





County Administrator Wanchick says one of state's wealthiest counties facing financial issues

According to St. Johns County Administrator Michael Wanchick, when it comes to the question of financials, St. Johns County's eyes might be a lot bigger than its wallet.

Wanchick spoke about the county's financial issues at the Ponte Vedra Beaches Coalition meeting on Monday. Part of the problem, Wanchick said, is a handful of challenges the community faces as a result of growth and natural disaster. He cited hurricane damage and recovery projects such as beach renourishment that have resulted in significant expenditures.

Wanchick also pointed out that St. Johns County is the third-fastest growing county in Florida, and eighth in the U.S. With population growth follows growing pains such as expanding public safety, updating libraries, increasing Parks and Recreation services and renovating the St. Johns Golf Club, he said. In addition, the county recently absorbed the town of Hastings, including its associated assets, debts, liabilities and service requirements. Part of that involved demolishing the town's civic center, which was deemed unsafe. All in all, it can be expensive to be so popular. "We talk about the No. 1 quality of life and the school system — all these things are interrelated," Wanchick said at the meeting, which was held at the Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library. "I tell people that it's great to have the No. 1 school system, but the reason we have the No. 1 school system, in my opinion, is that it's because our quality of life is so high."

Wanchick pointed out that the "quality of life" the county revolves around reflects the public services it provides. The same services that cost money also cause it to be such a valuable place to live, and in turn, bring in the type of people who place a high priority on education for their children.

Some distinctions that Wanchick said St. Johns County touts are: healthiest county in the state, low crime rate, lowest unemployment rate in Florida, abundant natural resources, diverse arts, culture and award-winning libraries. In addition, the county also has the lowest combined taxing structure in the state. Wanchick said, in fact, the county hasn't raised any taxes in the last 12 years.

"It's the same thing with Parks and

St. Johns County, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers sign multimillion-dollar agreement for beach renourishment

St. Johns County officials signed a multimillion-dollar deal with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers at a ceremony on April 23 to fund local beach renourishment.

The partnership agreement will pave the way for the renourishment of 2.5 miles of beach between Vilano and South Ponte Vedra Beach over the next 50 years. The project is estimated to cost \$144.5 million, a percentage of which the county, state and federal government will pay.

Neil Shinkre, public works director of St. Johns County, said the deal has been long-awaited.

"A lot of work has gone on for this," Shinkre said. "This is a project that has started about 15 years back, so we are really happy to see all the effort that us and the commissioners have supported and made."

Many of St. Johns County's beaches have been in need of some serious TLC due to erosion and recent hurricane damage. Because tourism is the main industry of the area, many were eager to begin the renourishment project on the depleted beaches. The project intends to add an additional 80-100 feet of sand out toward the ocean, according to Shinkre.

Currently, Shrinkre said the agreement estimates that the Army Corps will pay for 23 percent of the project. The remaining 77 percent will be paid by the county and state. Recently, however, Shinkre said the commission approved a \$1.7 million parking project to increase the number of available spaces in the corridor along the project's beaches in Vilano and South Ponte Vedra Beach. With the increase in parking, the Corps will take a larger percentage of cost, ranging upwards of 40 percent of overall cost.

"If you look at the sheer percentage increases from 23 percent to maybe 40 percent, that extra 17 percent is going to be a huge number over the long years for the county," Shinkre said. "So, for us to invest the \$1.7 million in parking, that the board approved of, is a really great return of investment for the county."

In addition, Shinkre said that the agree-

ment will also serve as a 50-year insurance policy against future hurricanes.

"The good thing about having a federal project is should a hurricane come in and take away, let's say, 50 percent of the sand that was put in, the Corps will come in immediately and put in all that sand that was gone for 100 percent of the cost," he said. "We will not have to pay anything." Shinkre said he sees the renourishment project as cementing the future of the county. It's a project, he said, that will most likely outlive him.

"It's really a closure of a lot of efforts from our administration, county administrator, public works and the Corps to get where we are today," Shinkre said. "The community should be proud."

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I am delighted to be a new resident of Ponte Vedra. One of my major concerns when I moved here was finding a Rotary Club in the area. I've been a member of Rotary for 20 years, and I wanted the opportunity to continue to serve the community in which I reside.

Not too long after I moved here, I was fortunate to meet Kelly Sastre, the president of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra. Her enthusiasm was a hook and she reeled me right in.

In Rotary, there is the opportunity to serve in a variety of venues. One of my personal objectives was to join the fight to eradicate polio worldwide.

Polio does still exist. Years ago, I was preparing for my trip to Africa. It was an expectation that I would receive specific shots. I was taken aback when my physician suggested that I also get an inoculation for polio, per recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control. When I was in grade school all children received polio inoculations. I'd not heard of polio for many years.

I was walking down a street, shopping in Nairobi and in sensory overload. I caught a sight of something in my periphery. It took a moment for me to recognize what I was seeing. It was a gentleman kneeling on a small pallet with four wheels attached to the bottom for mobility. He was wearing gloves to protect his hands from injury as he pushed himself along the sidewalk. This gentleman had been crippled by polio. It was proof that the CDC's warning was valid.

Now living in Ponte Vedra, Giusto is semi-retired, still working a few days a month for ABC News and usually covering President Trump during his weekends in West Palm Beach.

Tom Giusto

What inspired you to become a journalist?

I was inspired to become a journalist when I was working at my college radio station at Columbia University. By that time, I had already been exposed to radio and television. I started working in radio in high school, and then one of my teachers in high school was also involved in television. So, she took me under her wing and let me observe her TV programs. I always wanted to work in television because I was fascinated by the medium. But first I wanted to work in the technical side of television. I started working in the news department at the college radio station, and I got very, very interested in news. It gave me a front-row seat to history. That was also the time when television news was very popular, and the anchormen were the kings. After college, I continued on and went to graduate school in journalism at Columbia. I was fortunate. From age 4, I wanted to work in television. Here I sit 60 years later, and I was able to work in television, and I was able to make a living.

What was your most exciting assignment?

At the time, every big story you're working on is the most exciting story. When I started in New York in the 1970s, we had a big blackout. We also had the Son of Sam killer captured. The most significant story I probably worked on was Sept. 11, 2001. I was at the Pentagon after the attack and covered the Pentagon for the next 10 days. In fact, I went into the Pentagon with the TV pool the night of the attack. I can still remember how it smelled of smoke. In terms of important stories that I covered, I was the producer in the Oval Office with President George H.W. Bush the night he gave the speech after the Soviet Union fell. It was also exciting to go to Vietnam, Iraq and Guantanamo Bay. Maybe the most thrilling and dangerous thing I did was ride in a helicopter into Baghdad twice. I also once was in a motorcade along the "Highway of Death" from the airport into Baghdad. The stories I enjoyed most, however, were not the stories about politicians, kings and queens. They were about average, everyday Americans who had a story to tell and invited us into their homes because they thought others would benefit from their stories.

How has journalism transformed throughout your career?

I like to say I've seen my industry go from film to Facebook. When I started, we were shooting film, and that film had to be shot and processed. Normally, you'd get 10 minutes worth of film for a story, and God help you if you wanted to shoot more than 10 minutes worth of film. It was just too expensive. Because everything was so expensive at the time, the industry was limited to the people who had the money to do it. So, the networks had enormous influence back then, because the entire country just watched one of the three networks for their television news. We were the gatekeepers. We would decide what was important enough to put on the news and what wasn't. That's both good and bad. It's bad because, who are we, a bunch of white, elderly guys, to decide what the country could see? The good thing about it is we made, for the most part, sensible decisions about what people would see. As the me-

dium evolved to more of a digital style, and equipment plummeted in price, it opened the industry to everyone. Social media opened the spread of information to everyone, so the gatekeepers were gone. People could post things on Facebook, and it didn't matter whether or not if it were true. Now, we have all of this bad information out there and available, helping to polarize the country.

How should consumers of media respond to this transformation?

When I was back in journalism school 50 years ago, Fred Friendly used to say, there should be a course in how to watch a television program, and a course in how to read a newspaper, because you had to know the background and where it was coming from. That was 50 years ago. Today, that's necessary more than ever. People have no idea where the information they're getting on social media is coming from. People today have to be much more careful about where their news is coming from and try to avoid only getting their news from sources that are more aligned with their way of thinking.

What do you enjoy most about living in Ponte Vedra?

What I like most about the area is its beauty. It's a very nicely planned, well-landscaped, pleasant place to live, both for families and for older, retired people. You can drive around Ponte Vedra and not go anywhere that's run-down, decrepit, tacky or seedy. The weather is a plus. You're halfway between Jacksonville and St. Augustine, so you can draw on cultural aspects of both of those places. There's a beach. There's plenty to do. Ponte Vedra has high marks for me in all the areas someone would look for in a place to retire.

What do you like to do in your free time?

Outside of journalism, travel is probably what we do most. My wife and I have probably been on 60 cruises all over the world. That's our primary way of vacationing. Not only the Caribbean, but Europe, Alaska, Polynesia. We've cruised around the Middle East, around the North Sea to St. Petersburg. I like to do a little sailing from time to time. I also like going to the beach.


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

Though the sight was disarming, I must admit his challenge wasn't a priority for me. My focus was to embrace as much of Africa as I could. I was excited and I had a whole new world to discover in Africa.

Not long after my return to the United States, I accepted an invitation to go to a breakfast meeting of the local Rotary Club, an international service organization providing humanitarian service around the world. I'd not heard of Rotary and out of curiosity I accepted.

As it turned out, it was the "right time, right place" for me. The presentation was information on the status of Rotary's International project. I learned that in 1979 a Rotary Club in the Philippines committed to the complete eradication of polio. The program was such a success that Rotary International chose the project as their worldwide major project.

Since 2007, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has committed to financially aiding in the project donating millions of dollars. As of this date, Nigeria has one more year of no new cases when they can be deemed free of Polio. The only countries remaining are Afghanistan and Pakistan. The end of the existence of Polio is near.



Local resident to compete in paddle challenge from Bahamas to Florida to raise awareness of cystic fibrosis

A St. Augustine waterman will test his endurance on Father's Day weekend when he participates in an 83-mile stand-up paddleboard race from the Bahamas to Florida to raise money and awareness for cystic fibrosis.

Brian Scrone, who lives in the Vilano Beach area, will compete in the relay race with three other First Coast residents and friends, Tim O'Neal, Mike Grinney and Mike Jones. The event, Crossing For A Cure, starts in Bimini in the Bahamas and ends in Lake Worth, Florida. According to the race website, the event was inspired by the health benefits of the ocean for those living with cystic fibrosis, an inherited disorder that causes severe damage to the lungs, digestive system and other organs in the body.

Race founder and executive director Travis Suit's daughter Piper was diagnosed with cystic fibrosis at age 4 in 2011. In 2013, Suit and a few friends kickstarted the event by completing the paddle themselves to gain exposure for everyone living with the disease. Now in 2019, Scrone said 100s if not 1000s of people are involved.

"The organization is growing, and the awareness around it is growing, and it's just



an honor to be a part of it," said Scrone, a young father himself who was drawn to the father-daughter story behind the race.

Scrone helped a few of his friends train for the race in 2018, and they ultimately won. Now, he's ready to get in on the action and help support the cause.

The race will take place Friday, June 15. Scrone said his team will pull out of Bimini around midnight or 1 a.m. to complete the paddle across the Atlantic, up the Gulf Stream and into Lake Worth, which is just south of West Palm Beach.

The race, according to Scrone, takes about 12 to 15 hours to complete, which translates to each person on the relay team paddling for about three to four hours. Scrone said his team will be taking turns completing 20-minute sprints.

"You basically sprint for 20 minutes and have an hour break," Scrone said. "You keep doing that for 15 hours until you hit Florida."

Each team is required to have its own support boat. Scrone's friend from West Palm Beach, Mike Hilghman, has a granddaughter with cystic fibrosis, and he will be the team's boat captain.

To train for the race, Scrone has been competing in stand-up paddleboard races in the area, ranging in distance from 1-mile to 5-mile events. He also works hard to train in his free time, paddling in the ocean and Intracoastal Waterway near his house in the Vilano Beach area. Because the conditions for the race are unknown, Scrone has also been training in various weather and swell conditions.

With the race just over 40 days away, Scrone is most looking forward to raising money and awareness around Cystic Fibrosis. Each racer has to raise a minimum of \$1,500 in order to enter. Scrone is accepting donations online at https://bit.ly/2GL2QV0. According to the race website, proceeds from the fundraising go to helping local families with cystic fibrosis through the Piper's Angels Foundation programs. "I really got emotionally drawn into the story in some of the videos that Crossing for the Cure offers," Scrone said. "The story itself, Piper and her father and their family's story and the supporting and raising awareness of Cystic Fibrosis, is a really heartwarming story."

Rec," Wanchick said. "I don't think in the entire time I've been county administrator we've added any new field space. But we've grown by 50,000 people. ... Many of our parks are in need of upgrades and new equipment. We've got a couple playgrounds we've had to shut down. The facilities and the jungle gym don't meet the ADA requirements or they're just not safe."

The facts are, the community simply can't afford to fix its playgrounds.

"If I have one lament in the time I've been as the county administrator, it's that we are not on a financially stable path, in my opinion, for the future," Wanchick said.

Currently, the county, with the advisement of the Board of Commissioners, is looking at exploring a "Fees for Service" model for levying more funding. The model is based off the idea that individuals who use a specific service within the county pay for that service, while others who do not use it are exempt from paying. The recent Request for Proposals process for paid off-beach parking is one example of this model.

Wanchick said there has been some animosity about the idea, mostly

because people feel like the county is "nickel-and-diming" them. He stated, however, that he worries the program will create a community of "haves and have-nots."

To resolve issues like this, Wanchick stressed the importance of engagement.

"The community needs to engage in a meaningful dialogue with the County Commission," Wanchick said. "We had two public hearings about the budget after five o'clock and 12 people came. And most of them didn't speak up. So, in turn, it makes the commission guess what the community wants. ... It's your job to let them know."

Wanchick was adamant that people voice their concerns to the commissioners. He said that the "question" the commission answers, will in fact, affect the county for decades or generations to come.

"You can have a very high quality of life, but if you take it for granted, it can slip away from you," he said.

Wanchick has served as the county's chief administrative officer since 2007 and is responsible for implementing and overseeing all departments, policies and programs of the Board of County Commissioners. For those interested in voicing their concerns, Commissioner Jeremiah Blocker will be hosting a town hall Meeting on May 15, from 6 to 8 p.m. at Crosswater Hall at Nocatee.

Time to 'cycle' through some investment ideas



Karsten Jacobson Columnist If you've noticed an increase in bicycle-related events lately, it may be because May is recognized as "Bike Month" — and some cities even observe a specific Bike Week. Of course, bicycling is good exercise and an environmentally friendly method of transportation, but it can also teach us some lessons about investing.

Here are a few to consider:

■ Put the brakes on risky moves. To keep themselves safe, experienced cyclists regularly do two things: They keep their brakes in good shape, and they don't take unnecessary risks, such as whipping around blind curves. As an investor, you can combine these two actions by putting your own "brakes" on risky moves. For example, if you're tempted to buy some hot investment you heard about, you may want to think twice before acting. Why? In the first place, most "hot" investments don't stay hot for too long, and may be cooling off by the time you hear of them. And even more important, they might not be appropriate for either your risk tolerance or your need to diversify your portfolio. When you invest, you can't eliminate all risks, but you can reduce them by avoiding impulsive moves and sticking with a disciplined, longterm strategy based on your needs and goals.

■ Get regular financial tune-ups. Avid cyclists keep their bikes in good shape through regular maintenance. When you invest, you usually don't need to make a lot of drastic moves, but you should periodically "tune up" your investment portfolio, possibly with the help of a financial professional, during regular reviews. Such a tune-up may involve any number of steps, but the main goal is to update your portfolio so it reflects where you're at in life your goals, risk tolerance, earnings and family situation.

■ Protect yourself from bumps in the road. All serious bicyclists — and all bicyclists serious about keeping their heads intact — wear helmets when they are riding, because they know the dangers of rough terrain. Likewise, you need to protect yourself from the bumps in the road that could impede your progress toward your objectives. For starters, life insurance can help your family meet some essential needs — pay the mortgage, educate children and so on — in case something were to happen to you. And you may need disability insurance to replace your income temporarily if you became injured or ill and can't work for a while. Also, you might want long-term



NTE currently has two additional electric generating projects underway — the Reidsville (North Carolina) Energy Center and the Killingly (Connecticut) Energy




The program will be accompanied by two pianists and six percussionists with a large battery of instruments including various drums and timpani, marimbas and more.

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


