### **Publix buys Sawgrass Village Shopping Center**

The Sawgrass Village Shopping Center is under new ownership. It has been purchased by PSM Sawgrass LLC, which is affiliated with Publix Super Markets, the primary tenant of the shopping center. The deed was recorded with the St. Johns County Clerk of Courts office on Sept. 16.

The sale price is listed as \$82 million. The 7-acre property has a \$10.4 million taxable value, according to the county property assessor.

In July 2010, Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Co. foreclosed on the property. The owner was then listed as Sawgrass Village Shopping Center LLC.

The purchase includes three buildings, which house various businesses, especially Publix and

CVS Pharmacy.


Publix was founded in 1930 in Winter Haven and today has 1,306 store locations in seven states, 838 in Florida. It also has 10 distribution centers, one on Jacksonville, and 10 manufacturing facilities. It is the largest employee-owned company in the United States, employing more than 230,000 people.

The purchase would bring to 370 the number of locations where Publix owns both the building and the land it is on. The remainder are either leased or located on land that is leased, according to the company's 2021 annual report.

Retail sales last year came to \$48 billion, a 7% increase over 2020, according to the company's 2021 annual report.

PSM Sawgrass LLC is headquartered in Lakeland, Florida.

## County OK's tax rate, budget for 2023

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners approved the tax rate for FY 2023 at a special meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The vote was 4-1 with County Commissioner Paul M. Waldron voting no.

The aggregate millage rate, which is divided among the general fund, fire district fund, transportation trust fund and health department fund, is \$6.83 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. This is a 2-cent increase over the FY 2022 rate.

This represents a 12.57% increase over

the rolled-back rate of \$6.06. The rolledback rate is what would generate the same amount of tax revenue as last year after being adjusted for changes in property values.

That portion the rate that will go to the general fund is \$4.65, an 11% increase over the rolled-back rate of \$4.12. The general fund is the largest of the county's operating funds and accounts for all financial resources except those restricted to specific

Other countywide levies, per \$1,000 of assessed property values, are: \$1.38 for the fire district fund, \$0.84 for the transportation trust fund and \$0.02 for the health

The certified taxable value of properties in the county is \$40,840,143,494. The county has seen a 17.8% increase in taxable value since last year, which results in a \$39,964,900 increase in tax revenue from last year. Total estimated taxes are \$278,797,359 for FY 2023.

Under the approved rate, the owner of a \$400,000 home with a \$50,000 homestead exemption would pay \$2,391 in county taxes next year.

In a separate action, the board unanimously approved the budget of \$1,550,104,053.



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
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## Beaches Go Green receives donation prior to Oct. 8 cleanup

Local State Farm Insurance agent Edie Williams presented a check for \$2,500 to Beaches Go Green founder Anne Marie Moquin at her Ponte Vedra Beach office Sept. 21.

"State Farm corporate definitely supports being philanthropic in the community," Williams said.

According to Williams, she had some funds available and reached out to a friend, who was able to put her in touch with Moquin.

So, one of the agents I met recommended a new condo community being built in Jacksonville just off Old St.



Dr. Hollie Hickman and her staff at Ponte Vedra Plastic Surgery are preparing for October and breast cancer awareness month.

The Ponte Vedra Plastic Surgery staff are planning to go all out this year when it comes to raising awareness by wearing as much pink as possible of Friday's during the month and having testimonials from both clients and employees who have survived battles with breast cancer.

Self-breast examination cards will also be handed out to clients. The cards are made to be put in the shower and have punch holes that can be punched out each month throughout the year to help keep track

According to Hickman, it is just another way to promote the importance of education and being aware of changes with one's body.

"I've been in practice for 12 years now, and I do a little bit of everything," Hickman said. "I can do cleft lips and palates on a mission, but I can do the cosmetic and breast reconstruction in my daily practice. Plastic surgery is a very creative field."

Even though she has been helping people for years now, the feedback she

receives, and the excitement people have after a surgery is something that will never get old for her.

"Breast cancer is of course the most rewarding, because it's all about helping them reconstruct the breast and giving them pretty breasts," Hickman said. "Back in the day you really couldn't give them pretty breasts because

we didn't have all the options we have now"

She credited the advancements in technology and science that make those options available now.

"It's nice as a woman to walk through that with a patient, because I'm at risk to get breast cancer," Hickman said. "One in eight women will get breast cancer outside of their 40s, and inside their 40s it is one in six women will get breast cancer."

Although those numbers may be scary, Hickman said that they can be combated with proper self-examinations and awareness.

However, that fear is a powerful thing

for those who are dealing with breast cancer, but Hickman strives to do her best to make sure they understand that it is her job to make sure they look as beautiful as they did before the cancer.

"All women should keep up with their mammograms and do monthly self-breast exams," Hickman said. "Just because you don't have a family history of breast cancer, does not mean you are immune to it."

Catching the cancer early increases the chances of dealing with it before it can spread further.

"Patients that do monthly self-breast examines have a higher survival rate," Hickman said. "They are familiar with

their breast tissue, so when something's off, they know."

Many of the patients Hickman sees have been through their battle and are looking to gain the confidence they may have lost going through it.

"The general surgeon is usually takes away your breast, but then it's my job to put it back," Hickman said. "I get to be the person that restores their femininity, which is really fun."





There's something else Charlie Harb is looking forward to after his retirement-applied probability. "Ask me about that when you come in to buy a rug," he said.





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


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

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## FEMA URGES PREPAREDNESS NOW FOR TROPICAL STORM IAN

President Joseph R. Biden Jr. approved Gov. Ron DeSantis's request for an emergency declaration on Saturday, Sept. 24, ahead of Tropical Storm Ian. The declaration authorizes FEMA to provide support for debris removal and emergency protective measures, including direct federal assistance under the public assistance program.

As Tropical Storm Ian develops, its track and intensity will change. Residents in Florida should ensure they have their hurricane plans in place and closely monitor local media for forecast updates, directions provided by their local officials and heed local evacuation orders.

Evacuate if you are told to do so. Learn your evacuation routes and have a family emergency plan. Make sure you plan for your pets, as not all evacuation shelters accept pets. If you are a person with disabilities, you may need to take additional steps to plan for both your needs and your service animal.

You can also search for open shelters by texting SHELTER and your ZIP code to 43362. Example: Shelter 01234 (standard rates apply).

Have several ways to receive alerts. Download the recently updated free FEMA App (available in English and Spanish) to receive real-time emergency alerts from the National Weather Service and find a nearby shelter.

Go to Ready.gov or Listo.gov to learn how you can keep yourself, your family and your pets safe.

For local information on evacuation zones and routes, shelters and more, go to sjcemergencymanagement.com.

### **Prepare Now for a Hurricane**

Now is the time to plan. Take these steps to make sure you're ready:


- Review important documents. Make sure your insurance policies and personal documents, like IDs, are up to date. Make copies and keep them in a secure password protected digital space.
- It's not too late to create a plan with your family. Go to Ready.gov/plan and use the new "Make A Plan" fillable form to walk you through all the steps

to begin your plan and then easily save an electronic copy, or share with other family members. Many shelters do not take household pets, remember to create a plan and have supplies for your pets.

Prepare or update your emergency supply kit. Your kit should include supplies you may need at home as well as a "go kit" if you must evacuate quickly. Include items members of your family may need for several days, including prescription medications or special medical devices. Make sure you include any needed pet supplies. After a hurricane, you may not have access to these supplies for days or weeks.

**Check on neighbors.** As you prepare your family and loved ones for a disaster, check on neighbors and folks in your community to see if they are doing the same or help them get started.

• Older adults may need extra assistance to prepare for the storm. Go to Ready.gov/seniors for more information. For people with disabilities and



their families, it is important to consider individual circumstances and needs to effectively prepare for emergencies and disasters. Go to Individuals with Disabilities | Ready.gov to learn more.

• Determine if you need any special assistance before or after the storm. If you undergo routine treatments administered by a clinic or hospital, find out their emergency plans and work with them to identify back-up service providers.

Flood Insurance: Your National Flood Insurance Program policy will cover and reimburse certain actions you take to minimize damage to your home and belongings before a flood.

### **Federal Actions Ahead of Ian**

- FEMA maintains commodities strategically located at distribution centers throughout the United States and its territories. We are moving supplies from Atlanta to locations in Alabama ahead of the storm.
- The agency has more than 4,000 reservists available to deploy to support any future disasters. Additionally, more than 7,500 Surge Capacity Force members are rostered to deploy if needed.
- FEMA Region 4 Response Coordination Center in Atlanta and the National Response Coordination Center in Washington, D.C., have been activated. This will help authorities coordinate federal, state, local, territorial and tribal activity.
- FEMA deployed one national and one regional Incident Management Team to Atlanta to support any state response needs ahead of the storm.
- FEMA activated three Urban Search and Rescue Type 3 Teams to Florida to support state response efforts.

### Signs a roof needs repair or replacement

Many homeowners believe a roof is a once-in-a-lifetime investment. But roof damage can force homeowners to replace a roof regardless of how much time has lapsed since the roof

The average life span of a roof depends on when the roof was installed and the materials it is made from. According to Central Homes Roofing, three-tab shingles may last between 10 and 15 years, architectural shingles can endure for 15 to 20 years, and tile may last between 35 and 50 years. RPS Metal Roofing indicates a metal roof may last as long as 70 years. However, climate and color of the roof also will affect its longevity.

Homeowners would be wise to consider these factors when determining if a roof is in need of repairs or replacement.

- Roof age: The age of the roof is a major factor in determining if it will need to be replaced or if repairs can be made to isolated damage. Individuals who live in neighborhoods where neighbors are now replacing roofs will likely find it is time to consult a roofing company. Homeowners also can check to see if they have any receipts that indicate the roof's installation date so they have an idea about its age.
- Grain in gutters: Roofing shingles are designed to overlap, and sealant keeps them steady. Friction, weather and atmospheric changes can impact sealant and cause degradation. Gutters with grainy material in them could indicate worn out sealant and shingles.
- Ridge damage: Ridges are spots where two separate areas meet and often are important to the structural integrity of the roof. If the roof ridge is showing signs of wear, it could be time to repair or replace it.
- Curled shingle edges: If shingle tabs are curled or cupped, the shingles may need to be replaced. But if curling is extensive, a whole new roof may need to be installed.



- Bald spots or lost portions of the roof: Missing granules and missing shingles are reasons to consult a pro for a roof evaluation.
- **Leaks indoors:** Homeowners who find dark streaks or moisture in the attic may discover that water is penetrating the roof underlay. Water often comes in around chimney flashing. Other water signs are blistering and bubbling in walls.
- Incoming light: Look up through the attic and see if any light is coming through the roof, which may indicate there are cracks or holes in the roof.
- **Aesthetics:** If a homeowner doesn't like the look of the roof from a design standpoint, a replacement also may be war-

Roofs can last many years, but the presence of certain signs indicates replacement or repairs will be necessary.




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## PXG Women's Match Play back for year two

Year two of the PXG Women's Match Play Championship officially got underway with a media day and panel discussion at World Golf Village Sept. 23.

"We established this event to extend their (female golfers) season and create more opportunities for them," said Mark Berman, championship founder and owner and operator of the East Coast Women's Professional Golf Tour.

The fact that the championship is back one year later showed that it was able to create a lasting impact, that Berman now looks to turn into a tradition for years to come.

man are striving to accomplish.

"I work in a very male-oriented industry," Clarkson said. "People have invested in me, and what better way to give back than by supporting other women in their career journey."

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
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
