

Nease teacher uses math as tool to communicate with student after tragic accident

Olivia Love manages to bring out the best in people, even while in the hospital

eventeen-year-old Olivia Love is a bright, bubbly teenager and Nease High School student who has a tight friend group and changes her hair color almost every other week. She is the type of girl who loves the people around her and makes friends with her teachers. She has a warm smile and uses it, often.

On Jan. 2, Olivia Love was riding in a Yamaha 2 passenger golf cart with the driver and two other passengers on State Road 16. At some point while driving, she fell from the rear cargo area and struck her head on the asphalt. She suffered potentially life-threatening injuries from that fall. Just like that, a smart, vivacious girl's life took a turn in an entirely different direction

Currently, Love is learning how to speak again at the Shepherd Center in Atlanta. The clinic specializes in rehabilitation for people with acquired brain injuries and is one of the best in the county. Love is looking at a long, slow recovery. She will need multiple years of therapy to learn how to communicate and use her right leg. She will have to be taught how to understand language and form words all over again. Her sister, Danielle Love, has been posting regular updates about her condition on Instagram.

One thing that Danielle is sure to mention when speaking about positive outcomes is the wealth of support from the community. One such community member has stepped up to the plate in a way befitting of her position.

Kelli Gebauer is a math teacher at Nease High School.

She had gotten close with Olivia in geometry class and when she visited during "Excel" breaks to study in her room with friends. Gebauer is a school favorite; many students find her to be welcoming and stay at her class after hours. Enough so that she has earned the nickname, Mama G.

"You develop a better relationship with the kids, and you find out more about their personal lives," Gebauer said. "It got to the point where I'm kind of like a mother to my students. I am at that age now where they look at me like a mom, but not their mom. They will come to me and talk to me and ask me questions about their teenage problems."

Olivia's family owns a bagel shop, Bite a Bagel, in St. Augustine. Gebauer went there often and eventually found out the owners were her parents. Since that realization, she has been close with the entire family.

When she found out about Olivia's accident, she said it hurt her as if it were one of her own biological kids. She went to the hospital the very next day, and she has been back many times since.

"She is such a great girl and has such a great personality," Gebauer said. "Funloving and easygoing. Just a sweet, sweet, sunshiny kind of person. I wanted to be the connection for the students at school to be able to send something if they couldn't get out there."

A TEACHER TEACHES HER STUDENT

On Jan. 17, Gebauer went to the hospital in Orange Park where Olivia Love was recovering. She brought "get-well" cards and gifts from the students at Nease. Olivia laid on the bed as her mother, Kathleen Borsody, and Danielle were speaking with the neurologist.

At that time, her recovery involved trying to get her to follow commands to understand her condition. Although her responses were weak, her family had just received the news that her brain stem was unharmed and maybe other areas of her brain were not as badly affected as previously thought.

While the neurologist was reviewing Olivia's case with her mother and sister,

Gebauer occupied herself with Olivia.

"She likes to touch your hand because she was sort of getting that kinesthetic feeling back," Gebauer said. "She was touching my hand and playing with the rings on my finger. It wasn't my place to listen in to what her mom and the neurologist were speaking about and she kept touching my finger one at a time. I said to her, 'Well, do you want to count?' At that time, she could look at you and kind of stare at you, but they were saying she wasn't following any commands."

So, Gebauer just did what came naturally to her, she taught her student. Gebauer touched each one of Olivia's fingers and counted one through five. When she was done, she asked her to do the movement by herself.

"I was just holding her hand and not touching her fingers," Gebauer said. "I said, 'All right, well, you're going to count for me. Are you ready?' She literally put her first finger up again like she was going to count in the order. Sometimes she would do her ring finger or pinky at the same time and I would say, 'No, do it again. You're going to count every single one of those fingers separately.' I would say the number again. Eventually she did all five fingers. In a row. On her own."

Gebauer called Olivia's mother and sister over to witness the experience. They cried as they saw Olivia count her fingers one by one. She was counting, responding, and mostly, showing them that she was still Olivia. Her mom said, "Leave it to the math teacher to get her to count again."

Olivia liked the game. After she counted to five, she rubbed Gebauer's hand to communicate to her that she wanted to play again.

"It was the coolest thing," Gebauer said.
"She's told me numerous times that the math is hard. If you wanted my opinion, I mean, I'm not a doctor, but I think ... I think she knew it was me. I push the kids to whatever their ability is. So, when I ask them to do stuff in my classroom, they do it.

"Whether they want to or not, whether it's hard or not, I ask them," Gebauer continued. (With Olivia,) I don't really know what's going through her brain when it's had that much damage, but I really do think that she was trying to say, 'Hey, I know you're here. Watch me do this.""

SJSO honors career of Brian Harrington with retirement party

When Brian Harrington was a young police officer, he would get off duty, go home and listen to his scanner. If he was close to a call, he would leave his home, jump in his patrol car and respond.

"Now, I wouldn't have done that, Brian," remarked St. Johns County Sheriff David Shoar. "A man who cared so much not only about the job and the citizens but about his brothers and sisters. ... Brian, today is our day to thank you."

Shoar led the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office (SJSO) Feb. 1 in celebrating the career of Harrington, who recently announced his retirement. Most recently the commander of SJSO's Northeast District, which encompasses Ponte Vedra, Harrington served the agency for 23 years. Held at SJSO's Squadroom in St. Augustine, the event also honored the retirement of Carol McCullar, a longtime employee of the Sheriff's Office who served as executive assistant to the sheriff for 16 years, as well as in a few other positions over 31 years of service.

As noted by Shoar, Harrington started his career with SJSO in 1995 as a reserve. He was a road deputy from 1996 to 2001, a senior law enforcement officer from 2001 to 2004 and then a senior trained deputy from 2004 to 2005. He became a patrol shift leader, which is when he became a sergeant, and then served as cops coordinator from 2006 to 2011. He returned to the role of shift leader and then got promoted in 2012 to lieutenant. Shortly thereafter, he was appointed to SJSO's executive staff as commander of Central Investigations from 2013 to 2015. He finished his career as the commander of the Northeast Division.

"I'd like to recognize for you and all these folks here and your family, you made it to a rank of commander, and that is not an easy thing to accomplish," said 7th Judicial Circuit State Attorney R.J. Larizza, who presented Harrington with a plaque for his service. "You didn't do it ause of who you knew or where you came from, you did it on your own. You worked your way up. For any person to work their way up and accomplish what you have, that is an inspiration."

Harrington's list of commendations is significant, receiving the Division Director's Award in 1998, the Exceptional Service Award in 2001, the Lifesaving Award in 2001, the Guy White Award in 2003 (top cop of the year) and the Sheriff's Commendation.

In addition to Shoar and Larizza, a few others provided remarks in honor of Harrington's career. Deputy Keith Schiffer, the youth resource officer at Ponte Vedra High School who worked with Harrington for 20 years, reflected on a few experiences that were impactful to him. One of which was five years ago when Schiffer's mother died from cancer. When he was at the podium of the church looking out at those in attendance to pay their respects, he

observed three deputies dressed in green, one of whom was Harrington.

"The respect that you conveyed that day in the church for this deputy and his family made a very deep impression upon me and a memory I will always remember when someone speaks of Brian Harrington," Schiffer said.

Schiffer also recalled numerous times when Harrington would take the time to

stop into Ponte Vedra High to simply say hello and check in. In addition, Schiffer said when he underwent a few surgeries over the past few years, Harrington called home and checked on him and his family.

"Little gestures like that tend to help us heal a little bit quicker," Schiffer said.

SJSO Undersheriff Matthew Cline and Lt. Shawn Lee also recognized Harrington, with both providing gifts to the former commander. Chief Derek Barrs of the Florida Highway Patrol additionally presented Harrington with a plaque and made some remarks. Toward the end of the event, Shoar presented Harrington with his service weapon, as well as a watch and a letter written by the sheriff. As noted by Shoar, Harrington will also be receiving a letter from President Donald Trump in recognition of his service.

Before enjoying cake and refreshments, the event concluded with Harrington providing closing words.

"The big thing I would tell all of you is make sure you take care of each other," said Harrington, who is being succeeded by Scott Beaver in the role of Northeast District commander. "There's a lot going on out in the world. I still feel this place has this karma to it. It's a family. Make sure you think of others first, if you can, and take care of each other in any way possible.

"Since I got promoted to executive staff and I had the privilege of being on executive staff, it's not so much about your jobs and what you're doing in life on the journey that we're on, it's the people you meet along the way," Harrington added. "I just want all of you to know that. I thank all of you for being part of my life, and I have a treasure trove of memories of all of you. So, thank you."

Can you please briefly tell us about

your background? I grew up in New Jersey, worked in New York City for a sports marketing firm and moved to Jacksonville in 1988. I met my husband while I was working as the tournament director of a senior tour event in Indianapolis. Tim was the media director of the PGA TOUR and for a while, we dated long-distance. When I found myself flying to the wrong airport to meet him one weekend, we thought it was time to get to the same city. I had a career locally in advertising until I was hired by the Jacksonville Jaguars. I worked for the team through the first season and then retired to raise our two children, Taylor

and Keenan.

That's a crazy story. My daughter left for University of Florida, and my son got his license, so I thought I would get back to work —I've always loved to work. I was thinking about being a barista at Starbucks, but Tim reminded me I didn't make the coffee at home. A friend of mine told me about the job, but since I had no experience in the field, I thought it was a long shot. Vicar's Landing took a chance on me, and it proved to be a great fit.

What's your favorite part of your job?

The members; they are the most incredibly interesting and fun group of people, and I so enjoy helping associate members (wait list) find the perfect new home! I love having guests visit the community and exposing them to the premier community in North Florida and dare I say the state. Also, I couldn't ask for better people to work with — every department supports the efforts of marketing.

How has senior living changed during vour career?

educational needs of teens in recovery. Based in Jacksonville, River Oak was established as an independent, nonprofit 501c3 organization in 2014. The school offers a strong academic program incorporating 12-step principles to students ages 14 to 19 who are in recovery.


Bonnie Chancler, who loved and treated Rick as a son; and Renee's, brothers Justin and Brandon and their families.



"The Rainbow Room can also





American Golf Memories Project helps individuals living with dementia to reminisce about their favorite sport

First-ever chapter in the U.S. launches in Ponte Vedra

Billy Dettlaff has been retired since 2009 after a 22-year career with the PGA Tour's TPC Network as a general manager, director of golf, regional director of operations and national director of golf, based out of TPC Sawgrass. In 1988, he attained the PGA's highest classification of PGA Master Professional #57, which is held by about 300 people who are recognized for making a significant effort to improve the industry of golf professionals. His father was a professional player and his family has been involved with the sport for over 110 years. He wrote a critically-acclaimed book called the "Doctors of the Game: A History of the Golf Profession," which is over 600 pages and traces the history of the golf profession through the masters of the sport.

It's safe to say that Dettlaff loves golf. He just can't get the game out of his head. Although these days, he is working on making that the case for everyone, especially those suffering from Alzheimer's and dementia.

Dettlaff is launching the American Golf Memories Project, the first chapter in the U.S. here in Ponte Vedra. The project is based on its sister program, Carnoustie Golf Memories, in Scotland, which is a leader in reminiscence therapy. This treatment is a tool that improves psychological health and well-being for those living with dementia or Alzheimer's. Dettlaff's program works to specifically target memories of the sport of golf. The smell of the green, moments in tournament history, the feel of the club are all associations that can be tapped into with the help of the Memories Project.

But why golf?

The Golf Memories Project puts like-minded individuals (which it calls "members") together to talk about and share stories of their mutual interest. Because of the stigma of dementia and Alzheimer's, focusing on the group as being a "club," rather than therapy, helps people feel comfortable participating. Sports reminiscence therapy falls under the umbrella of what is called a "socialization program," in which people with dementia gather in a group to participate in activities to improve memory with their peers. According to AARP.org, social interaction is key to warding off cognitive decline and can even improve the condition.

For many people, the impact of sports on their lives has been a significant one. Golf, especially, has appealed to many fans throughout the course of their lives — playing a major part in adolescence



all the way through retirement. There are, simply, a lot of memories to access. With that being said, there are other sports reminiscence therapy programs, including soccer, cricket, curling and rugby. More than anything, secularizing the sport fosters community within the group.

Barbara Levine was encouraged to bring her mother, Betty Fairchild, to the first American Golf Memories Project meeting. Fairchild, who is experiencing memory loss, had always been an avid golfer and at 96, she had many memories to share.

"It was a way to draw her out of her shell," Levine said. "She doesn't have a lot of other friends around to talk about those things. I was very happy to see her, you know, she has that spark of recognition every now and then but to see it in her eyes, it was pretty neat."

Fairchild participated in different activities at the meeting aimed at helping her recall the sport and any memories associated with it. She was shown cards with images of famous players through history and asked if she remembered their names. Other activities included going through the alphabet and naming something golf-related with each letter.

Dettlaff undertook the idea for the program after he saw a feature story about the Carnoustie Program on the

Matthew Keenan took on the role in January after former director Darryl Young relocated to Buffalo, New York, to be closer to his family.

Keenan most recently taught advanced culinary arts at Virginia College in Jacksonville, which shut down all its campuses across the country in December 2018. A Charleston native, Keenan's background also includes a job as a dietary manager there at a long-term nursing facility. In addition, he owned and operated his own restaurant in the Charleston area.

Starting his career in the Navy in 1995, Keenan worked as a cook for eight years in Norfolk, Virginia on the USS George Washington and at a Naval hospital in Charleston. He also worked at a Naval weapons station in Charleston, serving 4,000 meals a day. Keenan's wife is now in the Navy, and her service was the impetus for their moves to New Jersey and Jacksonville. The couple currently lives at NAS Jacksonville, where Keenan's wife is based, but is building a house in St. Johns.

Since joining the team in January, Keenan told the Recorder he's been working on creating a culinary vision that is based around fresh foods. The overall goal, he said, is to create an experience that is as close to five-star dining as possible.

"We treat it as a restaurant," he said. "They (the residents) order off a menu. We plate and garnish just like you would see in a restaurant. That's the goal. ... This is their home, and I want them to feel comfortable here. I don't want them to be complaining about food or any-

thing like that. ... So far, we're on the right track."

Keenan noted that he meets with the residents once a month. The first time they met, he said he had a long list of notes. At their second meeting last week, however, he said the list was much smaller.

"They're really accepting the new menu, and they're loving it," Keenan said. "And they're giving me their input."

Keenan's culinary team of 15 is working on the fourth week of new menus this week. Their menu on Monday, for example, consisted of French dip sandwiches for lunch and jambalaya for dinner.

Moving forward, his goals include building the community's herb garden in the courtyard, which is a project he plans to include the residents in. He also hopes to bring in guest chefs and produce expos to entertain and education the residents. In addition, Keenan is working on organizing cooking classes. Overall, the new culinary services director is excited for what's to come at The Palms.

"It's just a passion," Keenan said about culinary arts. "I love watching people smile when they eat good food."

Age-related macular degeneration: Understanding your diagnosis

As many as 11 million people in the U.S. currently have some form of age-related macular degeneration

(AMD) — a number that is expected to double to nearly 22 million by 2050.

AMD is an incurable eye disease that is the leading cause of vision loss in the country. The condition, which is most common in adults 55 and over, centers around the macula, the part of the eye that is used to see fine detail.

Every February, we focus on spreading awareness of this sight-stealing disease during Age-Related Macular Degeneration Month. It's important to understand the varying types and the ways you can detect and prevent the condition.

DISTINCTION BETWEEN TYPES

There are two distinct types of AMD: "dry" and "wet." While both can result in significant vision loss, they affect the macula in different ways.

The overwhelming majority of AMD patients suffer from the "dry" type of the disease, which is characterized by the presence of yellow deposits in the macula. As these deposits accumulate, patients experience reduced vision and eventual central vision loss. Patients with dry AMD will often first notice blurred vision or a central blind spot that gradually increases in size over the span of a few years.

Patients with wet AMD, however, will experience symptoms at a much more rapid pace, with some noticing a dramatic change seemingly overnight. Wet AMD, which only affects about 10 percent of

patients, is caused by fluid leaks from abnormal blood vessels in the eye. As the fluid pools up underneath the retina, the macula is slightly lifted, causing vision

Signs and symptoms to look for in both types of AMD include difficulty distinguishing colors and recognizing fine details. But while dry AMD is often associated with a growing blind spot, wet AMD patients are more likely to notice trouble seeing straight lines.

FUTURE OF THE DISEASE

While there is no cure for AMD, researchers continue to uncover solutions to preserve vision in patients. Current treatment options range from diet changes to anti-angiogenic drugs.

A major clinical trial sponsored by the National Eye Institute found that a modified combination of vitamins and minerals can actually help to slow the progression of vision loss in some AMD patients.

In addition, recent breakthroughs in research, including a study from the University of Liverpool, show evidence of specific genetic markers in those with AMD. While this exciting new research is paving the way for the development of targeted genetic treatments for the disease, it will likely be many years before these new findings translate to trusted therapies.

The single most important thing that you can do to protect yourself from AMD is to visit your eye doctor annually. Early detection is crucial, so take note of any symptoms in your vision and seek medical help at the first sign of any noticeable changes.

Insurance can protect your aspirations

You probably already know that life insurance can protect your family if something were to happen to you. But you might not realize the many ways in

which insurance can help you preserve your plans for the future — whether for yourself, the next generation or those charitable groups you support.

Specifically, life insurance can potentially help you address several areas, including the following:

- Help in covering final expenses: The proceeds of a life insurance policy can provide immediate funds at the time of your death to pay for your funeral costs, your debts and your final income taxes.
- Transfer wealth (with potential tax advantages): Some wealth transfer vehicles carry significant tax consequences. But the proceeds from life insurance are typically free of income tax, so if your death benefit is \$1 million, your heirs will receive the full \$1 million. (Consult with your tax advisor about all potential tax consequences beneficiaries might face.)
- Provide charitable gifts: You can use life insurance in various ways to support charitable organizations. One option is to donate a policy you may no longer need. Either you or the charity would continue paying the premiums, but the charity would become both the owner and beneficiary of your policy. Alternatively, you could purchase a permanent life insurance policy and donate it to the charity, which could then use the policy's cash value when you're alive and receive the death benefit when you die.
- Help fund a revocable living trust: Depending on your situation, you might

want to establish a revocable living trust as part of your estate plans. A revocable living trust helps you avoid the timeconsuming, expensive and public process of probate. And, among other benefits, a living trust allows you to distribute your financial assets over time, and in amounts that you specify — which may be quite appealing, if, for example, you'd rather not give your children a large amount of money at once. Life insurance can help fund your living trust — you just need to name the trustee (which may well be yourself while you're alive) as the owner and beneficiary of the policy. You will need to, however, consult with your legal advisor before creating and funding a liv-

■ Help cover long-term care costs: You may never need any type of longterm care, but if you do, you'll find it quite expensive. It now costs, on average, more than \$100,000 per year for a private room in a nursing home, according to the 2018 Cost of Care Survey, produced by Genworth, an insurance company. Medicare typically pays little of these costs, so the burden will fall on you. To avoid using up your financial assets — or, even worse, having to rely on your adult children for help — you may want to purchase insurance. Some life insurance plans offer long-term care coverage, either through a special "rider" or by accelerating your death benefit, but you might also want to consider a traditional long-term care insurance policy.

As you can see, one of the most flexible tools you have is life insurance. Start thinking soon about how you can put it to work.

Golf Channel. He was so inspired by it that he flew there to discuss the potential with Lorraine Young, a former social worker who spearheaded the project, and the recently deceased Dr. Michael Ego, who was managing research on sports reminiscence therapy for implementation in the states.

With the support of TPC Sawgrass, Dettlaff is now hosting meetings for American Golf Memories Project at the TPC Clubhouse every fourth Monday of the month. Dettlaff wants to make clear, however, that there is no cost to participate in The Golf Memories Project. The program is entirely self-funded by him as his way of "giving back to the game."

In addition, Dettlaff has named the first inaugural chapter of The Golf Memories Project in honor of his friend and renowned golf course designer, Pete Dye, who designed the "world's most terrifying tee shot," the par-3 17th hole of the Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass. Dye was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 2008 and has been stricken with Alzheimer's since 2015.

Dettlaff wrote to Pete's wife, Alice Dye, a prolific golf player and architect who helped Pete with the design of the Island Green, to ask her if he could name the chapter after him.

"I got a little short answer after only 45 minutes," Dettlaff said. "She said, 'It would be an honor for Pete.""

On Feb. 1, shortly after this interaction, Alice Dye died at the age of 91, after a long and illustrious career. Today, the official name of the program is The American Golf Memories Project, The Pete Dye Chapter at TPC Sawgrass.


Dettlaff continues his work to honor both the sport and the Dyes with the program.

"After Betty got back on the bus with Barbara, I had the greatest sense of accomplishment," Dettlaff said after his first session with Fairchild. "What a sweet human being. The fact that an hour and half of time brought back memories of a game that we both love, it's a hard feeling to explain, but it felt important."

Above everything, Dettlaff said he just wants to see the sport bring joy to people

"When I asked her what her favorite club was, (she answered) without hesitation," Detlaff said. "She said proudly, 'It's my seven iron.' On her face, when she remembered, it was just a gentle smile."



ASSESS YOUR HEALTH







The Zombies' Rod Argent: Band is 'absolutely thrilled'by Rock and Roll Hall of Fame induction

When Rod Argent got the news that The Zombies had been selected for induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, the founding band member's mind went back to the day in 1956 in St. Albans, England, when his cousin first played him "Hound Dog" by Elvis Presley.

"I was 11 years old and my life changed in three minutes," Argent said in an interview with The Ponte Vedra Recorder. "It spun my world around."

Argent's cousin, Jim Rodford, was 15 at the time, and already playing in the local band The Bluetones.

"I thought I just had to get in a band, but at the time all my musical idols Ray Charles, Elvis, Miles Davis — were in America and it just seemed like such an enormous goal," Argent said. "To think that all these years later, The Zombies will be on the same roster (in the hall of fame) as those artists, it just feels fantastic. We are absolutely thrilled."

Best known for their 1960s hits "She's Not There," "Tell Her No" and "Time of the Season," The Zombies had been eligi-

ble for hall of fame induction since 1989. Yet it was only in the past five years that the band had been nominated and received serious consideration — a fact Argent said is due in no small part to The Zombies' loyal — and growing — fan base.

Over the course of the fan voting period, Zombies fans submitted more than 320,000 votes for their favorite band — surpassing the vote totals received by artists such as Janet Jackson, Devo, Radiohead and numerous other artists. And while the top five bands in the fan vote each only received a single extra vote on the induction ballot, Argent believes the strong fan showing bolstered The Zom-

"Our fans were absolutely relentless in their voting — in fact, while other bands' voting fell off as the voting went on, ours actually went up," Argent observed. "I do think the (hall of fame) voting members look at the fan vote and it made a differ-

AN INFLUENTIAL BAND

The Zombies first performed in Northeast Florida on July 24, 1965, when they appeared at the Jacksonville Memorial Coliseum on a bill that featured The Beach Boys, The Shangri-Las, The Searchers and Lesley Gore. Sitting in the audience that day, attending his very first rock and roll concert, was a 14-year-old boy named Tom Petty.

"Tom told us about attending that concert," Argent said of the 2002 Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee. "He remembered us performing 'Summertime' and that to his mind, we stood up above all the other acts. He was a big supporter of ours."

Petty — who covered The Zombies' "I Want You Back Again" — wasn't alone in his admiration for the band. Other acts that have credited The Zombies as a maior influence include such diverse artists

as Paul Weller, Susanna Hoffs, Zooey Deschanel and Dave Grohl of Nirvana and Foo Fighters. Eminem famously sampled "Time of the Season" on his "Rhyme or Reason," and today, Zombies tunes regularly show up in movies, commercials and TV series.

To what does Argent attribute the timeless quality that gives The Zombies' songs such staying power?

"I've gone through my life loving all strands of music," said Argent, listing Bach and Stravinsky alongside Elvis, Miles Davis and Little Richard as early musical influences. "The Zombies never consciously copied anybody, but I suppose those influences all found their way indirectly through the filter. And as a result, The Zombies didn't sound like

Argent also credits the influence of Zombies lead vocalist Colin Blunstone, with whom he founded the band as teenagers in 1961.

"Colin and I have often said that he grew up learning to sing by singing my songs, and I grew up learning to write by writing for his voice," Argent told The Recorder. "That connection has certainly affected my writing — I imagine his voice in the back of my mind."

Another major influence who will be on Argent's mind at the hall of fame induction ceremony: Jim Rodford, the cousin who introduced him to rock and roll back in 1956. Rodford later joined the most recent incarnation of The Zombies after playing with his cousin in the 1970s post-Zombies band, Argent, and for 18 years with The Kinks. He was with The Zombies a year ago when the band concluded their tour at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall; he died a week later as a result of a fall at his home in England.

"Jim was a mentor to me," said Argent, noting that Rodford provided the musical equipment for The Zombies' first rehearsal in 1961. "He was a huge presence, a huge energy, a huge inspiration."

After the hall of fame induction on March 29 - 50 years to the day that "Time of the Season" topped the U.S. charts — The Zombies will head back into the studio to write and record a new album. In fact, fans attending the band's Feb. 20 Ponte Vedra Concert Hall performance may receive a sneak preview of one of the new songs if it's ready in time, Argent said.

"I love the idea of playing things live – that's what excites us," he said. "There's nothing as exciting as getting involved in something creative. We just have a genuine enthusiasm for what we do."

The Zombies will perform at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall Wednesday, Feb. 20 at 8 p.m. (doors open at 7 p.m.). For tickets, visit www.pontevedraconcerthall.com.

Webb Simpson predicts THE PLAYERS to be 'even bigger' in March

The PLAYERS 2018 champion returns to TPC Sawgrass for THE PLAYERS Media Day

THE PLAYERS 2018 champion Webb Simpson said on Monday he believes the Ponte Vedra-based tournament will become an "even bigger" event now that it has shifted back to March.

"One thing that is going to bring even more prestige to this event is when it used to be in May, we already had a very big event on the calendar, the Masters," said Simpson, who was in Ponte Vedra Beach on Monday for THE PLAYERS media day. "Now it's in March. So, I think the season — every tournament is a big tournament, but this is the first really big

Considering the date change, Rice said the impact on ticket sales has been positive. He said THE PLAYERS is out-pacing where they were last year by about 10 percent, so his team feels that the market

is aware of the change. He also noted that the tournament is seeing significant engagement from Charlotte, Atlanta and Orlando, as well as purchases out of Chicago and New York.

Before participating in the Charity Challenge, Simpson walked around the course and said it's in "phenomenal shape." Living at Quail Hollow in Charlotte, North

Carolina, since 2010, Simpson said he's familiar with the overseeding process that TPC Sawgrass has undergone, and he's impressed. He noted that chipping around the greens is usually tough, but now it's going to be easier, which he said will make the players happy.

Regarding differences between March and May, Simpson noted that he hit a few shots at No. 11 on Monday. The same shot he made on Saturday of last year's tournament — when he landed the ball about halfway to the hole and it rolled out about 40 feet — he said he had to fly maybe 15 feet short of the hole on Monday.

"So, there's a lot of things that will change," he said. "The fairways here are known to be really tight, and they are, but with softer fairways, they're going to play a little wider. I'm going to hit different clubs off probably four or five holes."

Prior to the question and answer session with Rice, Simpson donated his sand wedge from the 2018 tournament to TPC Sawgrass that he used on that 11th hole shot on Saturday. Holing out for eagle, the

shot extended his lead at the time to eight strokes.

Also during the session with Simpson, Rice discussed some of the changes for this year's tournament, including a new Nicklaus Gate entryway; enhanced ridesharing due to a new space for ridesharing closest to the Fred Couples gate; and a branding campaign that features enhanced colors and a new sterling silver trophy dripped in 24-karat gold vermeil thanks to a partnership with Tiffany & Co.

In addition, TPC Sawgrass Head Chef Azhar Mohammad unveiled a new dish named after Simpson and chosen by the defending champion, continuing an annual tradition. To be featured on the TPC Sawgrass menu through tournament week, the Simpson Sandy is a sandwich with barbecue brisket on soft potato bread with carrot, jalapeno slaw and fried onions.


Senior guard Johnny Corlazzoli led Pon-
