

Born July 16, 1930, in New York City and raised in New Rochelle N.Y. Attended New Rochelle High School, and The Taft School in Watertown, CT. Received a BSE in Chemical Engineering from Princeton University in 1952. He joined the sales department of Jefferson Chemical Co. — a subsidiary of American Cyanamid and Texas Oil Co. In 1954, he joined the Navy and attended Officers Candidate School in Newport, RI. After receiving his commission in August 1954, he married Ruth (Pat) Thompson of Greenwich, CT, and they were moved to Pensacola, FL where he was enrolled in the Navy Flight Training program. In 1973 he was recruited by the Commercial Products Division of S.C. Johnson in Racine, WI as its General Manager. He worked for S.C. Johnson for 20 years in a number of international and domestic management positions until his retirement in 1993 where he was the Vice President for North American Operations.





# Grand marshals named for Riding into History showcase April 15

The World Golf Village in St. Augustine is known as a place that has preserved the history of golf over the years, but it will also showcase some historic motorcycles during the 23rd Annual Riding into History Concours d'Elegance April 15.

The concours will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the World Golf Village and will feature an array of makes and models of motorcycles 35 years and older.

This year's event will have a pair of grand marshals in AMA hall of famer and Barber Motorsports Museum consultant Brian Slark and Motogiro d'Italia hall of famer Vicki Smith.

"For anyone that isn't familiar with this event, it's a pretty wonderful weekend, great lunch ride to the ocean, a fun charity dinner and the show itself is right in the center of the World Golf Hall of Fame complex with bikes lined up around the lake under shady trees," Smith said. "It's long been one of my favorite no miss weekends for years, and I am really happy to be able to contribute to the love and charity they have spread through the vintage motorcycle community over the last 22 years."

Entrants in the show will have the opportunity to participate in a ride through the back roads of historic Florida along with the grand marshals during a tour April 14 followed by a grand marshal banquet that night.

Space is limited for the tour and preregistration is recommended to attend both the tour and banquet festivities.

There is no entry fee for qualified motorcycles to be part of the show, but each motorcycle must be registered and the deadline to enter is April 10.

All proceeds from the concours will go towards benefiting the nonprofit K9s for Warriors and their efforts to help team up service dogs with veterans. Another unique tradition that has developed since 2014 is the concours' youth judging program, which allows children 8 to 16 years old the chance to see what it's like to be in the shoes of a judge when looking at the motorcycles.

The goal of the program is to promote interest in vintage motorcycles among the next generation.

Parents with children interested in being a youth judge during the event can fill out the form by going to ridingintohistory.org/youth-judging.

Although Riding Into History focuses on motorcycles 35 years and older, a new initiative will be introduced this year called "Under 35 is Alive."

The new class is for anyone 14 to 34 years old with a motorcycle that is also between 14 and 34 years old.

Just as the youth judging, the "Under 35 is Alive" concept is being implemented as another creative way to develop more younger motorcycle enthusiasts and get them involved with all that Riding into History presents.

Also new for this year is a 10k relay, which will involve two people teaming up to run or walk to the 5k distance each.


This is an initiative that could make the event even more fun and enjoyable for couples or families because they can truly complete 10k together as a team.

There are a number of ways to raise money but St. Johns Stage Thespians have found a unique approach to go about with its "egg my yard" fundraising initiative.

That success is highlighted by them being voted Access Broadway's "best debut musical theater school" in 2022 and 2023, having recently returned from a competi-

According to Dushane, the trip to New York for nationals would be a much more involved trip not only because it is a further distance than those in-state, but it also involves the logistics of transporting not just the 45 members, but also the stage props that they use as part of their act.

"We're just trying to get the word out anyway we can, because this group has definitely earned it," Dushane said.

However, it is not just money that the fundraiser is producing, but she has also seen how it has helped build the bonds of the cast even more. She has seen this most in how excited the students are and how they have really gravitated to and fully embraced the "egg my yard" initiative.

"A lot of our kids are going to dress up as rabbits when they deliver the eggs," Dushane said. "It shows that they're really into the magic they are creating for these families."

The idea behind dressing up as rabbits is in case the children of the family's yard they are placing eggs in happen to wake up or look outside the window and see them.

"It is a true community fundraiser," Dushane said.



# **Shrimp Plants**

"In all things of nature there is something of the marvelous." — Aristotle

The Shrimp Plant, or Justicia Brandegeeana, is also known as the Mexican Shrimp Plant or "false hop."

Native Americans believed Shrimp Plants provided protection from enemies, particularly during wartime. Shrimp Plants have been used in ceremonies in Caribbean and South American countries. Today, early research suggests that chemicals in these plants may have medicinal uses. Although Shrimp Plants are native to Mexico, these tropical beauties grow well in Florida.

A Shrimp Plant has green, oval leaves

and can grow to be 2 to 6 feet tall. They are available as shrubs or standards (a "lollipop" shaped form similar to a small tree with a bare trunk and round ball of leaves and blooms at the top). Shrimp Plants love the heat but need regular watering! They may tolerate a bit of shade but prefer areas of full sun for best growth. Light pruning will remove long

stems to prevent them from sagging and keep the plant looking full.

Shrimp Plants earn their name from the elongated shape of their flower, resembling shrimp in the sea! They feature drooping blooms in pink, purple, and white and are closely related to the Golden Shrimp Plant with yellow blossoms. The blooms of a Shrimp Plant grow from "bracts" at the end of a stem. The bracts are initially white but turn pink with exposure to sunlight. Bracts continue to grow in a chain-like pattern until they fall off, reaching anywhere from a few centimeters to almost a foot in length!

Shrimp Plants give off a "shrimpy" smell to attract pollinators to small white flowers growing out of the bracts.

Once Shrimp Plants begin to bloom, they will produce flowers continuously throughout the spring, summer, and fall. In our north Florida area (planting zone 9), the plants will lose their leaves in the cooler months of the year but come back

the following spring.

Because of their constant colorful blooms, Shrimp Plants are an excellent choice for any sunny location in a landscape. They attract hummingbirds and butterflies to your yard, so place them where you can watch for these fluttering visitors! Happy planting!

# **Creekside, Julington Creek teachers,** students mark World Water Day

Students and teachers revealed new additions and upgrades to the outdoor learning classroom during World Water Day on March 22 at Julington Creek Elementary School, 2316 Race Track Road in Fruit Cove.

The outdoor space officially opened on World Water Day last year and was funded with grants provided by Wells Fargo and the Community First Cares Foundation through a partnership between the Consortium of Florida Education Foundations and local education foundation, Investing in Kids (INK!).

According to Donna Lueders, INK !'s executive director, teachers, administrators and volunteers continued to support the ongoing service-learning project and the second annual World Water Day celebration, in collaboration with the Academy of Environmental Sciences and the Teaching Academy at Creekside High School.

In 2022, Creekside High School students, teachers and volunteers opened the outdoor learning space and hands-on learning projects at Julington Creek Elementary School, including in-ground and raised garden beds, native landscaping and sensory learning experiences.

This year, Creekside students added a butterfly science chamber with screened-in room, more native plants and landscaping, and various species of regional butterflies. New totems were also built with a variety of highly tactile materials for exceptional student education (ESE) students at the elementary school.

According to the international nonprofit organization, Pure Water for the World, this year's World Water Day follows the campaign theme, "Accelerate Change." Locally, the program included academy and elementary school students in

rotational learning groups with hands-on learning activities, including a Wacky Watersheds and Fun 2.0 space where students learn about the water cycle, and a Nifty Natives area featuring the importance of native landscaping in the community, and pollination through a student-developed sensory activity.

The Rock N' Roll activity encourages students to understand rock cycles, rock types and the importance of limestone in the development of the Florida aquifer. Sifting through Soils helps students learn about soil layers and the importance of soil resources in water filtration. Green ThumbsUp! features gardening basics and the opportunity for students to plant their own seeds.

St. Johns County 2020-21 District Teacher of the Year Alicia "Ali" Pressel initiated the place-based learning plan and outdoor classroom project in 2020 with Jeanette Murphy, Julington Creek Elementary School's principal. Pressel is an environmental sciences educator in the Academy of Engineering and Envi-

ronmental Sciences at Creekside High School.

Pressel implemented the World Water Day educational program focusing on water resources and water conservation with Creekside's Academy of Future Teachers instructor, Regan Ashker. Under the guidance of Pressel and Ashker, Creekside students implemented upgrades to the outdoor learning space, developed sensory learning experiences and designed new engaging lessons to share with younger students for this year's Water Day event.

Pressel has an extensive professional background in the classroom and previous work with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, and sea turtle conservation efforts in North Carolina. She is a National Geographic Explorer among international experts who are groundbreaking scientists, conservationists, educators and storytellers. Pressel

is a 2022 NEA Global Learning Fellow, 2021 Grosvenor Teaching Fellow, 2020 National Geographic Emerging Explorer and a LEED Green Associate with the U.S. Green Building Council.

At Creekside, Pressel sponsors the Environmental Club, Geospatial Mapping and other STEM initiatives, including project-based learning and outdoor field studies.

Future plans include the opportunity to implement similar learning environments and curricula at additional schools in St. Johns County.

"We look forward to continuing to work with Ali on innovative projects that positively impact student learning," said Donna Lueders, INK! executive director.

Cooking has always been a passion of Christie Leatherman's ever since she was a child, and now she has taken it a step further with the creation of her new business Christie's Country Cuisine.

She runs the business out of her home in Nocatee, with her kitchen being the headquarters where all her dishes are made.

The idea behind starting Christie's Country Cuisine and exploring entrepreneurship came about after she got laid off from her corporate mortgage job in September 2022.

"I had been in mortgage for 20 years, but the rates are still rising, which is crazy, and it was pretty hard to find a job," Leatherman said. "I love to cook and host and throw parties, so it was scary, but I just figured let's take this adventure and see where it rides."

Although she enjoys and can make all kinds of cuisines, she chose to specialize in homemade country cooking or "comfort food" as it is also known.

"I just love Southern food and always have. As a kid people would ask, 'What's your favorite food?' and I'd always just sav Southern," Leatherman chuckled. "It's all about just trying to do something different."

One of the things she offers is not only making the food but also delivering it to people's houses, which she understands can be just as valuable to people today as getting a home-cooked meal. That combination is something she takes pride in. "I know people are busy and I know what's it's like to be a working mom and having to come home after you've been

in meetings all day and heels for 12 hours and then you've got to go make dinner," Leatherman said. "Maybe I can help." Leatherman prepares all her meals the day of, and no leftovers are used. Instead,

everything is made fresh and cooked to order. She is always looking for new dishes to

try to mix with the certain dishes that she has already spent years tweaking and has got the recipe down perfectly at this point. "I try to always send thank you emails

and ask for any feedback customers may have about the dishes," Leatherman said.

It helps that she has taste testers at home that she relies heavily on for honest feedback.

"I have four teenagers, two of which are teenage boys, so they'll eat," Leatherman chuckled.

She also understands how important it can be, especially as a home-grown small business, to create regular customers.

"When I go to make the deliveries, I've actually had some where it has been the start of an actual relationship and friendship," Leatherman said. "I try not to just drop off the food, but instead introduce myself and start a conversation. That has been the most rewarding part of it all so far."

That personal touch is something that sets Christie's Country Cuisine apart from

others and it is an aspect that she hopes people associate with her business just as much as they do the food she makes.

Being so new she has not yet found certain dishes that she would classify as favorites among the community, but she has received several orders of her chicken and dumplings.

She is aware that some may be looking for vegetarian options, so offering a vegetarian option is something she wants to be able to implement each week.

Not only will Leatherman deliver to the neighborhoods within Nocatee, but also to the businesses as well.

"I want to also be able to get to the point where I can start really catering bigger events," Leatherman said.

In Duval County, 19% of residents are food insecure, higher than the state and national averages, according to Feeding Northeast Florida. As the effects of inflation persist, hunger relief organizations in Jacksonville and across the country are facing ongoing challenges such as increased demand for their services and rising food prices.

Bank of America is supporting its employees' health and safety while addressing one of the local communities' most critical needs. "Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the need for healthy, nutritious food has been more significant than ever," said Susan King, CEO, Feeding Northeast Florida. 

# 'Arsenic and Old Lace' a hilarious romp

There's a myth going around that comedy must evolve if it wants to entertain today's audiences. This is often used to excuse course — and frequently profane — language, a facile gimmick employed to disguise a deficit in the comic's talent.

In fact, good comedy transcends the zeitgeist and provides skilled performers a timeless resource to provoke laughter from successive generations.

"Arsenic and Old Lace" is such a resource. The dark comedy, written in 1939 by Joseph Kesselring and subsequently staged on Broadway where it enjoyed a lengthy run, remains as funny today as it was on that opening night of Jan. 10, 1941.

Humorous lines, however, cannot by themselves ensure the success of a show like "Arsenic and Old Lace." They must be delivered with expert comic timing aided by carefully choreographed blocking.

And this is where the play, as presented at Alhambra Theatre & Dining, excels.

The Jacksonville venue's production features a strong cast of seasoned performers who expertly draw the audience into



the madcap world of the characters whose eccentricities faithfully follow an interior, if misguided, logic. Razor sharp timing as in a nearly accidental poisoning of two characters and their split-second salvation — produces a moment of terrible suspense followed by relieved laughter as disaster is humorously dodged.

"Arsenic and Old Lace" tells the story of the oft-maniacal Brewster family. The protagonist, Mortimer Brewster, learns that his spinster aunts have been poisoning lonely old men, murders that they consider a mercy. The bodies — a dozen in all — are buried in the basement, much to Mortimer's horror.

When Mortimer's homicidal brother Jonathan drops in with a victim of his own, the hero is caught between protecting his beloved aunts and turning his brother in to the police. All of this is further complicated by Mortimer's engagement to the girl next door, the daughter of a local minister.

A theatrical company is a team with each member contributing to the success of the whole. However, teams have standouts, as do casts. And it's worth mentioning some of the most noteworthy performances.

Hillary Hickam and Patti Eyler give flawless performances as the aunts. They are absolutely convincing. Never does one get the idea that they're acting. Their portrayal of sweet, well-meaning ladies provokes a genuine fear that the authorities will learn of their crimes.

As Mortimer, Shain Stroff is outstanding. As each absurdity of his plight is revealed, his reactions provoke absolute hilarity. Though the role demands a heightened level of theatrics, Stroff's performance is always grounded in the character. Each panicked response is wholly relatable as the audience sympathizes with Mortimer and the impossible situations in which he finds himself.


Alec Hadden delivers a strong performance as the brother who believes himself to be Teddy Roosevelt. The psychological malady in question may be a relic of a less-enlightened age, but Hadden's portrayal allows the audience to suspend its disbelief and enjoy the character's quirks.

Chad Conley's menacing portrayal of Jonathan helps the audience become invested in Mortimer's predicament. The antagonist's villainy is essential to the central conflict, and Conley carries it off perfectly.

Rounding out the cast are Savannah Elam, Kevin Roberts, Pete Clapsis, Jonathan Van Dyke, Joe Anderson, Noah Blohowiak, Thad Walker, Travis Young and Mel Nash.

Tod Booth's expert direction should not be overlooked. Much of what audiences are laughing at result from his instructions to the cast and decisions he made regarding how the stage is used.

# Sharks trusting process as postseason approaches

There is no doubt that Ponte Vedra boys lacrosse plays one of toughest schedules it can year in and year out.

It is truly a testament of where the program has gotten to following all the success it has had over the years.

Not only do the Sharks play some of the toughest teams in Florida, but they also play a number of quality opponents from outside the state, including six on the schedule this year.

The most recent of these battles was against Lucy Beckham High out of Mt. Pleasant, South Carolina, who are also a defending state champion of South Carolina.

"We played the state runner-up from Ohio on Monday and just came back from Maryland, where we played one of the top four teams in the nation," assistant coach Matt Keeler said. "We're building something for the postseason, and you've got to trust in the process."

However, on the night, the Sharks lost 12-10 despite jumping out to a 3-1 lead after the first quarter and extending it to 4-1 early in the second quarter following a beautifully placed long pass from goalie Jack Pelot to a wide-open Canon Hauseman who fired a shot into the back of the net.

It was the second quarter where the Bengals mounted their comeback and grabbed control of the contest after four straight goals, including one with 8.1 seconds remaining in the quarter that gave them a 5-4 halftime lead.

The comeback was aided by a couple of penalties by the Sharks which put them in a tough spot having to defend with their backs against the wall a man down.

"You'd like to stay out of the box whenever you can, but we also want our boys to work really hard and sometimes you just slip and hit someone the wrong way," Keeler said. "We had two stick penalties today and one unnecessary roughness, which can be hard to come back from."

Pelot was greeted with high-fives and chest bumps by his teammates because they know how much of an extra dimension a goalie can be as a passer to help kickstart the offensive attack.

Both teams traded scores for the most part throughout the second half, but it was always the Sharks who were the ones doing the chasing on the scoreboard.

When they were able to answer scores and cut into the Bengals lead, it was often times senior Maddox Johnson who was called upon to make a play.

And a majority of the time he was able to deliver a goal and keep the Sharks within reach of the lead.

His goals were classic Johnson, as he used his blistering speed to shake off tight

defense before unleashing a heavy-handed shot on goal.

It was the third loss in a row for the Sharks, but one thing they could build upon moving forward was that they did not give up and continued to fight all the way until the end, as Johnson buried a hard shot just under the cross bar and fellow senior Corey Bloss snipped a shot for two of their five fourth-quarter goals.

"We're a really resilient group through and through, and a lot of us coaches have been with these kids and seen it since they were 10 years old," Keeler said. "These kids believe in themselves, and I think you saw that when we made a run there in the last three minutes."




