze and credits her doctor and personal trainer.

"I mean, what do you do with that pain?" she asked. "It can just be like an undertow like you're in the ocean and swimming and it takes you down ... or you can do something with it. You make yourself stronger."

When Miles first heard the news that Rabinowitz was one of the 11 dead, she said

she didn't know how to handle her feelings. With a hate crime, she said, it seems helpless to try to combat the situation. She said she wanted to try to make him back into the person he was before the news and trial and everything surrounding it. She also said she didn't want to just simply write a check and move on. So, instead, she did exactly what he last told her to do. She kept swimming.

"That was Jerry," Miles said. "He genuinely wanted people to be healthy. That was his legacy. His life mattered."






