



# County Commission votes for reallocation of tourism taxes for beach restoration but against raising them despite public support

It was clear that St. Johns County residents desire beach restoration in the two and a half hours of public comment at the March 19 County Commission meeting. How the Tourist Development Tax (TDT) will help fund it, however, was divided by the Board of County Commissioners, and remains a hotly contested topic more than two weeks later.

A vast majority of residents and speakers told the commissioners they preferred raising the bed tax a percentage point to supplement the cost of the beach restoration projects in question. Agenda item 11 at the meeting was aimed at amending the current Tourist Development Plan to allocate the additional tax revenues for the renourishment projects. Despite their pleas, however, the commission voted against the increase in a 3-2 super majority vote, with James Johns of District 1 and Jeb Smith of District 2 dissenting. A collective sigh of disappointment was audible after the vote.

The Board did vote in favor of agenda item 10, however, which instead redistributed TDT dollars for the beach restoration projects by the creation of a fifth category within the plan. The new category, called "Tourism Assets," may be utilized for a variety of projects that "support a healthy and diverse tourism industry." Projects include beach restoration and access improvements, boat ramps, sports and arts facility improvements, and land acquisition and programming projects.

The new reallocation plan will help pay for the beach restoration plans, both the dune restoration and 50-year U.S Army Corps of Engineers project, immediately. The projects are in the South Ponte Vedra and Vilano areas, respectively. The Ponte Vedra Beach proper project may also receive funding, although the plan is still in its development phase. The new formula is designed to allocate the \$2.3 million for fiscal year 2020 needed for both restoration projects. Smith was the only dissenting vote for both the Tourist Tax agenda items, with Johns voting favorably on agenda item 10.

Johns stated prior to the voting of the 5th cent agenda item, that he didn't feel comfortable with the project partnership between the U.S Army Corps and St. Johns County.

"It is in summary — an open-ended check," Johns said. "That we will be held liable for. Bottom line. In this document it states the specific cost of payment and funding and what's expected, and the timing required to hold this contract. In short,

all of these sources of funding will not achieve the goals that you are here begging us to achieve. That's the bottom line. I can give you details to where it says, if the federal government determines this project will cost more, we have to come up with the difference."

Both restoration projects require a local funding match that will be supplemented with state and federal money. Because the project requires this "funding match," it was the crux of the three agenda items at the meeting, both the TDT agendas, as well as a vote on a proposed MSTU ordinance.

Commissioner Henry Dean of District 5 has been a longtime advocate of the renourishment project. He rebutted Johns' allegations prior to the vote.

"If you remember (Jason Herrera of the Army Corps) told us at our last commission meeting, that we are not on the hook," Dean said. "We are not going to be strung out to dry. He said that for if for some reason in the future, after the first construction, the second, or at any time, if we choose to not participate, they will simply not let the contract."

In addition, Commissioner Jeremiah Blocker of District 4 refuted the claim.

"In life sometimes you're not going to have a 100 percent solution, sometimes you're going to have to work with a 70 or 80 percent solution," Blocker said. "This is an option, and this is an opportunity for us address a problem. These renourishment projects happen all over the state and they are using the same legal framework we talked about. As a lawyer I've studied these frameworks before. With all due respect, I am going to have to disagree with you on that ... This is a solution that will help address this problem."

Despite many members of the tourism industry coming forward in favor of raising the bed tax, St. Johns County residents seemed to be able to concede to the less favorable agenda item, because beach restoration is what's most important to them, regardless of how it's done. Attendees at the meeting did express concern, however, that the reallocation could negatively impact other categories of the industry, such as marketing or arts.

Tara Meeks, the tourism and cultural development director for St. Johns County's Tourist Development Council, told the Recorder she doesn't expect that outcome whatsoever.

"We've seen pretty consistent growth

for the last 10-plus years," Meeks said. "It's probably safe to assume that everything is not just going to go flat."

In fact, Meeks said that the last time the bed tax ordinance was modified, in fiscal year 2012, the county collected \$6.9 million. Currently, in fiscal year 2019, they expect to collect \$13.2 million, over double since the last modification. That 12 percent growth enabled the county to reallocate the current 4 cent bed tax across each category, "without impacting the new revenue that those categories received," she said.

"Both of the marketing contractors will see a 5 percent increase in their budget for next year in the draft budget," Meeks said.

At the end of the day, St. Johns County is proceeding with its beach restoration projects, a cause that not one voice of public comment disagreed with.

One resident at the County Commission meeting compared the beach's erosion issues to having a terminal illness.

"It's like a person having a heart attack, you don't decide if you're going to get treatment," he said. "You don't decide if it costs this or it costs that. You just say, 'Save my life."

# Richard Goldman

#### Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

Prior to joining the Bureau in 2009, I served as the senior vice president and chief marketing officer for Amelia Island Plantation, where I managed a 13-member, in-house advertising and marketing operation. As chairman of VISIT FLORIDA's (VF) Board of Directors and with company executives, I facilitated the reorganization of VF into a more streamlined marketing company. I continue to serve on VISIT FLORIDA'S Marketing Committee and the Florida Tourism Council of Leaders. I am also past vice chair of the Florida Commission on Tourism and past chair of Florida's First Coast of Golf, a regional destination marketing organization. A graduate of the University of Florida, I started my career at Ogilvy & Mather advertising agency in New York and spent 17 years working for Ryder & Schild Advertising in Miami, including 10 years as the firm's vice president for marketing and research.

#### What's the most rewarding part of your job?

Two things are particularly rewarding for me. The first is seeing that all of our stakeholders' employees are busy and earning enough to care for their families. That only happens when my dedicated team at the VCB successfully builds demand for Florida's Historic Coast® as a vacation and meetings destination. Second, when I see social media posts by past visitors sharing with their friends and relatives the amazing experiences they have had when visiting Ponte Vedra Beach or St. Augustine or Crescent Beach, it gives me a strong sense of pride. This destination has developed so positively in the last 10 years — even with the hurdles of two hurricanes in one year, the Deepwater Horizon oil spill and, of course, the Great Recession — that I can't say enough about the work of my team and the business owners and entrepreneurs who have invested in Florida's Historic Coast.

### What's the state of the tourism industry in St. Johns County today?

Today, the industry remains strong even as some Florida destinations have begun to decline in visitation. Florida's Historic Coast now has a buzz that has put us on dozens of top 10 lists. From St. Augustine being named by National Geographic One of the World's Best Places to See Holiday Lights, to the Sawgrass Marriott Golf Resort & Spa being named a Top Ten Golf Resort in the U.S. by Travel + Leisure Magazine, our destination has earned the attention of the world and our employees deliver the kinds of experiences that keep visitors coming back for more. Last year, that attention helped to generated \$1.1 billion in direct spending by visitors to St. Johns County. And we have new hotels coming to St. Augustine and the Beaches after more than eight years without new properties. Those hotels will have parking for their guests, and that's something we have needed for some time.

#### What are some of the challenges facing tourism today?

After the ever-increasing competition from other destinations and the need to raise the resources to compete, our biggest challenge is the perception of our business by residents. Tourism is an industry that has delivered such positive economic development and tax revenue for local and state government that residents don't have an income tax. What's more, tourism is a clean industry that generated \$2.4 billion in economic impact in St. Johns County last year. Visitors came, spent their hard-earned money and went home. Yet, we residents, in some cases, have blamed tourism for the rapid growth of our communities and congestion on our roads. Our industry must reach out to the communities in which we work to demonstrate the value of our visitors, and show that we can be good neighbors, sensitive to the needs of residents, and give back to our communities.

#### What's the future look like?

We will see continued improvement in the quality of dining, shopping and entertainment experiences around Ponte Vedra and all of Florida's Historic Coast because our visitors are becoming more sophisticated. They will demand better quality, and that means we residents will have more and better things to do and to brag about to our friends who live elsewhere.

#### What do you enjoy most about living in the area?

I love that our kids could attend great schools and that Sharon, my wife, and I can now have a wonderful meal, view renowned artists or attend nationally acclaimed music events all in our own neighborhood. We don't have to spend hours driving to other towns for those experiences. We've loved living here for 20 years, but that wasn't always true about Ponte Vedra Beach.

#### What do you like to do in your free time?

In our business, there isn't a lot of free time, but I have a vintage motorcycle that I can occasionally get Sharon out on for a ride in the country or a trip down to St. Augustine. I love fishing, whether it's for bass on one of our many lakes around Sawgrass or at the GTM where there are plenty of reds and trout in Guana Lake and out on the Tolomato/ICW. I also spend what Sharon thinks is too much time working in my yard, but I find it relaxing and a great diversion.

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

#### 'Tales of a Vietnam POW'



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
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# St. Johns County receives top state rankings in health

For the eighth year in row, St. Johns County is ranked No. 1 in Florida in Health Outcomes (measures of today's health) and No. 1 in Health Factors (measures of tomorrow's health) in the national 2019 County Health Rankings Report.

"The rankings truly validate the long-standing efforts of working together across the public health system, making St. Johns County a healthy place to live, learn, work, age, and play," said Dr. Dawn Allicock, director and health officer with Florida Department of Health in St. Johns County. "Community partnerships are leveraged between clinical medicine and population health, to assure conditions for optimal health for people of all ages in St. Johns County."

The national study highlights the many factors that influence a community's health. "Health Outcomes" use length of life and quality of life as standard measurements to describe a community's health. "Health Factors" are indicators that help determine future health (i.e. factors that can ultimately make people sick or lead to an early death).

"The continued top ranking of St.

Johns County in this report reflects the high priority the county places on health and human services, parks and recreation and other services that contribute to the exceptionally high quality of life in our community," said Paul Waldron, chair



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The 2019 County Health Rankings & Roadmaps tool was released by the University of Wisconsin and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. The County Health Rankings use traditional, established data and vital statistics, much of which is ob-

tained through the Department's web-based community health assessment resource toolkit known as Florida Health CHARTS (www.FLHealthCHARTS.com).

The Florida Department of Health in St. Johns County convenes and champions the St. Johns County Health Leadership Council. This nationally-recognized com-

# Get prepared for summer camp season

■ Establish payment schedules. Summer camps vary in price. The American

Camp Association says camp costs range from \$100 to more than \$1,500 per week. Many accredited camps, however, offer some sort of financial assistance for children from families with limited financial means. If cost is a factor, be sure to broach the subject.

- Prepare children for the physical challenges a camp may present. Summer camp activities may be rigorous, and campers may need to be cleared by a physician before starting. 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

# Traditional martial arts academy moving to Ponte Vedra Beach

A traditional martial arts academy that has been working with families in the Jacksonville area for more than 10 years is moving to Ponte Vedra Beach and opening in April.

Led by head instructors Richard Mustafa and Ray Peet, Shobukan Martial Arts Academy will be located at 110 Solana Road, Unit 104, after being in Jacksonville Beach for nearly four years and a few other Jacksonville locations beforehand. The official opening day for the new Ponte Vedra Beach dojo is Wednesday, April 10.

"I was looking for something in this locale for quite some time," said Mustafa, a sixth-degree black belt with 52 years of experience in martial arts. "I believe that it's an area that has a lot of good families. I think we can grow there very well and help a lot of different people."

Instructing people ranging in age from 6 years old to their mid-60s, the academy teaches styles and values that are rooted in the history and culture of Okinawa. The two disciplines they teach are Shobukan Goju Ryu (traditional Okinawan karate) and Matayoshi Kobudo (Okinawan weapons fighting system). Mustafa and Peet, a seventh-degree black belt, have been practicing Goju Ryu throughout their lives. Their respective ranks were awarded to them by their masters at their home dojo in Okinawa.

According to the academy's website, Goju Ryu is a close combat fighting

system that comprises kicks, punches, takedowns, submissions, pressure point applications and strikes used to subdue an opponent, all while using the least amount of energy possible. It's highly effective as a self-defense system, as well as a close fighting technique.

"Traditional karate is taught for defense only," Mustafa said. "It's not an offensive martial art. . . . I don't throw the first

punch. I try to talk my way out of it, (or) run away from it. Last means of defense, if I'm cornered, then I'll have to use all the means necessary to me to defend against an attack that is coming toward me."

Available to both children and adults, Matayoshi Kobudo uses an extensive array of weapons that include the Bo (staff), Sai, Tunfa (police baton), Nunchaku (nunchucks), Kama (sickles), Ueku (boat oar) and three-section staff, providing an extra line of defense in extreme situations.

Shobukan Martial Arts Academy pursues the virtues and characteristics found in the Bushido Code of Conduct, which includes justice, courage, benevolence,

courtesy, honor, temperance, wisdom and respect.

"Those are what we live by," Mustafa said. "Everybody who belongs to our dojo lives by this code."

Mustafa said students at the academy also learn self-respect, respect for others, discipline, self-confidence and self-esteem, which he noted are important skills and qualities for children, especially those who are being bullied.

Shobukan Martial Arts Academy currently works with 30 students on an ongoing basis, but that has been in their

# 'Big: The Musical' at Alhambra is reminder of how fun it was to be little

"Big: The Musical" is currently playing at Alhambra Theatre & Dining and manages to hit all the highlight notes of the 1980s hit movie starring Tom Hanks.

The play follows the story of Josh Baskin, an almost 13-year-old boy who longs to be "big" after dealing with the daunting challenges of childhood, such as having to take out the trash, trying to talk to girls and being too small to ride a roller coaster at the local carnival. Disappointed and alone at the carnival, Josh stumbles upon a spooky Zoltar machine, which, for 25 cents, offers to grant Josh a wish.

The next morning, Josh wakes up in an adult body and is forced to run away from home after his mother, played by Katie Nettle, naturally refuses to believe the man in her kitchen is her 12-year-old son and calls the police.

Josh manages to convince his best friend Billy that he really is a middle-schooler trapped in an adult body and is forced to find a way to survive for a few weeks until Billy can track down the Zoltar machine. With Josh's youthful exuberance, and particular knowledge of toys, he lands a job at MacMillan Toys, along with a company apartment.


The musical numbers work very well with the story, and there are a lot of fun, witty numbers such as "You're a Big Boy Now" and "My Secretary is in Love."

Josh, played by Ari Walz as a child, is played excellently by Rodney Holmes as the grown-up version, although, even as an adult. Josh still looks like he'd be quickly carded ordering a cocktail. But Holmes does a great job portraying Josh's youthful mannerisms and wide-eyed innocence, especially when it comes to his early interactions with flirty office colleague Susan, played by Heather Kopp. Some of the best musical scenes ae between Josh and Susan, particularly when a coy Susan and confused Josh perform "Let's Not Move Too Fast," after a first date, and when the pair perform "Stars," after Josh introduces Susan to a world of make-believe in his apartment. Kopp does a great job making Susan appear tough and vulnerable, and her singing voice is beautiful.

Another fun aspect of the musical was the decision to stick to the 80s theme, from the wardrobe and hair, to the types of toys popular at the time. It definitely inspires a sense of nostalgia.

Jacksonville Beach dojo, which is 1,100 square feet. The new dojo in Ponte Vedra Beach will be considerably larger at 2,500 to 2,600 square feet.

For those interested in joining, Mustafa said the academy allows prospective students to take a few introductory lessons free of charge. If they enjoy it, they can sign up and join, and don't have to sign a contract to do so. The dues will be changing at the new location and are to be determined. The academy helps students obtain a uniform and then guides them through the curriculum.

Mustafa said advancing through the curriculum requires serious dedication, noting that it typically takes about five years to get a black belt, and that's if the student is practicing at the dojo three times a week minimum, as well as at home.

"Karate is not just coming here and training," Mustafa said. "It's going home and using techniques in front of a mirror, so you can continue your training. It's all part of what you've taken through your heart as your art.

"It's an art you're going to learn the rest of your life," Mustafa added. "There's no end to learning in what we do."

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# Lights, camera, summer camp!

Florida Film Academy opens St. Augustine campus in time for summer fun

Perhaps you know a budding Scorsese, a little Meryl Streep or even a young Billy Wilder. No matter which side of the camera your kid adores, there's now a place ready to nurture their creativity and let their imaginations be the star of the show.

Recently, the Florida Film Academy (https://flfilmacademy.com/) opened a campus in St. Augustine, just in time for summer camp 2019. The Academy offers a variety of programs tailored to visual storytelling and open to students ages 7 to 12 and 13 to 18.

The camps welcome first-time students who may be interested in filmmaking, animation or acting. In addition, any students with prior experience can join higher-level camps. The programming includes, "The Wonderful World of Art & Animation," "DSLR for Teens," the "Art of Anime and Animation," "Lights, Action, Make a Movie!" a pre-college film, animation and visual effects camp hosted at Flagler college, as well as the classic "Make a Movie" camp.

Riley Chance, 12, has been to the camp for the past three years. She said that "Special Effects" week was her favorite, although she loved being able to learn all facets of the movie industry.

"My favorite aspect of camp is that it is so hands-on," Chance said. "I also love that you can try out different spots every time. One day you can do camera, then another you can do acting or editing. Every day is so interesting because we have different challenges or genres. I did a special effects week, which was my favorite week, and one of our challenges was to include a green screen."

Finding out what aspects of the industry they enjoy is one benefit to working together as a team to create a final product. Camp Director and coowner Stefanie Robinson said there is an entire spectrum of life skills and applicable experiences that students can learn from participating in making a movie.

"They are certainly learning social skills above and beyond just the screen," Robinson said. "They are learning how to communicate, how to take responsibility, delegate and manage projects. It gives them a lot of confidence and it helps them be able to stand up for themselves at school, not just other students but with adults."

One of the original founders of the Academy, Kay Hill, found a "huge gap for creative kids" in programing after spending time in the U.S. producing episodes for a documentary series for National Geographic. The Academy soon opened a campus in Winter Garden, Florida, and currently provides summer programs around the U.S. and overseas. This summer in St. Augustine with be the first summer for youth education at the new campus.

Robinson said that the importance of filmmaking shouldn't be overlooked or understated.

"It's important to understand the importance and the value of telling a good story," Robinson said. "That is something that has been with us since the beginning of time. We've gone from oral storytelling from tribe to tribe to streaming everything on Netflix from our home. It's something that is at the core of the human experience."

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

# Entertaining ways to prevent summer learning loss

Summer vacation presents an opportunity for students to enjoy an extended break from the classroom. While this respite from routine may be a welcome change to youngsters, teachers frequently lament that valuable educational lessons seem to be forgotten each summer. Educators then face tougher hurdles when students return to school in the fall.

Such a phenomenon is dubbed "summer learning loss," but it can occur during any extended break from school. Scholars have realized for some time that students' rate of academic development declines during summer vacation. Oxford Learning, a tutoring and education training group, offers these eye-opening statistics.

- Over the summer, students tend to lose 2.6 months of math skills and two months of reading skills.
- Summer learning loss can be seen in students as young as 6.
- It can take up to two months from the first day of school to get students' brain development back on course.

Summer learning loss, sometimes called "brain drain," can be prevented. Proponents of year-round schooling at The National Association for Year-Round Education recommend a more balanced school year, where summer vacation lasts only 30 days and other school breaks are lengthened. In this scenario, the school

year would still last about 180 days, but without the lengthy breaks.

Parents may prefer the status quo, and those who do can take several steps to prevent summer learning loss from affecting their children.


■ Encourage more reading. Schools recommend summer reading lists, but

students should also learn to read for pleasure. Research from the National Literary Trust indicates reading for pleasure can improve reading attainment and writing, as well as one's general knowledge. Children can bring books to the beach that they can read between frolicking sessions in the waves.

- Enjoy family game nights. Games can be customized to highlight certain skills that require reinforcement. For example, math-centered games that require counting or addition can strengthen generalized math skills. Problem-solving board games may help children become better critical thinkers.
- Make vacations educational. Add travel to historical sites or other places of interest to help history come alive. When visiting new towns and cities, read the placards that explain important moments in history that took place in each town or city, making sure to include some thought-provoking areas of interest on your itinerary.
- Look for science moments. Trips to the seaside, parks and much more present myriad opportunities to learn about science. Children can stage their own experiments with items they find in nature, such as learning about tides, wind and water flow by sailing homemade boats.
- Teach kids through daily tasks.
  Barbecuing, making a cake, building a raised garden bed, seeding the lawn each of these moments present educational opportunities for parents who want to keep their kids' minds sharp during summer.

Children need not fall victim to summer learning loss when their days are filled with educational but fun activities.

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

"Nemours is an amazing organization," Terry Fowler said, "and it's just a pleasure to give back to those they help."





# Nease hires Collin Drafts as new head football coach

Nease High School announced on Friday the hiring of Collin Drafts as the Panthers' next head football coach.

Drafts, a 33-year-old native of Beaufort, South Carolina, replaces Tim Krause, who left Nease for the head coaching position at Bishop Kenny High School.

"I'm just excited to get down there and get to work right away," Drafts told the Recorder. "Nease is a special place, and I'm just looking forward to getting the football program moving in one direction together and building a family feel there."

Drafts previously was the head coach of AC Flora High School in Columbia, South Carolina. There, he led the Falcons to a 9-3 record in 2018 after they went 0-10 in his first season in 2017. AC Flora kicked off the 2018 season 0-2, extending the 10-game losing streak to 12. But the Falcons persevered and won nine games in a row, breaking a record for the longest winning streak in school history. Drafts ultimately led AC Flora to the district championship and second round of the playoffs. He was named Coach of the Year in 4A Lower State as a result of the turnaround.

Drafts constructed a similar transformation in his first head coaching position at East River High School (7A) in Orlando, where he spent one season before moving to Columbia. At East River, where Drafts

said the school had won eight games in four years, he transformed a 1-9 team in 2015 into a 6-5 playoff team in 2016.

Before East River, Drafts was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at West Orange High School (8A) in Orlando under head coach Bob Head. Again, Drafts was part of a rebuild, as the Warriors won 32 games in the three years he worked on staff, after previously not making the playoffs in 15 years.

"He's (Draft) been involved in a couple

programs and taken them from places where things weren't the best and then able to climb the mountain and do it the right way and teaching them to understand to deal with adversity," Nease athletic director Matt McCool said.

While at West Orange, Drafts coached quarterback Woody Barrett, who is now the starting quarterback at Kent State after a stint in junior college and initial start at Auburn. He coached another talented quarterback, former Florida State starter Deondre Francois, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Olympia High School (8A) in Orlando, where Drafts spent two years.

Drafts' success with quarterbacks shouldn't come as a surprise, as he played the position himself for seven years in the Arena Football League. He most recently played for the Orlando Predators, as well as the Jacksonville Sharks, Dallas Vigilantes, Amarillo Dusters, Green Bay Blizzard, Tri-Cities Fever and Manchester Wolves.

Drafts played college football at Charleston Southern University (CSU), where he was the 2005 Big South Offensive Player of the Year, leading the Buccaneers to their first-ever Big South Championship in that season. Playing for the Bucs from 2003 to 2006, Drafts is CSU's all-time leader in rushing attempts, touchdowns, pass attempts (BSC record), pass completions (BSC record), passing yardage, passing

touchdowns (BSC record), completions percentage (BSC record), total offensive yards (BSC record) and total offensive touchdowns (BSC record).

After his college career, Drafts was a graduate assistant at CSU and high school football coach in the Charleston area.

Drafts doesn't plan to move full-time to Florida until he fulfills his teaching contract in South Carolina, which ends in early June. Until then, he'll be "burning up the road," he said, taking trips down to Ponte Vedra to organize a staff and make the most of spring football.

Drafts has already had reason to get down to Jacksonville before the Nease job came to fruition. He has two children in the area, and moving to be closer to them was the "ultimate motivating factor" for him, he said.

Not to mention, he believes in the potential of Nease football. The Panthers went 3-7 in 2018, 5-5 in 2017 and 3-6 in 2016, so Drafts acknowledges the challenge that is ahead, especially with the Panthers bumping up to Class 8A. But, considering his track record, a challenge has not deterred Drafts before.

"I'm looking forward to build and do something special and be at Nease longterm," Drafts said. "I think it's got all of the pieces of the puzzle, and I'm excited to get down there and get to work as soon as possible."

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
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# Tim Tebow Foundation hosts 2019 Celebrity Golf Classic at TPC Sawgrass

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
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
