LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The Board of County Commissioners in St. Johns County, at the request of the PGA Tour, wants to experiment with electronic billboards on I-95 for two years

When asked why, they said it would help advertise the Hall of Fame at the World Golf Village. Commissioner Rachael Bennett, a supporter of developers and business, helped usher this quietly through the system for the past eight months.

They added it to a new, needed change in the sign ordinance and it almost got through before three citizens saw it. The board scolded these citizens and passed it on to the PZA, the next step in the process.

When citizens first elected me to the Board of County Commissioners in 1999, they made it known to me that they wanted an overlay district to control signs in Ponte Vedra. When they got it, all the other coastal areas wanted the same; soon that desire spread all over the county. These citizens and the rest of the county went a step further. They wanted to get rid of billboards altogether. Over the past 16 years, they

were reduced from 579 to 278. Also, electronic billboards were forbidden.

The PGA Tour is almost a sacred cow in St. Johns County. The elected officials jump when called. They did this time but under a cloud of distraction by a hurricane and another ordinance to hide it within.

They passed it to the PZA, but it will come back to them, this time in the light of day and lit up by a bunch of very angry and disappointed citizens. Words are being yelled, saying it's dangerous and distracting, it's tacky and ugly, it's against everything we stand for, it's a form of light pollution. Who asked for this? Not the citizens.

Who is being paid off? The Tour wants it. Who elected them? Who are they wining and dining? Who comes first, the citizens or the Tour?

We are reminded about the foot in the door being just a start. So my friends and neighbors, it's your community, your county, step up or kiss it good bye. Reckon the turtles will see

...to all of the little girls who are watching this, never doubt that you are valuable and powerful and deserving of every chance and opportunity in the world to pursue and achieve your own dreams."

Hillary Clinton's concession speech was probably the hardest speech she's ever given.

Yet, I believe that her path-breaking life prepared her, and she delivered it spot on. In every defeat lies a lesson and opportunities to bring home the prize. At this time, in this country, the price is greater involvement by women in government and a kinder world.

Eight freshmen women representatives will join the U.S. House of Representatives. Women who won a seat in the U.S. Senate:

Tammy Duckworth (D) will be the first biracial senator and the first female senator to have seen combat. "When we agree, I'll work with them on poli-

cies that help this nation. But when we disagree, I will stand up and fight for working people."

Former California Attorney General Kamala Harris (D) becomes the state's first senator of Indian descent. "When we have been attacked and when our ideals and fundamental ideals are being attacked, do we retreat or do we fight? I say we fight!"

Former Nevada Attorney General Catherine Cortez Masto (D) holds the distinction of being the first Latina to serve in the Senate. "It's about time our government mirrors the diversity of our nation."

New Hampshire, Gov. Maggie Hassan (D) won her state's U.S. Senate seat. "This is a critical time for New Hampshire and our country, and now more than ever, we need to work together to address our challenges."

FDOT to initiate construction of traffic light at US 1/Ray Road by September 2017

After two Nease High School students were critically injured Nov. 7 in a car accident at the intersection of U.S. 1 and Ray Road, the Florida Department of Transportation said it plans to address public demands and initiate construction of a traffic light by September 2017.

"FDOT understands the urgency, and traffic safety is our priority," said Ron Tittle, public information officer. "FDOT has been reviewing the intersection since early 2016, and the design is currently at 60 percent completion toward constructing a traffic signal at the intersection."

Tittle said the proposed traffic signal has received construction funding for fiscal year 2017-2018, which begins in July for Florida. FDOT's engineering team, he said, is working to expedite the design and review that should help in moving the project sooner into 2017 than September. That design includes the review of electrical lines, gas lines and other utilities at the intersection that may need to be relocated to accommodate for the traffic light. Before construction begins, Tittle said FDOT plans to install signs at the intersection as soon as possible.

Public frustration concerning the historically dangerous intersection mounted after Mackenzie Felmet, 17, and Sydney Felmet, 15, were airlifted to area hospitals following the Nov. 7 accident. According to Florida Highway Patrol (FHP), the sisters, who were stopped facing west on Ray Road in a Toyota Corolla, attempted to cross northbound lanes of U.S. 1 and failed to yield the right of way to an oncoming Hyundai Santa Fe headed north in the right lane.

Frustrated with the light's delayed timeline, Nease students Katherine Carlo and Zach Yearwood have initiated petitions asking state legislators to expedite its implementation

"As a Nease student, I fear for my

friends, family and the entire community due to the numerous accidents that have occurred at this intersection," wrote Carlo in her change.org petition. "This incident proves that the time for a stop light is now."

Carlo's online petition has been signed by nearly 1,900 supporters.

In Yearwood's change.org petition, he implored government officials "to help us keep our children alive." His petition has been signed by nearly 1,400 supporters.

Florida State Sen Travis Hutson is one of the state government officials that was

petitioned. Although he said his office has not received any physical petitions, he is aware of their online presence and is planning to work with FDOT to review the intersection and address the concerns.

Hutson said he understands and appreciates the urgency of the project, but its timeline is dependent upon the budget allocation process. According to Hutson, the state can't allocate money for projects until the end of session around July 1.

"If there's a way we can find extra dollars to expedite we certainly will "said Hutson. "If not, we'll have to see what

the holdup is and how we can expedite to get that done. As long as it's not money holding us back, it should be priority

Tittle said FDOT is also aware of the online petitions, and he applauds the student's safety efforts. Before construction on the traffic signal begins, FDOT also plans to contact Nease High School, Tittle said, to conduct a presentation at the high school regarding road requirements to ensure children are safe in the interim

Ponte Vedra Y lecture reviews the science of dementia

The Y Healthy Living Center of Ponte Vedra's YMCA played host to another "Talk with the Expert" seminar Nov. 9, this time welcoming Baptist Health's gerontology educator, Robert Trenholm, MSN, RN, of the AgeWell Center for Senior Health to present new research on dementia.

Trenholm started by reminding the group of the "three Ds" commonly discussed in the same realm: delirium, depression and dementia.

"It's important to understand all three of these things because, out of the things that can happen to our brains as we age, those three are the most common and the most high risk," he said. "And they are often confused with one another."

In that vein, Trenholm introduced relatively new research obtained from a study more than three decades in the making with the Framingham Heart Study. The study followed the health of an original cohort in 1948 and two subsequent generations. According to Trenholm, the people in the study showed a small but definite decrease in the number of dementia diagnoses, and scientists have offered a few theories as to why it might be happening.

"Researchers decided to look at the lifestyle issues correlated with the reduction," Trenholm said. "And one thing that the date suggested was ... a higher level of neuroprotective (activity)."

Trenholm explained the scientific aspect of the research, including the development of neurons and how they work proactively to fend off the onset of dementia.

The average human brain, he said, has about 100 billion neurons. Most activity in the brain occurs either inside the neuron or between the cells where they communicate with one another, and where chemicals and "synaptic connections" cross paths. Those cells and what goes on in and around them is what allows them to manufacture the chemicals needed to communicate with one another.

But it's possible to lose neurons due to disease – especially at the onset or in the throes of dementia. "You'd be left to operate with 50 billion neurons, which isn't too good," Trenholm said.

Trenholm suggested that an "extra buildup" of neurons is something that occurs in childhood when the brain is still growing. That growth continues throughout life, but the process of adding neurons slows greatly as people get older.

But that doesn't mean adult brain growth stops.

"The other part of this equation is the synaptic neuron," Trenholm said. "Each one of those neurons has branches like tree limbs that reach out to other neurons. The more of those that they have, the more connections they make and the more memory patterns you can create with those neurons communicating with each other."

It's with this knowledge that Framingham researchers were able to form one hypothesis about the slow-down of dementia diagnoses amongs study subjects: The key to reducing new dementia cases could be education. When separated, scientists found that the group of subjects who only had a high school level education didn't see a decrease in the percentage of dementia. The group of subjects with post-secondary education, however, did see a drop.

The growth of synaptic connections – a process that naturally occurs each time something new is learned – can offset the lack of "extra" neurons, and it's easier to do than forming new ones.

"This is what's known as neuroplasticity," Trenholm said, noting that the active

learning environment of a post-secondary education could naturally encourage the growth of connections formed in the brain, making it neuroprotective. "That's our brains' ability to continue to grow and learn throughout our life. And we continue to form ... synaptic connections throughout our whole lives."

Another theory suggested by researchers was that people who received higher education might know more about health and make better choices to help reduce their risk. The third theory was that people who don't receive post-secondary education had less access to health care coverage and resources due to lower wages, which put them at greater risk over the decades the study was conducted.

Trenholm noted that the research is still in its early stages, and the theories need more testing before any one cause can be determined – but he also encouraged the group to look to tried and true advice.

"Unfortunately, there's no 'silver bullet' to preventing dementia," he said. "The usual advice of eating well, exercising, avoiding stress and learning new things all apply. But 'exercising' the brain and being a proactive learner is ... a good place to start."

'Celebrate the Night' ceremony honors, thanks veterans

Ernie Florig has a special appreciation for the freedoms many Americans take for granted.



The ceremony began with the Pledge of Allegiance, after which all children in attendance were invited down onto the track to participate in an opening march behind members of the Nease NJROTC program, who presented the colors as the Nease band played the national anthem.

Volunteers shared a poem and words of gratitude, followed by dancers from Atlantic Coast Dance Studio, who performed a specially choreographed routine to "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy."

Florig and fellow veteran Jerry Brandt then shared their stories with attendees before local children presented the veterans in attendance with certificates honoring their service and sacrifice. Organizers also recognized volunteers with certificates, and honored K9s for Warriors, representatives of which were on hand to share information about the nonprofit that provides specially trained service dogs to veterans struggling with PTSD and traumatic brain injury. A portion of the proceeds from "Celebrate the Night" will benefit K9s for Warriors, Greco said.

Luminary bags honoring veterans create a "Path of Heroes" at "Celebrate the Night."







Children's Miracle Network Torch Relay travels to Ponte Vedra

Sawgrass Marriott hosts Jacksonville stop on nationwide torch relay

The Sawgrass Marriott Golf Resort & Spa was the setting for the Jacksonville stop on the national Torch Relay for Children's Miracle Network Hospitals Nov. 12, helping to raise funds for hospitals that provide life-saving treatments for children.

Approximately 100 volunteers from hotels and resorts across the First Coast gathered at the Sawgrass Marriott to welcome the torch and participate in a three-mile walk, raising more than \$6,000 that CMNH Jacksonville Director Emily Williamson said would go directly to local hospitals.

"All of the funds raised here will stay right here in the community, going to UF Health and Wolfson Children's Hospital," Williamson told participants. "My job is to find the machines that hospitals need most and purchase them."

For example, Children's Miracle Net-

work fundraising proved lifesaving for 4-year-old Celeste, Williamson said, who experienced complications at birth that resulted in her being deprived of oxygen for an extended period. But thanks to fundraising efforts like the Torch Relay, the hospital had cool-cap technology that cooled Celeste's brain and allowed it to heal, saving her life and preventing her from suffering any long-term disabilities.

"The money you're raising here today will benefit other kids in our community like Celeste – kids you know," Williamson said

Initially begun in 2002 as a relay that started in Miami and ended in Orlando, the Torch Relay expanded to Northeast Florida and Georgia before becoming a nationwide event. This year's event will visit 20 cities from coast to coast.

Since its inception, the Torch Relay has raised more than \$11 million for children's hospitals across the country.



iHEAL – iPads helping enrich autistic lives

Imagine what it might be like to have all the words of language in your head but being unable to have them spoken with your voice. Imagine the stress, anxiety and irritation one must feel to not be able to express yourself like your other peers

The HEAL Foundation (Healing Every Autistic Life) wants to give kids with autism the power of communication by distributing iPads in ESE classrooms throughout Northeast Florida. Leslie Weed, founder of The HEAL Foundation, noted the benefits of the technology when she bought an iPad for her daughter Lanier, who is nonverbal and profoundly affected by autism.

"With the iPad, Lanier began to communicate with her family, siblings and teachers through a technique called 'facilitated communication,'" Weed said. "She began to speak to us through the iPad – her teachers were astonished at how much she knew and her level of intelligence."

By raising funds through HEAL, the goal is to place an iPad in every special needs classroom in six school districts in Northeast Florida. The initiative is called "iHEAL - iPads Helping Enrich Autistic Lives." HEAL has partnered with Apple to launch the initiative. Together, we are introducing new learning opportunities to communicate with those who have learning disabilities and are non-verbal.

HEAL has partnered with Master

Facilitator Morgan Tyner of AC-CEPTS, and over the past two years, dozens of non-verbal school-aged students have started communicating with their families via iPads for the first time in their lives.

To date, HEAL has distributed over 100 iPads to teachers throughout six school districts. In November they

will deliver another 50 iPads. Since 2004, HEAL has given nearly \$2 million to the local autism community. In 2016, HEAL awarded \$200,000 for specialized camps, the arts, after school programs, classroom enhancements, iPads and Autism Service Dogs. For more information, visit www.healautismnow.org.

The center is to be used at the ranch, where cottage parents and volunteers will be able to tutor and help the boys in residence with their homework, SAT prep and other academic studies.

The Rodeheaver Foundation and Rodeheaver Boys Ranch will host their second annual Rodeheaver Boys Ranch Benefit Bass Tournament on March 4, 2017 at Crystal Cove Marina in Palatka. Last year, Publix Super Markets Charities was the title sponsor.

Rodeheaver Boys Ranch has been providing complete care for up to 50 disadvantaged boys at a time for over 65 years. It was founded by Homer Rodeheaver, a gospel musician, who dedicated the land to always be used as a youth ranch.

Arbor Terrace residents take flight with Ageless Aviation

Marilyn Van Huss's late husband served in the U.S. Air Force for 30 years, flying more than 100 missions as a fighter pilot in Vietnam and receiving the Distinguished Flying Cross.

But last week it was her turn to take flight, as Van Huss, 87, soared into the wild blue yonder aboard a Boeing Stearman biplane. Joining her were seven other Jacksonville-area Arbor Terrace residents, who participated in the flights arranged by the Ageless Aviation Dream Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to honoring seniors and U.S. military veterans.

Participants included 92-year-old Arbor Terrace Ponte Vedra resident Arthur Jensen. A retired Merchant Marine captain, Jensen served during World War II, and recalled transporting 200 German prisoners to a POW camp in Oran, Algeria. The oldest participant in the Nov. 8 flights was 103-year-old Mada Allen. A retired teacher, Allen flew in memory of her late husband, Navy veteran A.W. Brann; and her son, Bob, who served in the Army.

Following the flights, the Arbor Company presented Ageless Aviation with a \$2,200 donation.

"In the past year, Ageless Aviation has enabled 130 residents in 22 of our Arbor communities to realize their dreams of flight," said Laura Ellen Christian, vice president of engagement for the Arbor Company. "The \$2,200 expresses our appreciation with a donation of \$100 for each community they have flown for us this year."





The panelists came from starkly different backgrounds.

One grew up in a trailer park with a single parent. Another enjoyed an upper middle-class upbringing as the child of a college professor and chemist. The third joined the army so he could "blow stuff

Yet it was their military service and desire to help other veterans make a successful transition to the civilian world that united the three speakers at the second annual St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce veterans luncheon last week. Organized by the chamber's Ponte Vedra Beach Division, the Nov. 9 luncheon at The Plantation clubhouse gave local business and community leaders a chance to learn about opportunities to hire veterans and how the skills military men and women develop make them responsible, valuable contributors in the workplace.

The Marine Corps built an exceptional level of confidence in me," said Joe Padlo, who spent 11 years in the military before founding a commercial cleaning business that provides employment opportunities for other veterans. "When I make a decision, I'm going to stick to that decision and I'm going to run with it."

John Fails said when he joined the military, he saw service as a way to make money that he could send home to his struggling family. "I was just thrilled to have three square meals a day," he said. "So for me, (enlisting) was about making my own path and helping to make a path for my family."

Serving in the military taught him how to analyze situations and problems, Fails said – skills he now uses as executive director of Bunker Labs Jacksonville, a nonprofit that helps veterans start and grown their own businesses.

Each of the veteran panelists described how serving in the military changed them as individuals and made them the people they are today.

"Remember the shy kid in school? That was me," SFC Michael Kube said. "Becoming a drill sergeant was the last thing I ever imagined I would do."

Doing so, however, helped him develop leadership skills while also imparting those skills to others.

"Seeing parents' expressions when they would see how much their sons had grown up was a rewarding experience," said Kube, who has also started his own business. "The army gave me the opportunity to help other people change their lives."



Sharks maul Yulee 51-19 in 5A playoff win

Friday night's District 5A football playoff matchup between the Yulee Hornets and the Ponte Vedra Sharks at the Shark Tank featured the area's top running back against the area's top quarterback.

What was expected to be a closely contested affair turned out to be a rout of the first magnitude. The Sharks, behind quarterback Nick Tronti, running back Hal Swan and receivers JD Pirris and Marshall Few, proved without a doubt that Ponte Vedra's multi-faceted attack was vastly superior to Yulee's powerful but one-dimensional offense featuring Jamari Peacock. The Sharks were never threatened as they rolled to an easy 51-19 victory.

Ponte Vedra took the opening kickoff and four plays later held a 7-0 lead. The drive featured a 13-yard run by Swan, a 22-yard reception by Pirris, a 9-yard Swan run and a 25-yard screen pass from Tronti to Swan for the touchdown.

Before Peacock had a chance to touch the football, the Sharks Cole McCormick stepped in front of an errant Yulee pass to put the ball back in Tronti's hands on the Hornets' 15-yard line. On third down, Tronti connected with Swan for an 11-yard score. The game was less than three minutes old and Ponte Vedra had a 14-0 advantage.

On their next possession, the visitors shunned the pass and handed the football to Peacock twice, only to have the Shark defense hold the area's top running back to a net zero yards. Yulee was forced to punt and Ponte Vedra wasted no time putting up another score – this a 10-yard dive by Zach Walton.

Trailing 21-0, Yulee took advantage of three offsides infractions and a pass interference penalty to get on the board. Peacock gained 28 yards on eight carries in the drive.

The Sharks controlled the ball for nearly five minutes before settling for a 30-yard Chris Howard field goal and a 24-7 advantage. Ponte Vedra got the ball right back on the next play from scrimmage when a Yulee pitchout was fumbled and Jacob Reeves recovered. Swan found a big hole in the left side and scampered for a 12-yard touchdown. The Sharks led 31-7 with more than seven minutes left in the second

quarter.

Yulee's vaunted ground game (read Peacock) finally showed up when their powerful running back broke several tackles en route to a 68-yard touchdown jaunt. A botched snap foiled the pointafter, leaving Yulee on the short end of the 31-13 score.

Tronti, answering Peacock's long run, then engineered another 80-yard scoring drive; the big plays included a 23-yard strike to Jarrett Stepp and a 15-yard pass to Few. Tronti finished the drive calling his own number for the 4-yard TD. Sharks 38-13.

The Shark defense came up big once again forcing a Yulee punt with the Hornets inside their own 20. Duncan

Van Kueteren blocked the kick and Jake Maguire scooped it up for the score. Sharks 45-13. Yulee tried to get back in the game through the air, but JB Shepherd's interception for the Sharks killed that threat as the first half ended.

Yulee took the second half kickoff, but even Peacock could not help as the Shark defense swarmed to force another punt. Tronti and Few combined for a 44-yard pass and run play that put PV up 51-13. The PAT was blocked – the only downside of the night for the Sharks.

By this time Coach Toblin called on his backups. The Hornets would add


