County imposes restrictions on short-term rentals

Short-term vacation rentals in St. Johns County will see some new restrictions under action taken earlier this month.

By a unanimous vote, the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners on May 4 approved changes to the land development code regarding the rental properties.

The action is expected to provide some relief for homeowners who live near rentals, but some affected landlords see the amendments as having a negative impact on their source of business.

The vote came two months after the county last addressed the issue. At that time, the board approved hiring two ad-

ditional code enforcement officers to work weekends when, some homeowners say, violations have been committed.

The issue arises primarily from concerns about noise, parking and trash due to large groups of renters acting irresponsibly.

The commission had postponed action on the amendments until after the state legislature addressed a pair of bills on the docket for the latest session. These bills would have impacted county governments' ability to impose restrictions on local rentals.

Both bills died in committee.

One of the key provisions of the amended code is a reduction in the number of people who can occupy a rental property at one time. It limits by half the 20 previously allowed.

The changes will be phased in so that landlords who have invested in enlarging their properties to accommodate more renters will be able to benefit from their investments, to a degree at least.

As of May 4, 2022, the maximum transient occupancy drops to 17. One year later, it is reduced further to 14. On May 4, 2024, it falls to the permanent limit of 10.

An accommodation was made for children. Those age 12 and younger do not count toward the maximum of 10.

The occupancy is further restricted if the rental is smaller. Two people are allowed per sleeping room, as well as two for the common room. In addition, one parking space must be provided for every three occupants.

To limit the amount of garbage sitting out, the board imposed a 36-hour time frame when trash receptacles may be placed outside.

Trash may be put out the night prior to scheduled pickup, no earlier than sunset, and cans must be taken in again no later than sunrise of the day following pickup.

The commission also mandated that landlords get identification from the renter who is responsible.

In cases of violations, fines would first be imposed upon the renter. If, however, there are three violations within a 180-day period, the property owner may be held responsible.

Jay Fund Celebrity Golf Classic returns to the course

Celebrities, community come together to raise support, awareness for families tackling childhood cancer

A quarter century after coach Tom Coughlin launched the Jay Fund Foundation Celebrity Golf Classic, the initiative to help families facing childhood cancer is still going strong.

The event was held virtually last year due to COVID-19, but golfers returned to the course this week for the 26th annual event, which was held in partnership with The PLAYERS at TPC Sawgrass. As in the past, the tournament had the full complement of 155 players.

The two-day event began Sunday night with a celebrity dinner and auction and continued Monday with tournament play.

Returning to the course this year, Coughlin was all smiles.

"It feels like a perfect day for golf," he said, adding, "We're excited. I mean, it's just fun to get back into the swing of things, continue to build relationships, continue to find new friends involved in helping the Jay Fund."

He said the players were ready to get out on the course the prior evening.

"We had to hold them off a bit," he joked.

The Celebrity Golf Classic raises funds and awareness, helping families with financial, emotional and practical support so that they can put all their resources and energies toward helping their children get better. In its first 25 years, the foundation raised nearly \$9 million at the Celebrity Golf Classic.

Coughlin called the work of the Jay Fund critical.

"There's nothing worse than hearing your child has cancer," he said, adding, "The Jay Fund is there to support them, to help them in all the practical ways – keeping a roof over their heads, food on the table, gas in the tank. All of those things. And, unfortunately, funeral expenses."

He said the foundation was proud to be a help in the community.

Beak performance: Record-breaking amount raised at Rubber Ducky Regatta

"This is a dream come true."

Those were the words of Ann Breidenstein, CEO of Learn to Read of St. Johns County, moments before the seventh annual Rubber Ducky Regatta kicked off last Sunday.

"To have [the duckies] dumped over the bridge is something we've always wanted, and it took the partnership of Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra to get it done," Breidenstein told those assembled at Palm Valley Outdoors Bar & Grill.

The restaurant was the headquarters for this year's event (which, in years past, had been held in the lazy river of Nocatee's community water park). The new location proved to be a great fit for the event as beautiful weather greeted onlookers watching the spectacle of 3,028 rubber duckies being dropped from the 210 bridge into the Intracoastal waters below.

Several Rotarians and their families took to the water in boats and kayaks to corral the duckies — even when the tide and wind worked against them. About 20 volunteers from the local high schools of Bartram Trail, Creekside and Nease helped work the event on land.

What are some of the challenges in your industry, and how do you meet them?



I'm addicted to reading. Long story about speed-reading classes in high school. I love dining out very frequently, and along with my "amigos" I love to travel.




NOCATEE FARMERS MARKET GOES TO EXTREME HEIGHTS



KATHY'S GARDENING GUIDE

"Mother Nature has the best box of crayons."

We have been highlighting some of the most popular landscaping genres that I see here in Northeast Florida.

Many homeowners choose to stay within one type of landscaping design to create the beautiful ambience they are picturing. In the next month,

you will learn what plants, palms and flowers are used to create a tropical landscape, Mediterranean landscape, traditional landscape and coastal landscape.

COASTAL LANDSCAPE

What do you think of when someone says coastal landscaping? Landscaping with minimal lines, very flowy, not neat and tidy. Coastal landscaping takes an organic approach to landscaping with plants "blowing in the breeze." Most popular colors used are whites, greens,



blues and splashes of pink. We usually cluster grasses such as muhly or fountain grass to create the windy look. Another great addition to coastal landscaping is the addition of climbing vines, such as confederate jasmine. Use a trellis or pergola to climb the vine to create your oasis. Coastal landscaping is very relaxing and reminds you of the

beach, if it's not already in your backyard!

When creating an whimsical coastal landscape, we can use a mixture of the following:

- Palms: sylvesters, queen palms and bismarcks and ribbon palms.
- Plants and flowers: mully grass, fountain grass, gaillardia, gaura, dune sunflower, dwarf fakahatchee, foxtail fern, blue daze, confederate jasmine and sea oats on dunes.

With all landscapes, the key to success is knowing the

sun/shade ratios in your yards, as well as what each plant requires and planting accordingly. Annuals are always welcome in any landscape to add seasonal color to your gorgeous design.

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New scholarship for Nease, PVHS seniors announced

The Palm Valley Community Association (PVCA) and the Palm Valley Community Charities (PVCC) have announced the update to their annual scholarship for graduating seniors from both Allen D. Nease High School and Ponte Vedra High School.

"Many may not realize there are hundreds of students living in St. Johns County navigating high school while experiencing challenging circumstances, such as homelessness and food insecurity," said Beacham Still, PVCC board president.

The Palm Valley Community Association worked closely with St. Johns School Board member Kelly Barrera and the administration of both high schools. All agreed that the purpose of the new Perseverance Award is to reward students who have risen to school and life challenges with grace and determination.

The recipients do not apply; instead, they are selected by their schools and approved by the PVCA Board.

"After much discussion regarding the needs of our local high school students, both the PVCA and PVCC boards agreed to update our scholarship program," said Garry Philips, PVCA board president. Heartworm tests important part of pet care

The American Heartworm Society advises dog owners to have their furry companions tested for heartworm annually. Such tests can typically be conducted during routine preventive care visits to the veterinarian.

The AHS notes that such tests are necessary even for dogs that are taking yearround heartworm prevention medications. Tests can confirm that such programs are working or indicate if they are not effective. The American Veterinary Medical Association notes that antigen tests are the most commonly performed tests. These tests detect the presence of adult female heartworms and they are typically highly accurate. If a test is positive, veterinarians may recommend further testing, includ-

ing radiographs, a blood profile and an echocardiogram. Such tests can determine a number of things about the infection, including its severity.

The AVMA also notes that the additional testing can help determine the best course of treatment. Cat owners should know that it's more difficult to detect heartworm in cats than in dogs. The AHS

indicates that cats are much less likely than dogs to have adult heartworms, making the disease harder to detect in felines. Veterinarians may recommend cats receive both the antigen test and an antibody test, which detects exposure to heartworm larvae. The AVMA notes that more testing may increase the likelihood of detecting the disease in cats.

volunteer services, in a press release.

The Pet Therapy Program began in the late 1990s but did not really pick up popularity until the last decade or so. The rise in popularity comes from new studies conducted on the benefits of therapy animals in social and medical situations, such as their ability to lower blood pressure and decrease stress/anxiety.

Maria Oehler, a Pet Therapy Program volunteer with Community Hospice, has been bringing her therapy animals to patients in long-term facilities for years now. All pet therapy volunteers are onboarded through other therapy teams and trained on how to assist patients. The animals brought to the therapy program are all registered through the state.

Not only do the dogs in the Pet Therapy Program benefit the patients, but Oehler said the animals also help both the families and the staff, too. They can often provide

It is easy for the dogs to develop relationships with the patients Oehler visits in the facilities, and she said it can sometimes be difficult for the animals when the people they have formed relationships with are no longer around, but the joy that the dogs bring and the light in people's faces can make it all worth it.




"I have shown dogs for over 40 years," said Oehler. "I would give it all back just to do this. Nothing I have ever done with my dogs has been as rewarding as this."



Strength training first

As a physical therapist, many of my patients are surprised when I recommend strength training first to those who have not exercised for a while.

Many people have the false belief that cardio training should be first. The fact is that strength training offers a variety of health and fitness benefits in much less time than cardio training. It also offers benefits that you do not typically get from cardio.

When done correctly, strength training also has a significantly lower risk of an exercise-related injury and is appropriate for adults of all ages and abilities. Almost anyone can learn to do it effectively and safely in just a few sessions.

INTENSITY MATTERS A LOT

One of the advantages of strength training is the high level of intensity control you have during training. The reason this matters is that we know that a higher intensity of effort during training produces amazing results in much less time. Essentially, your training stimulus is telling your body (and brain) to improve everything. This method is fully adjustable to your individual abilities.

REVERSING MUSCLE DECLINE

After age 35, we see a significant decrease of lean muscle and strength with each year. While this process is natural, it is very undesirable since it has a negative impact on how we feel and how our body functions as a whole. Doing cardiovascular exercise is an inefficient strategy for reversing muscle loss.

Strength training reverses muscle decline very effectively and in much less time than most people think. As little as one session of about 20 minutes per week is sufficient for most people.

What you need to know about aging eyes: May is Healthy Vision Month

In the United States, the leading causes of blindness are age-related. If you're over age 60, you're at risk for a whole host of eye diseases, and yet recent surveys show less than half of individuals receive regular eye exams. If you think your eyes don't need ongoing care, you may be taking

risks with your sight. Age-related eye conditions develop slowly, and patients often don't notice the signs until it's too late. This May Healthy Vision Month, take the time to review some of the common age-related eye conditions and options to preserve your vision.

CATARACTS

Cataracts are a clouding of the normally clear lens of the eye, and they can begin to develop in your 40s and 50s. Cataracts develop slowly and painlessly over time — in fact, in the early stages, symptoms may be so mild that you don't even realize your vision is changing. But as a person ages, cataracts grow to the point where they can get in the way of living an active, independent life.

In the long run, cataract surgery may be your best option to restore sight. The latest technology is laser cataract surgery, which uses a precise form of energy to remove the cataract. This results in a gentler procedure with effective results.

GLAUCOMA

An estimated 50 percent of glaucoma patients don't realize they have this common eye disease. When left untreated, glaucoma can lead to blindness — and by the time patients realize, it's too late to save vision. That's why early detection and diagnosis are crucial for effective treatment.

Some patients may be treated with the use of eye drops, but some need laser treatment or various incisional eye surgeries. For these patients, a Selective Laser Trabeculoplasty can be used as a safe and effective treatment. Among the available treatments for glaucoma are the trabulectomy and tube shunts.

AGE-RELATED MACULAR DEGENERATION

Goodwill helps those with barriers to find work, CEO says

Ask someone what they know about Goodwill, and they will likely tell you it's a thrift store.

And that's not incorrect. But it is incomplete.

In fact, Goodwill is a source of employment opportunities for many people, especially those who face challenges in getting hired.

"We're a local not-for-profit organization dedicated to removing barriers to employment," according to David Rey, CEO and president for Goodwill Industries of North Florida. "We do that through education, training, placement services and career opportunities. We have a vision of a community where every persons finds meaningful employment and career opportunities."

Rey spoke Wednesday, May 12, at a virtual Chamber at Noon meeting of the Ponte Vedra Division of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce.

Goodwill of North Florida operates 19 retail stores and 20 donation centers in its 14-county territory, as well as a 19,000-square-foot e-commerce distribution center, and employs nearly 850 people.

Through military contracts, about 33 people with severe disabilities are employed to serve food at NAS Jacksonville and Naval Station Mayport.

In 2012, the organization acquired Landscape Consultants Inc., which employs 45.

"We're always looking to employ, and offer that opportunity to anyone with a barrier," said Rey.

But Goodwill is more than an employer. It is also a resource.

It operates free career centers, where people can search for a job, work on a resume, use a computer and apply to positions. Last year, 30,000 people took advantage of these services.

In addition, 300 high school students have gotten work through internship programs in Duval County.





The organization has also added the GoodwillTemps program, a community-based, nonprofit, alternative staffing organization that provides soft skills and industry-specific training, education and employment services.

It offers temporary, temporary-to-permanent and direct-hire opportunities and serves 15 organizations.

"Anyone looking for an immediate position, a quick job right away, we can put them to work," Rey said.

In Duval County, Goodwill is the lead agency for Take Stock In Children, providing mentorship to about 360 high school students. The program's success can be gauged by the students' graduation rate: 98%.

One of its big successes is the Academic Support Through the Employment Process (A-STEP) program. It helps working adults access higher education in order to raise earning potentials and job security.

The program helps to get people enrolled in a vocational school or certification program. So far, almost 190 adults have graduated through A-STEP.

These opportunities are made available due to the thrift stores for which Goodwill is most well-known. Donations to the stores essentially turn into jobs.

"This is all we ask of the community: To support Goodwill by donating their gently used items," said Rey.

The singers proved they were up to the challenge. The chorus received a near perfect score, winning both their class and the competition as a whole.

At Thursday's concert, the chorus performed the two classical pieces from the competition before launching into the concert proper.

In the first half of the concert, the Honors Women's Chorus performed songs by the 1970s Swedish pop group Abba, which were featured in the Broadway hit "Mama Mia!"

Chorus member Genevieve Bahr said her favorite part of the whole concert was during one of the pieces from the show, "I Have A Dream," because she got to sing in a small group with Blythe and Alexis.

In the second half, the Honors Mixed Chorus presented songs from the musical "Come From Away," which tells the story of how a small Canadian town cared for 6,579 airline passengers stranded there on Sept. 11, 2001, when 38 planes were diverted to its doorstep.

"It's a really neat story about people coming together," said Poe.

Alexis said her favorite part of the concert was a duet that she and Seth Relampagos sang. "Stop the World" is about two of the passengers — one from Texas, the other from England — who meet as a result of the forced landing.

"It's actually a lovely and a very true love story, and I think it's really awesome to portray something so amazing that happened in real life," Alexis said.

Poe praised the students for their resiliency and desire to continue learning despite the challenges they faced.

"I think it's really been good for the kids to have their normal activities back in some fashion, even though we're not exactly normal yet," said Poe. "They're very excited, more so, I think, than before COVID. I think they're not taking things for granted like they maybe once did. I think our students are really hungry for learning and opportunities, because they truly missed them when they didn't have them."

And perhaps nothing said that better than their concert, where the chorus demonstrated that obstacles cannot stop beautiful music where singers persevere.


