From swamp to second-to-none

Iconic TPC Sawgrass celebrates its 40th birthday

While others considered a 415-acre plot in Ponte Vedra Beach as nothing more than swampland more than 40 years ago, Deane Beman had a vision for something completely different and revolutionary.

One dollar and 20 years of planning later, TPC Sawgrass was raised from primordial swale to one of the most-iconic layouts in golf.

The course, which has been the permanent home to THE PLAYERS Championship since 1982, transformed the way fans watched the sport. High banks along the fairways and a favorable layout to accommodate NFL-like crowds provided a stage like no other.

For Beman, it was the culmination of a lifetime of work and vision.

"I can remember it used to be a couple thousand people watching a golf tournament – maybe 10,000 or so would watch an important event," Beman said. "Of course, today the galleries are much bigger. Building a golf course that speaks to the people coming to watch the tournament, I thought was a very important concept. It was christened stadium golf.

My idea for stadium golf goes back to the early '60s."

When Beman became the second PGA TOUR commissioner in 1974, he finally had the authority to turn his dream into a reality. At the same time, he could make TPC Sawgrass the permanent home to THE PLAYERS after bouncing from Atlanta; Fort Worth, Texas; South Florida and across the street at Sawgrass Country Club in the first eight years.

It wasn't easy to convince others of his unique plans. He had talks with then-PGA TOUR Commissioner Joe Dey as early as 1960 about building a different kind of golf course that would be more fan-friendly.

"It took Joe about five minutes to say he didn't like the idea," Beman said. "That was that. It went in the drawer and it sat there until I was responsible for building the PLAYERS Championship. I had the opportunity to build the golf course to accommodate the event and that's how stadium golf got started."

Beman bought the original plot for \$1 from Jerome and Paul Fletcher. TPC

Just in time for Halloween, a skeleton crew has docked its creepy craft at 2726 Versailles Court. A spectral helmsman steers the pirate ship, which is covered with cobwebs, skulls, ravens, spiders, the bones of rats and one skeletal dog.

It's part of a yard-wide display that also includes a pirate skeleton sitting in the outdoor swing and another greeting visitors at the front door. The terrifying tableau is the creation of the Calvo family – Shaneen and Juan and their son, Joshua.

"It was a great, fun project for the whole family," said Shaneen Calvo.

It was Joshua who first came up with the idea. Originally, he wanted to buy a pirate ship that was on sale at a nearby hardware store. But it was pricey and his mom vetoed that plan. Before long, the Landrum Middle School sixthgrader found an alternative.

"I was going to take out the trash, and I looked outside and I saw the canoe," he said.

The family transformed their canoe into a scary pirate ship – including a helm created by Joshua out of some packing Styrofoam – but its maiden voyage was a disaster. Immediately after the display was complete, torrential rains poured down all night long.

"We thought we had waterproofed it enough, but apparently we didn't," said Shaneen Calvo. "In the morning, it tipped over, and it filled up with water. It totally flooded the canoe, and it tipped over and everything broke apart."

After so much work, the Calvos were devastated. But they rebuilt, this time with better materials, including a covering of black landscaping fabric.

The pirate ship is scary enough in daylight, but nighttime casts a new light on the display – literally. Strings of scary lights are strung around the boat, and other lighting effects are in place – including light-up spiders and a projector that adds a ghost to the scene.

With the fate of trick-or-treating in doubt this year amid concerns about COVID-19, decorations like those at the Calvo home are keeping the spirit of Halloween, well, alive.

Can you tell me a little bit yourself and your background?

I am not a native of Florida, but I visited many times as a child for my dad's pilot training. I fell in love with Florida and its palm trees. I grew up in Montana but "froze to death" every winter. I knew I wanted to live in Florida sometime in the future. My husband was in the Navy when our son was born at the Naval Air Station in Jacksonville in 2002. Then, we had to move again to another base. We moved back to Florida in 2017 after my husband was transferred from Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, to Mayo Clinic Florida. So it only took me about 14 years to get back to Florida. My husband and I both have backgrounds mental health. He is a psychiatrist, and I used to work as a psychiatric nurse practitioner. It is a good fit for me to take part in pet therapy.

Tell me about your work with Pet Partners of North Florida. What does the organization do?

I am new to Pet Partners of North Florida (PPNF). I became a registered handler in July 2020. I have wanted to take part in pet therapy for many years, but it took me a while to find the right dog. An animal must demonstrate the willingness to welcome people into their private space, be reliable and be predictable. It might take the handler and animal more than once to pass the team evaluation. After I became registered, they kindly asked me to become the co-chair of PPNF. The chair and co-chair coordinate the social media footprint of the organization, fundraisers, visits and assist in testing evaluations.

Pet Partners of North Florida is a nonprofit community partner of the international organization, Pet Partners. As a community partner, we provide the training and assistance to current and prospective teams to become registered therapy animal volunteers in northern Florida. We have over 100 registered teams, and last year we logged 24,000 visits.

The pet therapy visits are the most rewarding part of being a member of Pet Partners of North Florida. The main goal of the visits is to improve an individual's well-being and health through the human-animal bond. There are a multitude of opportunities for therapy including assisted living facilities, reading programs in schools, hospice programs, women's shelters, veterans' organizations, and even colleges to help students manage stress during exams. PPNF recently partnered with the University of North Florida to help bring animal-assisted activities to Nemours Children's Hospital.

One important mission has to do with the COVID-19 pandemic, which has caused disruption in our ability to visit hospitals, but we have started to visit independent living and assisted living facilities. The pandemic has led us to broaden our horizons to look for other areas to bring stress relief besides hospitals, such as corporate visits and first responders. We recently were invited to visit Amazon and the Riverside Park Apartments for independent living.

We often hear about dogs being enlisted to brighten lives and provide animal therapy, but pet Partners works with nine different pet species. Are rabbits, horses, and other pets pretty much interchangeable from a therapy perspective?

Therapy benefits occur because of a strong humananimal bond. It is unique for each individual what species of animal would invoke that strong bond. I had one individual come up to me and ask specifically for a



rabbit. Sometimes, our animals remind people of their own past pets. For example, another individual who was residing at an assisted living facility was excited that my dog was a miniature Australian shepherd. The last dog that she owned had been an Australian shepherd. So it really comes down to choosing an animal that rekindles those memories of their own experiences or other beliefs and causes physiological and emotional changes. These changes result in reduced stress, lower anxiety and even increases in oxytocin — a natural hormone that triggers feelings of social bonding and well-being.

What do you find most rewarding about your work with Pet Partners?

The most rewarding part of working with Pet Partners is bringing joy to individuals in such a stressful time. The pandemic has been hard on everyone and has

resulted in individuals being isolated from others. Being a part of Pet Partners also jibes with my love for dogs. It is fun to work as a team with my dog, Mia. Animals have their own minds and are often independent thinkers. It has been fun to work with Mia and develop a working relationship. One could say that one of my hobbies is taking care of my three dogs.

How do corporations, facilities or individuals request a visit?

It is quite easy to request a visit. Just go to our website for Pet Partners of North Florida and click on the "request a pet therapy visit" link. now is the mothership of a network of 30 other spectator-friendly stadium courses around the

But none are more revered than the first, TPC Sawgrass.

"I'm particularly proud of it," Beman said. "A lot of people were involved in getting it done. It was difficult to do. A lot of people said it couldn't be done. We prevailed over an extended period of time to bring it about. We made sure it served, not only the players, but served the public's interest.

"For a lot of reasons, the concept of stadium golf is very, very successful. [Sawgrass] was the first stadium golf course built. Others have been built after it. One that you would recognize would be Phoenix [TPC Scottsdale Champions Course]. I think the last number that I saw was the Phoenix Open got 300,000, 400,000, 500,000 people. Years ago, that was unheard of."

With the U.S. Open being conducted by the USGA; the Masters being run as an invitational; the PGA Championship being part of the PGA of America; and the British Open being the flagship event of the R&A, THE PLAYERS is the biggest tournament on the PGA TOUR schedule because the players are the stakeholders of the Tour and the course.

Although Beman clearly was ahead of his time, TPC probably has evolved into something grander than his original expectations.

But it all started with one man's dream — and a single dollar.

- K9s For Warriors Resource Center will be a four-unit residential training center where graduates of K9FW can come for recertification, additional training, or pairing with a second service dog upon the retirement of their initial dog.
- Association of Service Dog Providers for Military Veterans (ASDPMV) is a collaboration of 14 organizations like K9FW, providing lifesaving service dogs to our veterans suffering from PTSD, traumatic

brain Injury and military sexual trauma.

- Service Dog Pass works with access providers including major airlines, rideshare companies, hotel chains and others to ensure that veterans have free and unfettered access to the world with their service dogs.
- K9s For Warriors Research Institute partners with researchers and universities to conduct lifesaving research and fight veteran suicide. The Research Institute is advocating for legislation through the Department of Veterans Affairs to fund lifesaving service dogs, fight fake "service dogs," and pioneer programs to study military sexual trauma.
- The Fire Watch is Northeast Florida's fight to end veteran suicide. It coordinates local resources with veteran service

Benefits of new approach to learning for students

- No more weather days. Many school districts include extreme weather days into their calendars, adding on extra days at the end of school year to meet the specified number of educational days. Remote learning can take over in these times and keep school districts from having to pad calendars.
- Convenience: The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that middle and high schools start at 8:30 a.m. or later to provide students the best chance to get the amount of sleep they need. Still, most

adolescents currently start school before 8:30 a.m. Remote learning enables students to complete their assignments when it works best for them. This may help them get more sleep, too.

■ **Apps:** Learning apps are a new wave of educational tools that have helped buoy virtual instruction. Primary school students or those with individual education plans may benefit the most from reinforced app skills that match their learning pace in fun ways.

Virtual home instruction may become a large part of the educational landscape even after it's no longer a social distancing necessity.

Blessings in a Backpack seeks help amid pandemic

What do the following places have in common? The inside of old pillows, mailboxes at empty homes, tree nooks, a best friend's porch and the space behind a toilet that doesn't work. These are places hungry children hide food so they won't go hungry over the weekend.

First Coast Blessings in a Backpack provides nutritious weekend meals to children who are food insecure and depend on the school federal meal program for food throughout the school week. These children leave school on Friday not knowing when or if they will eat again until Monday.

Hungry children know it's best to get food where they can and not let anyone take it away. They often complain of a headache or stomachache, because the school nurse has juice and cookies. They know school is important, and they have exceptional attendance records. They show up for school because they know they will be fed.

Chronic hunger, especially in young children, can cause immediate and lifelong negative health impacts. Weekends during the school year present a dangerous gap in nutrition for these children. First Coast Blessings addresses that gap with strategic collaborations with neighborhood schools, utilizing trained dedicated volunteers that work directly with school leaders to identify the children who are truly hungry and hurting the most.





Vote for a solid investment strategy

Election Day is little more than a week away. As a citizen, you may feel the results will affect many aspects of life in this country. But as an investor, your situation probably won't change after the votes are counted.

No matter who wins, the financial markets may well show some politically driven

volatility, but that often happens around elections, and it typically doesn't last long. But what about the longer term? How might changes in policy and new legislation affect your investment outlook?

To begin, keep in mind that many campaign promises remain just that – promises.

And even when some of them are enacted, any ultimate legislation may be quite different from what was proposed on the campaign trail.

Still, sometime in the future, we could see election-related changes that could affect your investment strategy. For example, over the years, we've seen many adjustments in the tax rates of capital gains and stock dividends, and it's likely these rates will change again one day. When that happens, you may need to look at the equities portion of your portfolio to see if you want to make some adjustments.

Many other changes, though, are hard to predict. It's possible that future legislation could affect specific industries, either positively or negatively. Such moves could also influence the way you look at certain investments, but if you have a diversified portfolio that contains a broad mix of stocks, bonds and other securities, any actions affecting one particular industry probably won't cause you to significantly adjust holdings invested in other sectors.

In fact, Underwood Jewelers is recognized as a Rolex Plaque Service Center. All of these centers are designed by Rolex with every piece of equipment either built or specified by the company so that all around the globe they are outfitted exactly the same.

Not only does this ensure consistent quality, it means travelers can rely upon any Rolex Plaque Service Center to provide the precise level of work specified by the manufacturer.


"It's pretty cool," said Dudley. "You know, you could be in France, your watch breaks, you take it to a Rolex dealer, and they'll fix it."

In addition, each service center must be certified every two years. Rolex representatives also pay visits to the shop to ensure its standards are being followed.

John Rutkowski, manager at the shop at 330 A1A North, Suite 204, said this is the first time it has had a watchmaker on staff.

Dudley, who hails from Texas and North Carolina, was first inspired to become a watchmaker when, after finishing college, he moved to the Caribbean island of St. Thomas in hopes of landing work as a sailor. Instead, he got a job at a jewelry store and learned a lot about luxury

On the advice of the local watchmaker, he enrolled in Lititz Watch Technicum,

a watchmaking school in Pennsylvania founded by Rolex in 2001. He went on to an internship with Rolex, completing his studies in 2015. He has been working for the Underwood Jewelers Corp. since then, joining the Ponte Vedra store this past spring.

Dudley said that a mechanical watch needs to be serviced every five to 10 years. That's because moving parts are subject to wear over time. Repairs typically take four weeks. During that time, Dudley replaces damaged, broken or worn parts and then uses a timing machine to ensure it runs accurately. This timing analysis takes about a week.

Other equipment tests the watch for underwater and high atmosphere pressure as well as exclusion of moisture.

Dudley also polishes and finishes the case and bracelet.
"The idea is, when I'm done with the





watch, it looks like it was never serviced," he said. "It looks brand new."

ensures the accuracy of its timing.

All of this requires a scrupulous attention to detail, precise tools and a practiced hand. But for Dudley, who considers himself an advocate for the watch, this is his passion.

"We want you to be happy and enjoy your watch, so we have to pay attention to all the little details," he said.

The Pooh way ...

So many of us bull-doze our way through life determined to become a so-called success, as we strive to be a proud card-carrying member of the society of determined people.

Regrettably, these folks often worship at the altar of his or her

accomplishments and to-do list only to realize, at some point along the success journey, their blazing tail leads to a dead-end of unhappiness and non-contentment. Some would argue that I am the poster child for this miserable voyage, as many considered me successful by industry standards while I appeared that I was "winning," but the truth of the matter, I was dying on the inside! It took me far too long to understand that sadness is what happens to folks like me who run, run, and run; chasing what we think would make us happy.

If this sounds like you or perhaps maybe someone you know, I urge you to keep reading even if you have an aversion to eastern philosophy or to "Winnie the Pooh." Yes, Pooh Bear! Stay with me, as I try to connect the dots with hope that you find this narrative thought provoking and maybe life changing.

A book, "Tao Te Ching," written 2,500 years ago by a Chinese man named Lao Tzu is considered by many scholars, as the wisest book ever written. The "Tao Te Ching" is a set of 81 short verses that are the major source of ancient Chinese philosophy called Taoism. The word Tao (pronounced dau) translates to "the way." Taoism is living philosophy, not a religion, that emphasizes being simple, sincere, and humble while following a system of beliefs, attitudes, and practices that encourages us to change our life by

changing the way we think. As you might imagine, Taoism conflicts with the generally accepted views of Western society. Nevertheless, make no mistake; there is one simple reason that the "Tao Te Ching" is the most published book second only to the Bible; its teaching transforms lives!

The "Tao Te Ching" is relatively short read, but it is very deep and difficult to understand. I suggest that to grasp Lao Tzu message, one should read or listen to the words multiple times. If you find the "Tao Te Ching's" complexity too much of an undertaking, I suggest an easier but arguably just as profound a read called, "Change Your Thoughts, Change Your Life." by my favorite author, Dr. Wayne W. Dyer. In this book, Dyer reviewed hundreds of translations of the "Tao Te Ching" and penned 81 essays on how to apply the ancient wisdom of Lao-tzu to the modern world. If we want to tackle the "Tao Te Ching" with a more elementary approach, I encourage you to consider reading "The Tao of Pooh." This engaging book centers on the premise that one can understand the fundamentals of Taoism through close reading of "Winnie the Pooh." Through brilliant and witty dialogue, the 1982 best seller mixes Chinese proverbs with quotes from the characters of "Winnie the Pooh" to give examples of different personality types that explains the Taoism.

As most of us know, Eeyore frets, Piglet hesitates, Rabbit calculates, Owl pontificates, Kanga nurtures, Christopher Robin imagines and the Pooh just is. Of course, Pooh Bear is the central character to understanding Taoism. Winnie the Pooh; our adorable bear finds great pleasure in a simple jar of honey and an afternoon with his friends because frankly, he does not need anything else. Pooh does not think much, worry, or plan. In fact, he does not do much at all and that my friend is the secret wisdom of the Taoists. Yes indeed, a simple bear, easy to please, and slow to anger, makes his peaceful and content trek through life with love in his heart.

This lifestyle may appear natural for Pooh Bear; a simple-minded mortal with no commitments or real responsibilities, but does anyone truly live this way. ... "The Pooh Way?" Sure, they do, but like most things in life, it is hard before it is easy. Please know that following the Pooh Way (Taoism) does not suggest that we should not have goals or ambition. What is paramount is the mindset that we have in achieving our goals. In other words, not worrying about them, attaching too much importance to them, or focusing on the future while snubbing the present. Instead, just let things happen.

Perhaps like you, I cannot help but ache for the simplicity of Pooh's lifestyle that comprises things like eliminating judgement of others, ignoring the seductive lure of fame and acquisition with no



- Physical distancing: Limited capacity seating is adjusted to promote CDC recommended distancing. Physical distancing is required in common areas, and when entering/exiting the venue.



Ponte Vedra wrestles with sudden loss of head coach, star QB Jacobi Myers

A season that started with such promise at Ponte Vedra High took a sudden and unexpected turn with the sudden resignation of head football coach Jeff DiSandro and the loss of all-star quarterback Jacobi Myers.

DiSandro confirmed his departure from the Sharks' sideline, saying: "Sorry, I had to step away not too long ago with some personal things."

Ponte Vedra Athletics Director Eric Frank repeated DiSandro's reason for leaving the team, adding, "It goes with the year 2020."

Defensive coordinator Brad Kessel will serve as the interim coach for the rest of the season, Frank said.

Myers, who missed all but eight plays of the 2019 season with a torn Achilles tendon, was injured two weeks ago against Bartram Trail. Sophomore Joseph Wisner will be the starter when the Sharks play at 4-2 St. Augustine this

Friday. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Myers threw for 927 yards and 11 touchdowns in five games before being injured. If and when the senior can return hasn't been determined.

"That's sports," Frank said. "You see it at the professional level all the way down to high schools. When someone goes out, somebody else has to step up."

Without DiSandro and Myers, Ponte Vedra lost 14-0 last week at Live Oak Suwannee. After starting with four consecutive victories, the Sharks now have lost two of their last three to be 4-2.

"With COVID and everything else, nothing has been normal this year," Frank said. "That's life right now. Things happen. But these kids have adapted and will succeed."

Both Ponte Vedra and Nease, which travels to Oakleaf on Friday, have earned a spot in the playoffs. Since the brackets were created by a blind draw, the regular season is little more than dress rehearsal.

"You just want to be 1-0 after the first

week of the playoffs," Frank said.

Columbia and Jacksonville Englewood open the Class 6A playoffs on Nov. 6 with the winner hosting Ponte Vedra of Nov. 13, while Nease will play at Oakleaf on Nov. 13 in the Class 8A tournament with the winner moving on to a road game at Oakleaf on Nov. 20.

Nease (1-5) lost 49-16 at St. Augustine last week. The Panthers have three regular season games remaining.

Counting a Nov. 6 home game against Creekside, Ponte Vedra has two regular season games remaining.

DiSandro came to Ponte Vedra ahead of the 2019 season after working at Bishop Kenny. He was 11-4 overall, including a trip to the 1-6A playoffs a year ago.

"No one else on the staff left," Frank said. "We have every bit of confidence in our football team. We'll get into a coaching search, but right now, the players are the only thing that matters. We're only focused on them."

also receive a commemorative golf bag designed by Erica Bennett, co-CEO of Orca Golf Bags, which is sponsoring the event.

Mark Berman of MediaShare Consulting Group in Ponte Vedra Beach got the idea for the event in January while planning his daughter's rookie schedule for her professional career. The result of his observations is the new tournament series, run as a collaboration between MediaShare Consulting Group, GenerationW and On the Green Consulting of Jacksonville, which will handle much of the tournament operations. The series will represent two of

the 14 official events on the Women's All Pro Tour, a tour for young professional women golfers who aspire to become LPGA players.

Monday, Hannah Berman spoke about the importance of the series to young golfers like herself.

"For an event like this to be here for two weeks, it allows us to get to know each other, to travel together and to elevate our games to the next level and learn how to compete against each other and hopefully keep moving up the ladder," she said.

In creating the event, Mark Berman said he wanted it to be about more than golf, that it was also about helping to empower the women and creating educational environments and opportunities to meet mentors and to mentor others.

"Hopefully, we'll be able to inspire a lot of young women and be able to hopefully help the careers of aspiring LPGA stars of the future," said Reagan Davis, general manager of World Golf Village golf courses.

Another blown lead, but this time Chargers rally to beat Jaguars 39-29

LOS ANGELES | This week the Chargers blew a 16-point lead to give the Jaguars a glimmer of hope to win their second game of the NFL season.

But, unlike blowing 17-point second quarter leads against Tampa Bay and New Orleans, the Chargers (2-4) rebounded to beat the Jaguars 39-29 Sunday at SoFi Stadium behind rookie QB Justin Herbert, who completed 27-of-43 passes for 347 yards and three touchdowns.

The Jaguars (1-6) cut the Bolts' lead to 16-8 after rookie running back James Robinson extended over the goal line for the score on a four-yard run and the Jaguars' good two-point conversion attempt.

The score was originally ruled down at the one-yard line, but Jacksonville head coach Doug Marrone threw the challenge flag, which was overturned and ruled a TD. Marrone has now won 18-of-28 challenges (64.3%) during his tenure as head coach of the Jaguars.

"One thing that's out there on the field is they're playing as hard as they can. We're just not making the plays we need to make. That is on all of us. It starts with me," Marrone said. "If you looked at all of us, I think there's a level of disappointment when you're not able to make plays and do all of that. It's hard after the game to not feel upset when you've worked so hard and put everything into it."

Robinson scored his second TD of the day on a nine-yard catch with 18 seconds to play in the half, but a failed two-point conversion attempt made it 16-14.

Robinson totaled 137 scrimmage yards, 119 rushing and 18 receiving. Through seven career games, Robinson has totaled 706 scrimmage yards, the most scrimmage yards in NFL history by an undrafted player through seven games. His 27 receptions are the most by an undrafted running back through seven career games in NFL history.

Jaguars quarterback Gardner Minshew completed 14-of-27 passes for 173 yards and two TDs. Wide receiver Chris Conley scored on a 28-yard touchdown pass from Minshew, marking the longest Jaguars TD of the season.

The sixth-year veteran has caught three TDs of at least 25 yards from Minshew in the last two seasons after posting TD receptions of 70 yards and 42 yards in 2019.

"I think every week there's good and bad," Minshew said. "That's one thing I am proud of. We've just got to keep working and put a complete game together. It hurts, but I wouldn't say we're discouraged. I think everybody is looking for a solution still."

In the third quarter, Jacksonville safety Daniel Thomas blocked a Ty Long punt and returned it 16 yards for a touchdown, becoming the fourth member of the Jaguars rookie class to score this

The Jaguars scored on a blocked punt for the fifth time in franchise history and the first since cornerback Mike Harris scored on a blocked punt in 2012.

But the third quarter belonged to Herbert, who threw two touchdowns and rushed for one.

Defensive back Tevaughn Campbell caused Jaguars' Dede Westbrook to fumble a kickoff, which was recovered by Los Angeles' Troymaine Pope at Jacksonville's 19-yard line.

"I've said before: If you talk about frustration and disappointment, I look to myself. I've got to find a way to get this team, coaches, everybody, over the top and to keep plugging away," added Marrone.

The Jaguars' bye week comes at an opportune time with the injuries from Sunday. Linebacker Dakota Allen suffered an ankle injury against the Chargers. Cornerback Sidney Jones was shaken up in the first quarter and was evaluated for a concussion. He was cleared for a concussion but later was ruled out with a back injury. Westbrook was carted off the field with a knee injury and ruled out. Running back Devine Ozigbo hurt his hamstring.


