



## Teen boy arrested in slaying of 13-year-old St. Johns County girl



Tristyn Bailey, 13, was reported missing last Sunday morning. Her body was found in a wooded area later that evening.

A 14-year-old boy has been charged with second-degree murder in the slaying of Tristyn Bailey, 13, on Sunday, May 9.

Aiden Fucci of St. Johns was in custody Monday and was being held at the Department of Juvenile Justice, according to the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office.

Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Predrag Bulic determined that the cause of death was sharp force trauma by stabbing.

Bailey, who lived in north-central St. Johns County, was reported missing by her family at about 10 a.m. Sunday. She had last been seen around midnight.

The Sheriff's Office sent out a mass notification to the public, the media and community partners. The school district was also notified.

A resident of the community, hearing the

report, began to look around the wooded area near his home and, at about 6 p.m., discovered a body later confirmed to be that of Tristyn Bailey. The body was found at the south end of a retention pond just to the east of the culde-sac of Saddlestone Drive.

Based on this and other information, authorities refocused their investigative efforts. They obtained numerous search warrants, which led to the location of multiple items of evidentiary value at the suspect's home, according to the Sheriff's Office.

The decision to charge Fucci with second-degree murder was made in coop-

eration with the State Attorney's Office. St. Johns County Sheriff Robert Hardwick said during a press conference Monday that there were no other suspects in the slaying.

Both Bailey and Fucci attended Patriot Oaks Academy, but there was no information Monday whether they shared any classes there.

Hardwick thanked members of the community who helped in the search for Bailey. He said people were lining the roads and walking the wood line. Some offered to donate food to the effort.

Hardwick said Monday the investigation was still in the earliest stages and that any new information would be shared with Bailey's family first and then become available to the public afterward.

In a statement, Hardwick asked people to keep the Bailey family in their thoughts and prayers.

## Northeast Florida COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plan approved

The Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC), a government agency that serves seven counties and 25 municipalities, announced Tuesday the official release of the Northeast Florida COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plan. The plan was formally approved through a unanimous vote of the NEFRC Board of Directors on Thursday, May 6.

The recovery plan, which outlines detailed recommendations for economic recovery, was developed by the Northeast Florida Economic Resilience Task Force, a policy group of more than 20 leaders from across the region representing local governments, regional economic development organizations, private sector compa-

nies and nonprofit organizations. The Task Force was made possible through Federal CARES Act funding allocated by the U.S. Economic Development Administration and awarded to the NEFRC in August 2020 to support economic resilience efforts related to the pandemic.

Task Force meetings facilitated in Spring 2021 identified policy recommendations across three priority areas: (1) infrastructure; (2) small business relief and support; and (3) equity. These recommendations ultimately informed the structure of the economic recovery plan.

"This plan reflects the efforts of more than 20 leaders from across the region who dedicated their knowledge, time and expertise to a planning exercise that lasted for more than six months," said Beth Payne, chief executive officer of the NEFRC. "Included in this plan are recommendations that can assist local governments and partners in continuing on a successful road to recovery."

Recommendations included in the plan relate to expanding affordable broadband access, further developing public-private partnerships, strengthening mental health resources, expanding small business support services to rural areas and a wide array of other priority topic areas.

Upon release of this plan, the NEFRC will begin an implementation process that will involve community outreach,

## FEMA approves funds to assist with dune enhancement project easements in county

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has approved funds to assist St. Johns County with partially restoring and rebuilding the sand dunes along portions of the coastline that were damaged by hurricanes Matthew and Irma.

The project is intended to enhance the dune system by adding sand to the seaward side of the existing dunes, planting sea oats and supporting vegetation and creating a more uniform front to the dune system.

If approved, and with adequate volun-

tary participation of homeowners, sand placement is anticipated to begin this summer and is projected to be completed by the end of the year.

The county is in the design phase and a separate firm, Waugh Law, has been recruited to assist owners of eligible oceanfront properties who would like to participate in the project by voluntarily granting a temporary easement.

There is no charge to participate and the easements do not allow access to front or side yards. Homeowners who wish to receive additional dune protection at no cost may sign the short-term easement and return it to Waugh Law.

The county will be unable to enhance the dunes on properties that do not provide signed easements.

## Care urged during sea turtle nesting season

Sea turtle nesting season began May 1, and St. Johns County officials are asking residents, visitors and businesses to help protect natural habitat by observing all nesting season laws and regulations.

All beachfront properties are required to reduce their impact by eliminating interior and exterior lights that may disrupt nesting sea turtles.

Volleyball court lights at St. Johns County Pier Park will turn on at sunset and turn off at 9 p.m. during this time.

Beach visitors can also have a positive impact on nesting sea turtles by taking the following actions while enjoying the beach:

■ Refrain from using fireworks and open fires.

■ Remove ruts and sand castles.

- Avoid using flashlights.
- Avoid entering sand dunes and conservation zones (15 feet seaward of the dune line).
  - Refrain from using balloons.
- Never approach sea turtles emerging from or returning to the sea.

■ Never push an injured animal back into the ocean. If an injured, sick, or deceased sea turtle is encountered, call the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office non-

emergency dispatch line at (904) 824-8304. For further information, call St. Johns County Habitat Conservation and Beach Management at (904) 209-3740 or go to www.sjcfl.us/hcp.

### Race to benefit local family is a big success

The Jager family, of Nocatee, have faced extraordinary struggles the past few months. Collin and Kelci Jager's two oldest sons, Lucah and Ian, were in a serious golf-cart accident. The accident left Lucah with a broken shoulder, which required three separate surgeries to fix, and left Ian with a head injury. Upon further inspection from doctors, Ian discovered he had a benign brain tumor (unrelated to the accident), which also required surgery to remove.

Right as the family of six were recovering from the trauma of the accident, Collin began to feel ill. He visited doctors, who ran dozens of tests, and diagnosed him with a very rare and very aggressive type of leukemia known as ALL.

The pandemic made the situation ever worse for the family, as they had to undergo rounds of treatment with extreme caution, and struggled to run their family-operated business.

Luckily, the Jagers' neighbor and close friend Rosario Arteaga knew that she wanted to find a way to help in any way she could.

"COVID-19 was full-blow; no one could truly support this family because the best thing we could all do was to stay away from them," Arteaga said.

Arteaga, with the help of other volunteers and a company known as Its Your Race, organized a Lace Up For Collin 5K race on May 8, just before Mother's Day. Arteaga said they decided on hosting

a race because they needed to find an event that could be safety held outside, with the pandemic in mind, and because of Collin's love of outdoor activities such as sports and fishing.

"We decided to find a way to show [the Jagers] that we were still there, even

though we could not be there physically," she said.

Arteaga said that the goal was to raise around \$4,000-\$5,000 for the Jager family, and they easily surpassed that goal. All money raised from the race will go directly toward supporting the Jager family as Collin undergoes the next few

years of chemotherapy and possible stemcell-transplant options.

## Don't be distracted by the markets' obsessions

There has been a great deal of activity by the new administration in Washington that has impacted the financial markets.

One day we celebrate the success of the COVID vaccines and the next day we dread the possibility of new taxes on business-

es and individuals. Another day, we see solid corporate earnings for Q1, followed by a day when corporations are chastised for their employment and environmental performance. The markets' activity has been complicated by GameStock, Tesla and BitCoin, all of which are subject to tremendous speculative investing.

It's certainly not an environment that rewards calm and rational investment styles; it encourages constant trading (using platforms such as Robinhood) and a choice-of-the-day mentality. So, for those of us who have a longer-term focus than a week or a month, what steps might we

take to protect ourselves while still seeking solid returns?

First, don't be distracted by the markets' obsession over a particular stock or sector; look for long-term trends rather than the tip of the day. Three sectors seem to warrant attention — technology related to 5G data transmission speeds, health care (given our aging population with the Baby Boomer generation inching closer each day to retirement if not already fully retired) and environmental related to the move from carbon-based fuels to other alternatives.

Second, don't forget that value investing — investing in dividend paying stocks — has typically outperformed growth investing — companies which reinvest their profits in the business — over longer time periods. While it is hard to argue with the success of the FAANG stocks (Facebook, Amazon, Apple, Netflix, Google), these companies may have a difficult time continuing to produce record profits in the face of government anti-trust concerns and the ongoing emergence of competitors. In football, the quarterback that completes a

lot of shorter passes generally scores more points than the one who completes an occasional 60-yard pass but gets intercepted frequently.

Third, diversification has always been the key to risk management but that is not a concept being touted by many investment gurus these days. They tout their "next Amazon" pick of the day and convince people to go all-in on that stock. Problem is that they are wrong at least as many times as they are right and the losses could easily outweigh the gains. Owning a bit of a number of companies and/or sectors may not bring the best quarterly gain every time but will deliver consistent results over time.

Finally, don't forget about low-risk investments such as fixed indexed annuities and life insurance as part of your strategy, particularly if you are saving for or living in retirement. Sooner or later, the bull market we've been in since the spring of 2009 will experience a correction and the magnitude of that correction could be quite significant given the imbalances in the market that currently exist.

Owning some investments that will not be impacted by a correction both offers peace of mind that your retirement won't be decimated and the freedom to invest your risk funds a bit less conservatively than would otherwise be the case.

"Everything we accomplished during my tenure as president, I attribute to God and the citizens of our beach communities," Latham said. "It's very humbling to be a part of such a compas-







## Through song and crafts, students show love for elderly

At a time when so many people are experiencing social isolation, some students from Ponte Vedra High School are bringing joy to the residents of a local assisted living and memory care community. And two sisters — one a PVHS student, the other an alumna — have been leading the effort

Before the onset of the coronavirus, the students' Senior Connections club would meet monthly with residents of The Palms at Ponte Vedra, primarily its memory care facility, to do crafts and sing songs.

For Siya and Mira Bhutani, it was a continuation of something they began years ago while living in the United Kingdom.

Then, COVID-19 necessitated a cessation to in-person visits. Still, the students found ways to carry out their mission, which Siya said, was to "put a smile on the residents' faces and make them feel happy."

#### **GETTING CONNECTED**

The sisters first demonstrated their love of serving the elderly after moving to London from their native India several years ago.

"Mira and I used to go to a care home near my school," said Siya. "We would

play ukulele and the guitar and sing for the residents."

The girls would organize games, such as mini-bowling, and because this was England, they would pass around tea at tea time.

In 2018, the girls' family moved to Ponte Vedra where Siya and Mira sought opportunities to continue their work. "I knew I had to get involved and give back to the community and spend time with the elderly," Siya said.

At PVHS, she met Senior Connections club founder Grace Littler and quickly joined. Though Mira was in middle school at the time, she too got involved.

In addition to the club activities, the Bhutani girls would visit the residents

on their own to play music and sing. Of course, it meant learning some new songs.

"In the U.K. and in India, I had never heard of 'You Are My Sunshine' or 'Polly Wally Doodle," said Siya.

Fortunately, the community's Life Enrichment Director Marylee Lewis had a booklet from which they could learn these favorites from the past.

"When we played music, a lot of (residents) stood up and danced," Siya said. "I think that just makes me so happy and so fulfilled."

#### **CHANGES**

2020 forced the sisters and the whole club to adapt to change.


For one thing, both Siya and Littler were graduating. If the club was to continue, it would need someone to take up the reins. Because Mira would be in the ninth grade in fall and because she had been actively involved, she was the perfect choice.

This year, she is the president of the club, which has 22 members.

The pandemic brought another challenge. The students could no longer meet with the residents.

So, the club members made craft items for the residents and dropped them off

### Senior communities offer lifestyles

Resort-style amenities, onsite dining, planned activities are some benefits often provided

Living life to the fullest does not need to stop when adults near or reach retirement age. Age-restricted housing communities once bore the stereotype of having limited recreational options and dated surroundings. But modern senior homes and facilities are all about catering to active lifestyles — with some communities offering resort-like amenities and pristine properties. Furthermore, certain communities provide niche offerings for people who are looking for something even a little more different.

Eligibility to live in these communities varies, but generally speaking one resident in the home must be age 55 or older. - Style of home: Homes built in retirement communities are designed to be comfortable and convenient for aging residents. Many are single-floor units. Certain communities may be comprised of apartments, condos or townhouses, while others may be single, detached residences.
- Amenities: When comparing agerestricted communities, consider the amenities available. Do they include on-site dining, transportation, travel assistance, pools, fitness centers, walking trails, or outdoor sports facilities? Some communities have "aging in place" amenities, which means residents can move from independent living to assisted living to skilled nursing care as their needs change. Make a list of interests and then match them to a community that fits your needs.
- Costs: Costs vary considerably. Investopedia advises seniors to consider the community's location and what is being offered, as these factors will affect costs. In addition to rent or mortgages, most communities also have monthly maintenance or homeowners association fees that need to be compared and considered.

with Lewis. In November, they made goody bags and filled them with assorted chocolates. In December, they made personalized wooden ornaments and wrote residents' names on them. They made posters for winter, spring and St. Patrick's Day. For Valentine's Day, they made giant chains of hearts, also inscribed with residents' names.

"It's been a challenge," said Mira, "but I think we've done pretty good so far."

In addition, Mira and Siya – who is studying biology on the pre-med track at the University of Florida - launched a YouTube channel for the residents to watch. On the channel, the sisters perform the songs residents love.

The channel is a hit. Siya said Lewis told her that the residents enjoy seeing the sisters "on TV."

"I thought that was really cute," Siya

The enrichment that the sisters and all the Senior Connections club members bring to the residents no doubt helps at a time when they may not be able to visit with grandchildren.

But these young volunteers gain something similar in return: a relationship they might have with a grandparent.

"When we moved to the U.K., we didn't have our grandparents anymore because they were back in India," said Mira. "And we saw the elderly as kind of our grandparents. They were just so lovely, and I enjoyed just spending time with them. And as much as they felt happy, I felt even happier to be with them."



## Hurricane planning important in times of Alzheimer's, COVID-19

This is Hurricane Preparedness Week, a time for Floridians to get ready should there be a hurricane. This is especially important when making plans to meet the specific needs of someone living with Alzheimer's or another dementia.

Planning ahead can prevent injuries and help the person with the disease to feel more relaxed and less overwhelmed should an emergency situation occur.

Due to the pandemic, being prepared for such extraordinary circumstances may look a little different than in previous years. The Alzheimer's Association offers additional guidance, including:

■ Plan ahead. Due to COVID-19, existing safety plans for disaster situations may have to be adjusted. If the person lives in a residential facility, learn about its disaster/ evacuation plans and who is responsible for evacuating the person in the event of an emergency. Be sure plans accommodate specific needs, such as personal

protective equipment, a walker or portable oxygen.

- Put together an emergency kit in a watertight container and store it in an easily accessible location with important legal and medical documents, extra clothing, face masks, cleaning supplies, identification items and an extra supply of medications. Make sure medical and health records are accessible and attainable by people other than the primary caregiver.
- Stay current on evacuation plans. Many states at risk for natural disasters, such as hurricanes, have adjusted evacuation plans due to the pandemic. This may mean less room is available at shelters or new shelters may have been added. Keep up with updated plans from state and local public agencies as it may affect your action and available resources and facilities. When appropriate, share the diagnosis with others, such as hotel or shelter staff, so they can better assist.



This summer, the Florida Agricultural Museum will be hosting two camps for children, a theater camp and a horse camp.


The theater camp, dubbed the Fuzzy

### Learning chess can be a fun and engaging activity

When looking for summer camps to enroll their children in, some parents might not be immediately drawn to the idea of a chess camp, but the curriculum at this local after-school enrichment program might just change their minds.

Reb Phillips created the Knight School about five years ago after falling in love with the concept one of his college friends had created. This concept involved teaching chess in a fun, fast and dynamic environment with a curriculum unlike normal.

"The things that chess teaches," said Phillips, "the puzzle solving, the complexity of the game and the way it makes kids immediately engage ... it is amazing to me."

Before the pandemic hit, the Knight School offered after-school programs at nearly 40 schools within the St. Johns and Duval counties, with around 400 kids enrolled, but they were forced to switch to online programs once the schools shut down.

The virtual classes turned out to be a blessing in disguise, according to Phillips, because the Knight School was able to

grow due to new, online resources.

Now the Knight School is only in a handful of schools for after-school programs but is gearing up for a very busy summer of camp programs.

Knight School summer camps will be offered at five different schools within the two counties, with week-long programs where kids will be taught the ins and outs of the complex game while also developing their social skills.

"Not only is it this critical thinking

game, but also a very fun and social activity for the kids to engage in," said Phillips. "It just activates their brain on a whole other level."

The Knight School's summer camp programs are already filling up but do still have spaces available. On top of their camps, the school also offers private lessons (either in person or via virtual outlets) that nclude one-on-one sessions and a more in-depth opportunity to learn the complex game of chess.

### Camps

"Once Upon a Time in the Faraway Forest." Lake said that campers will play fun, introductory theater games, get to know their counselors, and then set out creating their own play. Once the kids formulate ideas, Lake will work to turn those ideas into a script. Children will then have the hands-on experience of building set pieces (of cardboard and other materials), and their own costumes. Performances of each play will happen at the end of the coordinating week with a performance free for the public.

The horse camp, which is one of the museum's most popular programs, is best suited for new rides and children between the ages of 8-16 years old. For the weeklong program, campers will learn horse safety, equine behavior, identification of breeds, grooming, tacking up, ground handling and other basic riding skills.

Campers are also encouraged to pack bathing suits for fun days such as sprinkler days and their end of the week lake party, where the horses will join in on swimming.

A previous social media challenge known as the Bird Box Challenge involved people being inspired by Netflix's meme-worthy original movie "Bird Box." Individuals blindfolded themselves while attempting daily tasks.

Newer challenges on the popular

TikTok app have people replicating dance moves or lip-synching to popular songs. The Until Tomorrow challenge asks people to post embarrassing photos of themselves.

#### THE DARKER SIDE OF CHALLENGES

Most social media challenges are created with fun in mind, and children and parents are joining in on the entertainment. But like other aspects of social media use, challenges have a potential dark side as well. According to the Daily Mail, 130 teenagers committed suicide due to a challenge called The Blue Whale. In this challenge, young participants embarked on a series of feats over 50 days that became more complicated and dangerous as time went on, causing injuries to animals and participants.

The Miami Herald reported last year that children were injured from the Skullbreaker Challenge, which was a challenge involving two pranksters and an unsuspecting individual, who had his or her feet kicked out from under while jumping in

Other dangerous challenges have involved kids playing with fire, erasing their skin with pencil erasers and balancing on the top of cars while they were in motion.

#### **COMMUNICATION NEEDED**

Families can have open conversations about social media use and touch on the popularity of new challenges - pinpointing what is safe and what is not. Parents are urged to always monitor kids' social media use so they can stay up-to-date about any challenges their children are considering.

Kids can be encouraged to speak to their parents or adults at school about pressures from peers to engage in challenges that may make them leery.

the Fourth of July, as the local residents celebrate Independence Day — unaware that their sleepy hamlet will soon be turned upside down thanks to the arrival of Professor Harold Hill (Thom Bradford).

A smooth-talking traveling con man, Hill's current scam involves selling boy's bands – a feat he accomplishes by creating a "need" for said band by stoking fears over the arrival in town of a pool table ("Trouble"). He soon has worried mothers forking over their cash for instruments, instruction booklets and uniforms – but until the goods arrive and Hill can skip town, he has to avoid the skepticism of the town's mayor (Alec Hadden) and its frosty librarian/music teacher, Marian Paroo (Kathryn Nash).

While "The Music Man" is set at the turn of the last century, the themes it explores have remained surprisingly current. In the charismatic Professor Hill, who excels at manufacturing a need for his unnecessary product, one can see echoes of today's infomercial pitchmen. ("But wait! There's more!") The show also offers shrewd observations on small-town life from gossiping women ("Pickalittle") to fear of outsiders ("Iowa stubborn"). And it does so with a near-perfect score: From "Trouble" and "Seventy-six Trombones"

to "The Wells Fargo Wagon" and "Till There Was You," "The Music Man" offers up one musical theater standard after

The Alhambra's cast displays great chemistry – a fact that is perhaps due to this production being a family affair. As Professor Harold Hill and Marian Paroo. real-life husband and wife Thom Bradford and Kathryn Nash embody their parts perfectly. As con man Harold, Bradford evokes just the right combination of tricky con man and troubled conscience, as he finds himself for the first time second guessing his choice of profession. Bradford's vocals also are wonderfully reminiscent of the great Robert Preston, who originated the role on Broadway and starred in the popular feature film version.

Nash is equally well-suited to the role of Marian, and her lilting soprano is one of the best vocal performances the Alhambra has seen in years. Nash's mother and brother also share the stage with her and Bradford in this production.

As Mayor Shinn, Alec Hadden provides just the right amount of clueless pomposity, while Trey Murphy as young Winthron Paroo is a standout on his songs, including "Gary, Indiana." The show also features great choreography that is particularly faithful to the film version.

Much like Professor Hill's stay in River City, The Alhambra's production of "The Music Man" has been extended through June 13. See it if you can.



## Sharks advance to regional final

Ponte Vedra baseball continues hot streak, beats Stanton in 5A semifinals

Ponte Vedra defeated Stanton 7-3 at Shark Park on Tuesday evening to advance to its first regional final since its state championship run in 2013.

The Sharks broke a 1-1 tie in the fourth inning by scoring four runs, and then used the pitching duo of freshman Matt Hoag and senior Scott Griesemer to earn its third consecutive victory in the FHSAA playoffs.

Veteran head coach Tom Stanton was more than pleased with his team's win over a Stanton team that had earlier nipped the Sharks 2-1.

"I like the way were playing now," said Stanton, the only head baseball coach in PVHS history. "Our focus has

always been to play our best ball at the end of the season, and I feel were doing exactly that at this time."

Stanton may have surprised some Sharks followers when he started freshman Matt Hoag in the contest instead of his leading pitcher on the season, UNF commit Griesemer.

"That was our plan all week," said Stanton. "Hoag has become a very advanced pitcher of late, and we were


confident he would deliver. Griesemer has been pitching all season on six-to-seven days' rest and we felt it best to have him in reserve to finish out the game."

Kelly "played the match of his life" at the state level, said Weiland, beating Doral's top player.

The score was 8-8 and Kelly's opponent missed both of his serves. Kelly had match point and dove for a volley, a move Weiland said he hasn't seen more than a few times in all his years playing tennis.

Kelly's opponent hit it out, and Kelly won the point. Unofficially, the late tennis legend Tony Trabert joined the team in its quest for victory.

Trabert, a 10-time major champion and 1970 International Tennis Hall of Fame inductee, died Feb. 3 at the age of 90 at his home in Ponte Vedra Beach. He had been a high school teammate of Weiland's father, Dick Weiland, in 1946-47. They attended Walnut Hills High School in Cincinnati, Ohio.

"So, I had stayed in touch and sort of got to know him," Weiland said.

In fact, Ponte Vedra High School named its tennis center after Trabert in 2016.

Trabert died just after the start of the 2021 season.

"It was very sad for me and a lot of people in the community," Weiland said. "So I told the guys about Tony at the beginning of the season. I brought out some old wood rackets; one of them was Tony's racket. It was a signature Tony racket with his picture on both sides."

At the first match, Weiland carried Trabert's racket and said, "Tony's going to be a part of us this season."

After that, someone always carried the racket at each match.

Looking ahead, Weiland is optimistic.

"We have a young team," he said. "Only one of our top players is graduating. That's promising."


