Beach project begun **By Shaun Ryan**

At the start of any new project, local dignitaries often gather to "break ground," symbolizing the forthcoming construction. But on Friday, April 12, county and state officials poured sand onto the beach, signifying the beginning of a major coastal restoration project.

For the \$38.6 million Ponte Vedra Beach Restoration Project, 2 million cubic yards of sand will be dredged from an offshore site and placed along nine miles of coastline, from the St. Johns-Duval county line south to the GTM Reserve.

Friday's ceremony was conducted

Circle of Creation provides insight for women business owners

Business funding featured during inaugural event at the link

The link in Nocatee continued to do its part in hosting events to help local business owners and entrepreneurs better understand the shifting landscapes.

The latest event they held was the inaugural session of Circle of Creation: The Expansion Project on April 10.

It focused on the importance of business funding for local women entrepreneurs and featured several speakers, including the night's guest of honor, Rep. Cyndi Stevenson.

Sonya Morales-Marchisillo, founder of Pinnacle Communications Group, shared the story with those in attendance of when she was first trying to find funding and support for her business and the challenges she ran into.

"I thought going to get contracts and money from the banks was going to be the


easy part, but I was completely wrong," Morales-Marchisillo said. "My mortgage bank didn't want anything to do with me and my car loan bank didn't want anything to do with me. I was not looked at as anyone who had built something."

Because of this experience. Morales-Marchisillo stressed to the crowd in the main lobby of the link about the importance of finding financial institutions that

This is a part of the county's new anti-litter initiative called Get Hooked launched in February. "This event is another step in our Get Hooked initiative to help get trash off our roads, out of our rights-of-way and clear of our waterways," said outreach coordinator Matthew Denny. "It will aid us in our efforts to get residents 'hooked' on St. Johns County and keeping this beautiful area litter free. The event is another opportunity for the community to get involved with the campaign led by our mascot, Captain Reducio, and promote the 3 Arrgh's: reduce, reuse, and recycle. Together, we can make a difference."

Denny explained that the event will include a station for the public to donate gently used clothes and household items for charitable causes, educational booths, as well as fun activities for kids to learn about the importance of recycling.

There will also be a chance to see boats, trucks, helicopters and heavy equipment in the touch-a-truck area.

"We will also have our Get Hooked mascot Captain Reducio available to take pictures with attendees," said Denny. "We encourage people to post them on their social media accounts with the hashtag #MySJCFL to help us spread the word."



do not look at the fact that they are women, but instead look at the entire picture and business profile in question.

According to Tillery Durbin, commercial lender at Vystar Credit Union, the complexities of business funding can go beyond the numbers on the screen, and while they are extremely important, so is building relationships. This is what makes finding funding so treacherous at times, but knowing how to approach it can also be a helpful tool. "We are not all cut and dry when it

comes to business lending like it is on the consumer side," Durbin said. "When you go to get a car or a house, they'll pull your personal credit and if you have great credit, then you'll get whatever you want. Every bank has different rules, but there is always someone out there that can help you and it's important to remember that."

Also, taking "no" for an answer is not

the end but instead, Durbin hinted that it can be the beginning of creating an even better business plan.

"You should be asking them, 'Do you pull my credit?' and 'What does my credit need to be?" Durbin said. "If your credit is not there then you know that's not the place for you or you need to fix your credit before they pull it. These are questions you have to ask prior to signing up."

Morales-Marchisillo is an example of how hearing a financial institution tell her 'no' was not the end of the road but just a curve in the path where she wanted her business to be.

"I support all banks, even the ones that told me no because I know that they are supporting some of my colleagues and friends," Morales-Marchisillo said. "You never want to close the door fully because you may need them, or they may need you down the road."

Not only did the event have its share of speakers to listen to and offer feedback, but it also served as a networking platform for the business owners in attendance.

at Mickler's Landing Beachfront Park, 1109 Ponte Vedra Blvd. State Sen. Travis Hutson, state Rep. Cyndi Stevenson, county commissioners Krista Joseph and Henry Dean, and county Emergency Management Director Joe Giammanco spoke.

"Following the devastation of the 2016 and 2017 hurricane seasons, the Ponte Vedra community and St. Johns County recognized the need to renourish this beach," said Giammanco. "I can't tell you how many hours were spent on the planning, design, permitting and finding funding for this project. But I can tell you when the community, the county and the state come together, we can get it done."

The project, unanimously approved by the County Commission on Feb. 20, will include dune reconstruction between 13 and 18 feet, berm elevation of eight feet and an increase in beach width of 40 to 180 feet. Operations will continue day and night, and the public can follow progress at



sjcfl.us/PVB or by using the county's mobile app, SJC Connect, available at sjcfl.us/SJC-Connect.

About \$30.6 million of the project will be funded by the state. The remainder will come from county matching requirements and funds previously set aside.

After all the sand is placed, an army of planters will plant about 1.2 million sea oats.

In addition to safeguarding the

economic value of beach tourism, the project will offer sea turtles more space for hatchling nests. In 2023, St. Johns County beaches had an estimated 79,811 sea turtle hatchlings. "Think about, with a wider beach, how many more there are going to be in the future," said Joseph.

The project is expected to be finished in August.





As told to Shaun Ryan

How did you get into this line of work?

It's really kind of funny. My first career was in the beauty salon industry. I owned a salon for 15 years in Atlanta, Georgia, which is where I'm from.

I sold that and moved here with my family — it was a business transfer for my husband. I got my Master Gardener certification. And I really taught myself a lot about gardening, because I was really into flowers.

So, I was working in my yard and my friends' yards, and the next thing I know, I decided to start a business. That was 17 years ago. One thing led to another, and I don't even know how - I wasn't really looking to move in here — but by that time I had grown to where I needed to keep my trucks and my trailers and materials someplace.

So, I rented this land for two years. As I was renting it, I decided to make it a nursery, as well, because I needed the plants to install for customers. So, I just decided to open the nursery.

You sell plants, pavers, water features — what else?

We do installations, as well, which is a huge part of our business. And I have planters and ornamentals for your garden. Wind chimes or baskets, birdbaths. Those kinds of things.

What is your typical day like?

[Laughs] I would make your head spin! Because I make everybody else's head spin.

My typical day starts at 5 a.m. I start working on the computer. And I have three crews to go out every single day. I have to get them organized. We start at 7:45. So, up and at 'em, getting them going to three different jobs. And maybe a fourth if it's pavers.

We also do maintenance. Not mowing and blowing, but hand-weeding and as your personal gardener. One of my crews pretty much does that. And we have 50-something accounts a month that they just go and hand-weed and trim and prune as needed.

Then, I'm on one to three jobs, making sure the plants get where they need to be. Just depending on how large the job is.

Of course, I can't even tell you how many emails and phone calls I have to return. Fortunately, I have an assistant, Leslie, who is awesome.

Then, at some point in time, I go for consults.

I get home about 7:30 to 8 o'clock at night. Then, I start back over at 5 in the morning.

What do you like best about what you do?

I love people. I could never be behind a desk. But what I love most is finishing a project and just seeing the smiles and the excitement from my customers. That they're blown away over what I've done.

I have a lot of people tell me, "This is like TV. You've transformed it overnight. Transformed it in one day!"

We actually do a lot of transformations in one day. That's probably the most fun. Because people are just

shocked. Like, how did we transform that? What should new residents know about gardening here?

We do have a lot of people coming from the North. Probably what I would want to tell them is: They have to speak to someone who has some knowledge.

Then, they need to educate themselves on the summer flowers. They might have some of them up North, but they don't last as long.

The other thing I would say is: Everything grows three times faster and bigger than what theirs grows up North.

They just need to realize: Everything needs to be cut. It needs to be pruned. You don't have to allow it to grow as far as it will grow. Cut it.

I think that's the hardest thing for people, even us, when they're blooming. Such as hibiscus. They bloom beautiful flowers all the time. And then, all of a sudden, they are eight feet high.

You've got to cut it, and you've got to cut it with the flowers on it. If you wait until there are no flowers, you're never going to cut it. It blooms all the time.

You also have a community-minded spirit.

I love to give back to the community. I do a lot of charity work. So, I don't mind doing that. We have a lot of people, schools and stuff, that have asked us for something. Whether it be a plant to sell or a gift certificate. I do the RITA tennis tournament. I go and set up a healing

garden. That's in Sawgrass Country Club every May. It takes us half a day with all my crews to set up big trees and big flowers and big plants. The whole tennis court area.

And then Roscolusa; that's coming up in Nocatee. It's a big song event, and it's outdoors. We put in probably 30 palm trees and just flowers everywhere. The front entryway, the VIP area and the stage area. It takes three trucks and trailers to get all the stuff.

We set it up on Friday in half a day with all my crew. And then we come on Sunday and take it back down.

What do you like best about living here?

I love the beach. I love the Intracoastal. I'm a boater, so I love boating.

Of course, you can't beat Ponte Vedra Beach. I love the people. They come from everywhere. Everybody's interested in meeting other people. I find everyone very friendly.

Then, of course, there's the weather — other than July, August and September.

To me it's a beautiful place to live.

Patty fundraising effort record breaking

On Wednesday, April 10, Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller Brandon Patty announced his first quarter fundraising effort raising more than \$55,000 towards his re-election campaign. Patty filed in late February, leaving just over a month to raise funds in Q1. This is the largest first reporting period haul by a non-sheriff constitutional officer in St. Johns County history.

"I could not be more grateful and humbled by the outpouring of support this quarter," said Patty. "We have stayed on mission, worked hard and made tough decisions, all the while keeping the public first and foremost in mind over the past four years. We have some great plans for the future, and I can't wait to talk about them and earn every vote possible in August."

Appointed in December 2019 by Gov. Ron De-Santis and elected unopposed in 2020, Patty serves as Clerk of the Circuit Court and Comptroller for St. Johns County. Patty manages a \$16.1 million budget and a staff of more than 125 responsible for more than 1,000 constitutional and regulatory duties – everything from maintaining court records to issuing passports and marriage licenses.

Over the past five years, Patty has modernized and streamlined the office by focusing on protecting pub-

lic dollars, providing world-class customer service to residents and stakeholders and enhancing transparency across government. Some accomplishments include developing and implementing a safe-thoughaggressive short-term investment strategy, which earned more than \$30 million in interest, thereby increasing funding available for county projects and priorities.

Patty also led the charge advocating for and securing an additional St. Johns County judge in 2020 to help facilitate justice for residents.

A lieutenant commander in the U.S. Navy Reserve, Patty is an information warfare officer and has served at the National Maritime Intelligence-Integration Office in Washington, D.C., in the Middle East in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, and Naval Central Command/5th Fleet based at Manama, Bahrain.

Patty is a second-generation Floridian and the first member of his family to graduate from college, earning a bachelor's degree from George Washington University and a master's degree from the London School of Economics.

He lives in St. Augustine with his wife Brittney, sons Mason, Graham and Carter, plus their two dogs, Roscoe and Howie.



Quiñones-Hinojosa receives 'Rock of the Community Award'

Theme for Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach's Mineral City Celebration is 'M*A*S*H'

Acclaimed Mayo Clinic neurosurgeon Dr. Alfredo Quiñones-Hinojosa received the 2024 "Rock of the Community Award" Saturday, April 13, at the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach's annual Mineral City Celebration, held at the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall.

An estimated 300 people attended the charity event, which featured the theme "The M*A*S*H BASH" and saw guests garbed in everything from hospital scrubs and army fatigues to bathrobes and Hawaiian shirts.

"It's quite fitting that our theme tonight is 'M*A*S*H,' which celebrated the heroic efforts of surgeons saving lives under challenging circumstances," Rotary Club President Jennifer Logue told guests. "That's something with which I'm sure Dr. Quiñones can relate."

A Ponte Vedra Beach resident, Quiñones was honored for his contributions to medical research and advances in the treatment of brain tumors. In addition to his groundbreaking work as a neurosurgeon, he is also the co-founder and president of Mission: BRAIN, a global nonprofit that provides critical medical services to patients in need in more than 25 countries.

A video shown at the event highlighted Quiñones' rise from a migrant farm worker to Harvard Medical School graduate and world-renowned brain surgeon. In accepting the award, he thanked his family, his Mayo Clinic team – many of whom were in attendance – and the community for supporting research and efforts to improve health care around the world.

"In presenting the Rock of the Community Award, the Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary Club seeks not only to honor a deserving individual, but also to inspire others to embrace a spirit of service," Logue said. "From his accomplishments as a neurosurgeon to his philanthropic efforts to provide care to underserved populations, 'Dr. Q' has made a profound positive impact both on First Coast residents and the wider world. We are thrilled to honor him as the 2024 Rock of the Community."

The Mineral City Celebration is the signature annual fundraising event for the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach. Proceeds from the event have benefited dozens of local nonprofit organizations and charities, including the

Miranda Road bridge improvement being discussed

The Miranda Road bridge that goes over Lake Vedra has been a talking point of the Ponte Vedra Municipal Service District for some time now and action is now being called for in relation to it. "The sidewalk is not ADA standard

whatsoever, and it actually seems to even jut out into traffic a little bit where you step up onto it," MSD trustee Brad Wester said. "It's just really not a good standard that we should all be living by."

Wester has mentioned to the county that while they come down along San Juan Drive during the planned sidewalk

project along the route that they work with the MSD to improve the bridge since it is one of the linkages from Solana Road down to Miranda Road.

"After the bridge it links up to sidewalks and becomes a loop everywhere else, so for that first section, I suggested that if there isn't a structural deficiency with the bridge, than we need to wrap the resurfacing of the bridge and the sidewalk area and blend that into a project that meets ADA standard with sidewalk connectivity," Wester said. "I got a, 'Yes, that's exactly what we should be doing,' but the magic formula is where is the money coming from."

It is a discussion they are currently having with St. Johns County officials, as the MSD has already committed \$150,000 to go toward that segment of the sidewalk project.

Wester has talked with St. Johns County Commissioner Krista Joseph and has urged the importance of getting this issue in front of the commission for a vote.

Trustee Mickey White urges all residents with issues with the bridge on Miranda Road and the need for sidewalks along San Juan Drive to call and reach out to their county commissioners, because that feedback will go a long way in helping push those projects in

the directions they need to go to create change.

"We'll advocate and ask for those changes too, but it all helps," White said.

The resurfacing of San Juan Drive is also expected to be in the plans for the near future, but narrowing down a precise timetable is still in process.

According to White, he believes the resurfacing is scheduled for some time within the next year.

However, trustee Kitty Switkes informed the board that she met with county road and bridge officials on April 8, and they told her that it could be as early as the next week, but that it was definitely in the plans.

"I asked them if resurfacing the bridge would hurt us when it came to getting federal funds or grants we would need to eventually completely replace the bridge, and they are going to find out," Switkes said. "Because that was something we were told years ago."

More updates are sure to come regarding the Miranda Road bridge and the sidewalk project down San Juan Drive at future MSD meetings. The next one is scheduled for May 13 beginning at 5:30 p.m. at the Ponte Vedra Beach Public Library.



New Afib procedure saves heart tissue

Atrial fibrillation (Afib) occurs when there is a malfunction in the electrical signals that tell the heart to beat. This causes the heart to beat too slowly, too quickly or irregularly. The disorder increases a patient's risk of having blood clots, strokes, heart failure and other heart-

related complications. Experts predict the number of people with Afib will rise to 12.1 million by 2030. As the number of people with this common heart rhythm disorder grows,

so does the need for innovative treatment options. In the Jacksonville area alone, the number in need of treatment is predicted to rise by nearly 70% over the next 10 years.

The increased precision offered by these new, innovative technologies is leading to more efficient procedures with better outcomes for our patients who appreciate the convenience of being able to go home the same day."

Baptist Health pioneers surgical robot innovation

Surgeons at Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville were the first in the United States to perform procedures with a new, sleek sidekick — the Maestro Surgical Robotics System.

The robot provides surgeons with an extra set of "hands" to help hold instruments and move tools with precision during laparoscopic surgeries. At Baptist Jacksonville, the tool is being used during gastric sleeve procedures, a common type of weight loss surgery.

The first procedure was performed using the first version of the new Robotics System. The case was completed by Steven Hodgett, MD, a bariatric surgeon with North Florida Surgeons PA, who practices at the hospital.

"Stability and control are of critical importance and innovative robotic technologies help us reach new levels of precision," said Hodgett. "We're fortunate to have had the opportunity to provide input on robotic surgical technologies being developed at the global level, which later translates to real-world surgical improvements for patients."

Because of surgical expertise and technological advancements, like the new Robotics System, patients can undergo a sleeve gastrectomy using a minimally invasive approach, which helps reduce pain and recovery time. In fact, patients usually go home after an overnight stay in the hospital.

The first person to undergo surgery with the assistance of the new robot was a Baptist Health team member.

"I've been working in the medical field for 30 years; to me, being the first at Baptist Health was an exciting, cool thing," said Valerie Sawyer, 62, who works in outpatient coding in the finance department. "I had complete trust in the bariatric surgical team."

About 20 years ago, Sawyer had gastric band surgery to help with weight loss, which had been a lifelong effort. Recently, the band slipped and was causing her extreme discomfort. Sawyer knew it was time for a change and a gastric sleeve was recommended. That's when she found out about the minimally invasive approach with the new robotic system.

The surgery was a success, and she is on the road to recovery.

"I've already lost about 30 pounds since the surgery," she said. "It's helped with knee and back pain. My biggest goal is trying to get in better health for my grandkids. I love spending time with them."

Baptist Health is the region's leader in robotic surgery, with 17 total surgical robots throughout the system. Each hospital within the Baptist Health system is equipped with at least one surgical robot. Surgical robots are used for a wide range of procedures and help increase a surgeon's precision, while also leading to a faster recovery for patients.

"Ultimately, new technologies can play a pivotal role in enhancing a patient's experience," said Matthew A. Zuino, executive vice president and chief operations officer at Baptist Health. "Embracing cutting-edge innovations allows us to deliver a higher standard of care, ensuring our patients receive the best possible outcomes in their health care journey."

4. Exercising can help lower blood pressure and keep weight in check, but Harvard Health says it also stands on its own as a method for reducing



Landscaping with palm trees

"May you never be too busy to stop and breathe under a palm tree." unknown author

Palm trees dot the landscape in our Florida home! If you are missing out on this great addition to your yard, the warm months of the year are a great time to plant palm trees. Be sure to consider the space

you have available, proximity to structures and the amount of sun and water in your desired area. Some palms remain small enough to be closer to a house while others will grow very large over time and need more space.

Although an established palm requires little attention, it is often necessary to trim these trees as the weather warms up (not during the dormant months of late fall through winter). It is important to properly remove any fronds that are entirely brown and dry.

They are weighing down the tree and should be cut at the base of the branch, close to the trunk or the soil

depending on the type of palm. Be careful not to pull on branches as this can damage healthy parts of the tree.

We have several varieties of palms currently available at the nursery:

• Sylvester Palms (Phoenix Sylvestris): The Sylvester palm will be a large tree and, therefore, needs space to grow. They grow approximately 1.5 feet per year and can reach a maximum height of 40-50 feet. These palms

are cold hardy, drought tolerant and moderately salt tolerant. Sylvester palms are one of the most popular palms in this area and easily recognizable by their diamond cut trunk.

• Queen Palms: Queen palms have cascading fronds that blow beautifully in the wind. They can reach a height of 50 feet but fit in somewhat tight spaces because they grow tall and skinny. These palms feature bright glossy leaves and clusters of orange dates. Queen palms create a tropical feeling and are, therefore, popular around patios, pools and other relaxing areas.

• Roebellini Palms (Pygmy Date Palms): Because of its size, this miniature palm tree is well suited to be planted closer to your home. Roebellinii palms are slow growers with a maximum height of only 10-11 feet. They are popular at the end of driveways, outside front doors, or as the centerpiece to a garden bed.

• Majestic Palms: This palm loves the humidity of our Floridian climate. The fronds of a majestic palm can fan out to 15 feet wide. They are slow growers that tolerate some shade and thrive in naturally wet areas.

• European Fan Palms: These palms are slow growing trees that can reach 8-15 feet tall. European fan palms



Peer support available to 911 dispatchers, first responders

Out of the thousands of calls Mary Jensen answered throughout her 20-year career as a 911 dispatcher in South Florida, the memory of a singular gunshot still rings out with haunting clarity.

"An elderly gentleman had called one afternoon," Jensen said. "He asked for the police to respond. When I tried to question what he needed, he just said to send somebody right away and hung up."

Jensen called back and asked the woman who picked up to quickly locate him.

"As she walked into his bedroom, that's when the gunshot went off. He had taken his own life," Jensen said. "I can still hear that sound. I can still hear her scream."

National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, which is being celebrated April 14-20, is not only the ideal time to recognize current and former 911 dispatchers like Jensen but also to ensure they have the proper tools to process the traumas they face every day.

Emergency dispatchers become part of traumatic events unfolding in real time. That constant weight takes an emotional toll that can lead to damaging and sometimes life-threatening behaviors.

Jensen said she's seen the negative impacts of the job manifest differently among her friends.

"Some turn to alcohol and some turn to suicide," she said.

Statistically, first responders and dispatchers have higher rates of relationship issues, alcohol or drug abuse, and suicide attempts and completions. In fact, more than 1,250 first responders in the U.S. have taken their own lives since 2018, according to Blue H.E.L.P. Eighty-one of those were in Florida.

However, Jensen said that seeking help — especially from a peer — can make a significant positive differ-

ence in dispatchers' mental health. Jensen recalls that she reached her breaking point on the day of that suicide, but that a colleague, who happened to be part of their organization's critical incident stress management team, recognized she was upset and took her on a walk. That simple outreach from a peer proved remarkably effective in helping Jensen process the trauma and feel supported.

No longer an emergency dispatcher, Jensen has come full circle as one of dozens of peer specialists on the other

line when a first responder needs help. Jensen cofounded and serves as chief operations officer for Zero Life Center, one of several providers that administer a First Responder Peer Support program, developed and managed by LSF Health Systems.

The program employs specially trained peer specialists, who are current or former first responders or military members, to provide confidential and free support to first responders and their family members across 20 counties in Northeast and Northern Central Florida, including St. Johns County. This includes dispatchers, police officers, firefighters, EMTs and corrections officers.

By calling 211, a first responder can talk privately with someone who has been in their shoes. Dr. Christine Cauffield, CEO of LSF Health Systems, said with the split-second decisions dispatchers make each day, it is only natural that they carry a lot of emotional weight on their shoulders.

"With this program, they have a free, confidential way to release some of that burden," Cauffield said. "They are there for us 'first,' so our program is designed to be there for them 'now.""

are hardier than most palm trees and can handle partial shade, colder temperatures and dry periods. They have finely textured fronds with colors ranging from green to silver.

• Bismarck Palms: These silvery bluegreen palms can serve as a centerpiece for your landscape. Bismarck palms have a thick trunk and fronds that can reach a span up to 16 feet wide. Although this palm only grows 1-2 feet per year, it has the potential to eventually reach 60 feet tall.

•Sago Palms: These wide trunk palms are dark green and lush, remaining relatively close to the ground even after several years. It would take 50 years for a sago palm to reach 10 feet tall. They have a large cone of seeds growing out of the middle of the tree. Because these seeds are poisonous to pets, we tend to avoid using them in fur-friendly yards.

Patriot Place certified 'Florida Green' by coalition

St. Johns Housing Partnership (SJHP), a nonprofit that develops affordable housing, announced on April 4 that Patriot Place has earned Gold Certification under the Florida Green Building Coalition (FGBC) Homes Standard.

"We are excited to be part of this important project," said FGBC President Bill Kachman. "Homes for transitional veterans, built on a beautiful infill lot with an incredible live oak for them to sit and relax under. To be involved with this project means so much knowing that Patriot Place will be able to house an at-risk or homeless veteran after everything they have done for our country."

Patriot Place comprises six new, lowincome residences to address St. Johns County's critical need for housing for at-risk and homeless veterans. Residents began moving in at the end of 2023.

Green building practices were utilized throughout the construction process to address FGBC criteria such as energy performance; water conservation; site conservation; health, air quality and moisture, materials, and disaster mitigation.

"Patriot Place is a good example of what can be done when the public and private sectors come together," said SJHP Executive Director Bill Lazar. "I want to congratulate all the partners, donors and supporters that made Patriot Place a reality for an at-risk segment of our community. Affordable housing must be sustainable over time both in terms of actual affordability and debt service along with building performance and long-term maintenance."

Founded in 1996, SJHP has helped expand housing options for the greater community, not just to benefit veterans. To

achieve that, the group brings together public and private sectors, including investors on projects that create low- and moderateincome housing, rebuild neglected homes and revitalize neighborhoods in disadvantaged areas.

The project is a collaboration between MountainStar Partners, a real estate investor and developer, SJHP and St. Johns County. The total cost of Patriot Place was \$1 million, including infrastructure

improvements

MountainStar Partners committed more than \$500,000 for land acquisition and construction costs. Patriot Place marks the first time that a density credit exchange for low-income housing was created and housing delivered to the community.

Patriot Place was built by Robert Marshall of World Island Builders and designed by Architect Bryan McCloskey. Financial partner Ameris Bank financed the construction.

Patriot Place took five years to complete, including finding and purchasing the lot, securing financing for construction, permitting and zoning. The one-bedroom apartments are 630 square feet each and veterans will pay about 30% of the market rate with the balance subsidized through the partnership with Flagler CareConnect.

Patriot Place residents will be managed by the UF/ Flagler Health+ social health program UF/Care Connect+, which links area residents with resources like safe housing, food pantries, counseling services, workplace readiness and transportation.

Former St. Johns County Development Services Director Suzanne Konchan conceived the original idea for Patriot Place and St. Johns County commissioners Roy Alaimo and Henry Dean helped Patriot

Place become reality. The Northeast Florida Association of Realtors, Bo Strange with Lovely Loo and the Snodgrass Family Foundation donated additional funds, time and materials.

Other contributors and supporters included The Home Depot Store No. 6334, Eagle Scout Michael Korfhage and Boy Scout Troup 243, University of Florida IFAS Master Gardeners and FGBC certifying agents Kachman and Ralph Locke, both military veterans, who waived their fee and volunteered their time. The entire solar panel system was donated by Everybody Solar, JinkoSolar and Synergy Solar.

FGBC is the state's leading certifier of green projects. The FGBC Certification Program tailors' carbon-reducing, green building standards to the Florida climate, allowing builders, developers and communities to meet green building standards while simultaneously constructing sustainable properties best suited for Florida's ecosystem.

Selling season underway in Northeast Florida

The "selling season" in Northeast Florida has arrived, albeit a bit early this year. For single-family homes, prices are up, active inventory is up, new listings are up and so is the median number of days on the market.

There are only two exceptions. Pending sales for single-family homes dropped nearly 20%, and, unfortunately for consumers, the Home Affordability Index ratcheted down slightly, 2.2%, to register at 66.5.

The Home Affordability Index measures housing affordability for the region. In other words, it measures whether a typical family earns enough to qualify for a mortgage on a typical home, based on current interest rates, median income and median home prices.

A higher number means greater affordability. This index measures affordability factors for all homebuyers making a 20% downpayment. An index of 100 is defined as the point where a median-income family has the exact amount of income needed to purchase a median-priced existing home.

An index value exceeding 100 means that the family has more than enough income, while a value below 100 means that a family doesn't have enough income to qualify for a mortgage loan.

"The market is moving up in a positive



direction each month," said 2024 NEFAR President Rory Dubin. "March saw over a 20% increase in closed transactions despite a slight increase in the median price. In fact, almost a third of sales were above list price, indicating high demand in our more affordable market compared with the rest of and most of the Southeast. Both inventory and new listings increased as well, showing a robust market for both buyers and sellers." Specifically, the median sales price for single-family homes in the region in March was \$389,000, a 1% increase from February. Active inventory totaled 5,920 homes, a 3.2% increase over last month. Likewise, new listings tallied 3,580, a 6.7% increase. And the median number of days on the market stood at 33, up 3.1% from the month before.

As spring arrives and the selling season becomes busy, employing a Realtor who has local knowledge and experience is vital, according to Dubin.

"It is more important than ever to use a NEFAR Realtor to navigate the high amount of activity in real estate in Northeast Florida," he said.

In Duval County, the March median price of single-family housing was \$345,950, slightly less than a 1% drop from February. The median number of days on the market in March rose to 29, a 7.4% increase from the month before.

Month-to-month closed sales rose 24.4% to 964, pending sales fell 19.4% to 746, and new listings increased 10.5% to 1,813. Active inventory for the county climbed 5.4% to 2,709 homes, a 2.8-month supply.

In March, the Home Affordability Index remained the same at 75.

In St. Johns County, March median prices climbed 10.4% to \$546,259 for single-family homes. The median days on the market rose 21.9% to 39.

Month-to-month, closed sales rose 17.5% to 484, pending sales dropped 17.2% to 409 and new listings increased 3.3% to 989. Active inventory increased 4.3% to 1,852 homes, a 3.8-month supply.

The Home Affordability Index fell, 11.3% to 47, indicating that it is still very expensive to live in St. Johns County.
